few million fans are wondering just what the Green Bay Packers' super-team will do against the Bears' amazing defense.

Defense? That's the lad among the best NFL clubs as the season goes into its 18th week with two-team ties for first place in both divisions.

The rough-tough Pittsburgh Steelers put forth their best defense to upset Jimmy Brown and the Cleveland Browns, 9-7 Sunday and throw the Eastern Division into a four-team race. The New York Giants (7-2) pulled even with the

Bears for the lead by drubbing the Philadelphia Eagles, 42-21.

The Bears had little except defense as they held the Los Angeles Rams to a net total of 88 yards (rushing and passing) and won, 6-0, on Roger LeClerc's two field goals.

The Packers' defense kept the Minnesota Vikings in line until the champs pulled away in the second half on John Roach's passes to win, 38-7. Green Bay and Chicago are tied with 8-1 records.

Cowboys, 31-24, and the Baltimore Colts edged the Detroit Lions, 24-21, in the three other games played.

To get back to the Bears and Packers. They meet next week at Wrigley Field in a battle that should determine which will go on to win the Western title. The Bears won their first meeting, 10-3, on the opening Sunday of the season and Green Bay since has recited eight straight wins.

Chicago has yielded only 102 points in nine games for one of the most remarkable defensive records in recent NFL history. The Bears' defense is so good they can win without scoring a touchdown. They played ball against the Rams Sunday and won on LeClerc's field goals of 30 and 16 yards in the

first and third periods.

The Packers should have Bart Starr back next week but they certainly can't complain about the fill-in job Roach has done for three games. Roach threw three touchdowns passes after the Vikings had taken a first-period lead on Frank Tarkey's 18-yard toss to Paul Flatley.

The Steelers (5-3-1) held Jimmy Brown to less than his usual rushing average before a crowd of 54,497 at Pitt Stadium. Ed Brown's nine-yard pass to Gary Bradman in the final period produced the winning points. Brown set up that score with a 41-yard pass to Buddy Dial.

Jimmy Brown gained 40 of his 99 yards during Cleveland's 74-yard touchdown march in the

second period. Frank Ryan passed four yards to Gary Collins for the score. The Steelers scored two points in the third period when Brown was tackled in the end zone by Bob Schmitz while attempting a pass.

Y.A. Tittle threw three touchdown passes, completing 16 of 29 attempts for 251 yards before retiring late in the third period. He also set up two other Giant touchdowns with long passes.

Charley Johnson completed

three touchdown passes as the Cardinals withstood Washington's two-touchdown rally in the last period to win. The Cards' final touchdown was set up when Washington's Bobby Mitchell touched a St. Louis punt and rookie linebacker Larry Stallings fell on the ball on the Redskins' 14-yard line. Johnson passed the remaining distance to Sonny Randle for what proved to be the winning score.

The Forty Niners overcame a

three-touchdown, 460-yard passing performance by the Cowboys' Don Meredith to win their second game of the season. Lamar McLean completed three touchdown tosses for San Francisco.

Baltimore scored on each of its first four series of downs to go ahead 2-7 and then beat off Detroit's late rush. Johnny Unitas threw two scoring passes and gained 376 yards. Earl Morrall threw for two Detroit scores and gained 296 yards.

Navy Middies Near Cotton Bowl Clash With Texas U Longhorns

It looks like Jolly Roger Staubach is going to sail the good ship Navy straight into Dallas for a New Year's engagement against the land forces of Texas in the Cotton Bowl.

What would be one of the most attractive bowl pairings in the college football ranks came closer to reality Saturday when Staubach passed the fourth-ranked Middies to a 42-7 trouncing of Maryland and top-ranked Texas kept its perfect record intact by beating Baylor, 7-0.

Navy can insure a bid by disposing of Duke next Saturday and arch-rival Army Nov. 30 while the Longhorns would be in by winning one of their fi-

nal two games against Texas Christian on Saturday or Texas A&M Thanksgiving Day.

The picture for the granddaddy of all bowl games—the Rose Bowl—was a lot more muddled today although Washington is a good bet to win the host team role after overpowering California, 39-26, Saturday. The Huskies are on top of the Big Six with only weak UCLA and Washington State to come.

Close On Heels

The Big Ten, which traditionally sends its champion to Pasadena, Calif., for the Rose Bowl, has produced another close race. Michigan State, a 23-0 victor over Purdue, currently is setting the pace with a 4-0-1 league mark and the eighth-ranked Spartans can clinch at

least a tie for the title by beating Illinois Nov. 23.

Close on the heels of the Spartans are Ohio State (3-0-1) and second-ranked Illinois (3-1-1), which dropped its first game of the season Saturday by a 14-8 count to Michigan. The Buckeyes lost to Penn State, 10-7, in a non-league encounter.

Ohio State has two conference games left against Northwestern and Michigan while Illinois must meet Wisconsin and Michigan State and hope for a slip by one of the leaders.

Sixth-ranked Oklahoma and 10th-ranked Nebraska are heading for an Oct. 23 climax at Lincoln for the Big Eight crown and a trip to the Orange Bowl. Nebraska, fresh off a 23-9 victory over Kansas, first meets Oklahoma State next week and the Sooners, who toppled Iowa State, 24-14, clash with Missouri.

Other Strong Candidates

The Southeastern Conference, which sent four representatives to bowl games last year, is back with several more potent candidates. Third-ranked Mississippi, which enjoyed a 41-0 rout over Tampa, is leading the race with a meeting against weak Tennessee coming up next week.

Other top contenders are fifth-ranked Auburn, which dropped from the list of perfect record teams by losing to Mississippi State, 13-10; seventh-ranked Alabama, which was idle, and Louisiana State, a 28-14 winner over Texas Christian. Auburn and Alabama will clash Nov. 30 in what could be a meaningful game.

