Haystack Draws Big Crowd, Buries Foes

The initial professional wrestling card of the season held Wednesday night at the auditorium may only be described as a glowing success.

Some 1,000 jammed the local arena as the biggest wrestler in the world, Haystack Calhoun, made his first appearance on the local scene.

And this mass of weight (601 pounds), muscle and friendliness captured the audience from his first climb into the ring to autographed scraps of paper clutched in the minute hands of his "Lil' Neighbors" to his final climb out two hours later as winner of his match of the evening and winner of the "over-the-top" battle royal.

Then it was a picture of the King holding court as this product of Morgan's Corner, Ark., sat on the ring apron and took time to chat with his adult "Neighbors."

It was an apropos ending to an evening which had seen the usual in today's professional wrestling — from scientific to knockdown dragout grappling.

In the former it was the work of Ricky Hunter, a last minute sub for Nick Kozak who was called out of town, meeting the Klamath Falls age-old grappler Buck Davidson, and the two giving the large crowd spectacular wrestling as they battled to a draw.

The Haystack was next to exhibit his wrestling talents and he quickly "scuffed" (as he terms the sport) to a press of Gil Ane in 3:30 of the match.

Ane's first mistake was attempting to take the big man via the illegal grappling method and the former farmer quickly indicated he can be ruled as he ended the match with all 601 pounds pressed squarely on the chest of Ane.

Abe Jacobs, who had been scheduled to meet Davidson in the opener, went against the bearded Russian Soldat Gorky and immediately became the favorite of the crowd principally through the unethical tactics of the Russian.

Jacobs became irritated and collected the first fall in the two-out-of-three match on a series of droppicks and a rolling grapevine.

Gorky came back to even the count with more of his type wrestling and secured the deadlock via the use of a series of smashes, a backbreaker and the ensuing press.

While Jacobs was attempting to recover, Gorky continued racking the slowed down Jacobs and was finally disqualified by referee Jack Kiser.

The antics of Gorky brought debris into the ring and finally a lady fan who rapped the wild Russian with her large purse as he fled to the dressing room.

The final bout was the big one as Haystack teamed up finally with Jacobs in the battle royal and the opponents left the ring in order.

Davidson, Hunter, Jacobs and finally the Haystack tossing out both Ane and Gorky at the same time.

It was a good night of wrestling and the fans were given a draw.

Promoter Elton Owens commented that the crowd was the largest in the last three years and announced the next card will be scheduled for Wednesday night, Dec. 4.

Yogi caught just about everybody by surprise Wednesday when he selected Jim Gleeson, former outfielder for the Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds, as the Yankees' new first-base

Elk Hunting Said Poor Over State

PORTLAND (UPI) — The weekly hunting report issued by the Oregon State Game Commission:

Northwest: Elk and waterfowl hunting poor throughout the Willamette Valley-Lane County area. Prospects are fair this weekend for deer on lands adjacent to agricultural areas.

Southwest: Deer are beginning to appear at lower elevations but elk remain holed up at higher elevations. Pheasant hunting has been poor to fair.

Northeast: Elk remain holed up in thick brush or in the side hills below snow line. Prospects are good in the Tillgate to Tower Mt. area and in the State Line-Tollgate area; otherwise poor road conditions and mild weather are hampering hunter efforts. Success should pick up in Union and Baker counties.

Wallawa Mts. on basis of good tracking snow which fell last week.

Southwest: Elk hunting is mostly slow throughout the area with the animals widely scattered and broken into small groups. Pheasant hunting promises some success particularly with use of dogs. Chukars are abundant but increasingly difficult to locate.

PORTLAND (UPI) — The weekly report on fishing conditions by the State Game Commission:

Northwest: Nestucca has been producing steelhead this week; Sandy River conditions have improved; Clackamas River has a been slow for salmon and steelhead; Dorena Reservoir has been fair for trout.

Southwest: Few steelhead being caught by bank fishermen in Winchester area near Roseburg; Coos and Coquille systems have been dropping; Rogue in the Graves Creek to Grants Pass areas has been slow but a lot of steelhead are in the river.

Tatum Held After Game

BURLINGTON (UPI) — Reece (Gosse) Tatum, former basketball star with the Harlem Globetrotters, was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge here Wednesday night and released on \$25 bail.

Tatum's arrest was the outgrowth of a basketball game between his Road Kings and the New York Rens at which the Ink Spots, noted singing group, were scheduled to appear at halftime.

The Ink Spots failed to appear and the Burlington Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the benefit game, thought Tatum's team should accept a reduced payment.

A "slight altercation" developed after the game over the dispute, according to Al Gillilan, Burlington police chief, and Tatum was booked at city jail but released when he posted bail.

Tatum's team won the game 101-96.

Pioneers Ranked 13th, While Delaware Retains Poll Lead

NEW YORK (UPI) — The only team that can derail Delaware from its first small college national football championship is Delaware itself.

The Blue Hens held down the top spot for the second straight week in the United Press International small college ratings today while Northern Illinois remained in the runnerup spot after holding the No. 1 position for three weeks.

But while Delaware has two games remaining on its schedule, Northern Illinois—the only team capable of overtaking the leader—already has finished its season.

The Blue Hens increased their lead this week by gaining 15 first-place votes and a total of 304 points. Northern Illinois slipped six points to 283 despite receiving 14 first place ballots, an increase of two.

Massachusetts, whose record is marred only by a scoreless tie with Harvard, slipped past both Florida A&M and Wittenberg into third position. The Huskies thus became the first team other than Delaware, Northern Illinois and Florida A&M to break into the top three spots.

Both Florida A&M and Wittenberg dropped one notch to fourth and fifth, respectively. The Rattlers trail Massachusetts by only two points and the Tigers are only five points out of third.

San Diego State clung to its sixth position but St. John's (Minn.) advanced two places to seventh even though the Johnnies completed their season (8-0) two weeks ago.

Western Kentucky and Texas A&I, deadlocked for seventh last week, fell to eighth and ninth, respectively. Texas A&I was the only member of the top 10 to lose last week. Southwest Missouri State jumped into the top 10 for the first time this week, landing in 10th position.

Delaware, whose 7-0 record includes two wins over major college opponents, plays another major team this week, Rutgers, and closes out the season with Bucknell. Should the Blue Hens win both games, they undoubtedly will become the first eastern team to win national honors. A loss to either team could conceivably drop them from the top. The outcome is entirely up to Delaware.

Pioneers Looking For Bid

PORTLAND (UPI) — Lewis and Clark is one of six teams in contention for three remaining berths in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics football playoffs, the NAIA's top official said Wednesday.

Al Duer, executive secretary-treasurer