Princeton, which along with Texas and Auburn were the only major college teams to boast perfect records going into last weekend's action, went the same route as Auburn by suffering a 21-7 upset loss to Harvard. Princeton still enjoys a half-game edge in the Ivy League standings with a contest against bitter rival Yale coming up Saturday.

PULLMAN (UPI) — "Oregon was a better football team than we were," admitted Washington State University Coach Jim Sutherland after his Cougars fell to the Oregon Ducks Saturday.

The Cougar coach said his club gave Oregon the ball too many times. "We helped them win." The Cougars dropped the ball to the Ducks on four pass interceptions and two fumbles.

Sutherland, in a locker room session after the game, said, "I thought we played pretty good football," then he added, "faking out our mistakes, of course."

Bob Berry, Oregon quarterback, drew praise from Sutherland who described the opposition's star as a combination of "guts and determination."

"I've got to hand it to the boy. We knew he was hurt and we could tell it, but he was still their key man," he said. Berry is still suffering from injuries suffered two weeks ago in the Oregon-Washington game.

WSC Helps Ducks Win

Tobin's heroics offset a brilliant performance by New York's Dick Wood, who threw scoring passes of 47, 7 and 12 yards.

The Chargers retained their lead in the Western Division on the strength of a 27-yard first-period touchdown pass from Tobin to Lance Alworth and George Blair's conversion. Gino Cappalletti put the Patriots' points on the scoreboard with field goals of 35 and 25 yards but also missed three-point tries from 38, 37 and 35 yards.

Jack Kemp threw three touchdowns and ran 14 yards for a fourth touchdown to lead the Buffalo Bills to a 27-17 victory over the Denver Broncos in a Saturday night game.

Hockey Ace Celebrates Scoring Of 545th Goal

DETROIT (UPI) — Gordie Howe sat relaxing in the tumultuous Detroit Red Wing dressing room Sunday night, sipping a glass of "awfully strong water" and displaying a telegram and a huge color portrait of the mob of well-wishers.

The telegram read, "Congratulations, but what took you so long?"

It was signed by Jack Adams, former long time manager-coach of the Wings.

The congratulations were for Howe's 545th regular season goal, which came in Detroit's 3-0 victory over the Montreal Canadiens and made him the greatest goal scorer in the history of the National Hockey League.

The goal, which ended a five-game goal scoring drought during which the pressure kept building on Howe, snapped the old record of 544 held by former Montreal great Maurice (Rocket) Richard.

"I really feel relaxed now, I knew I had to get it tonight if I was going to get it at home," Howe said, referring to the fact that Detroit now plays five straight road games.

The color portrait was presented in the steamy dressing room by Canadian Jean Bellevue "from our entire club."

The record breaking goal gave Detroit its final 3-0 margin after earlier goals in the period by Bruce MacGregor and Alex Faulkner.

The sellout crowd of 15,027 gave Howe a thunderous 10-minute ovation and littered the ice with debris.

Howe now has a "grand slam" of hockey's greatest records. He has already scored more points (1,221) and more assists (676) and played in more games (1,132) than any other player in NHL history.

Howe, an 18-year veteran who wants to last 20 years in the NHL, has now scored just two goals in the last 10 games.

"I hope they come a little easier for a while now," he smiled.

In Sunday night's only other NHL game, the Boston Bruins snapped the Chicago Black Hawks' 11-game unbeaten streak, 4-2.

Goals by Tommy Williams, Wayne Connolly and Andy Hedberg gave the Bruins a 3-2 lead at the end of the first period and Ed Westfall added the clincher in the final session.

Despite the loss, Chicago maintained its five-point lead over second-place Montreal.

"I've seen Woodworth only a few times in action this year and I thought he could do a better job against Indiana," Prothro said.

Queen threw a 12-yard pass to halfback Danny Espalin and hit end Doug McDougal with a 2-yard aerial for touchdowns in the final period.

The scoring passes almost were enough to overhaul the Hoosiers, who took a 29-3 lead on a 27-yard fourth period field goal by fullback Tom Nowatzke. Nowatzke sparked Indiana to its third straight win.

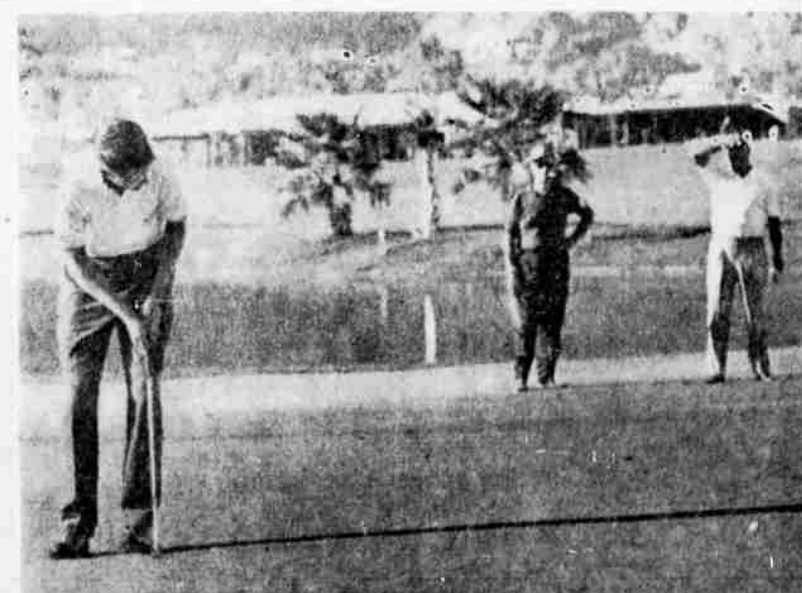
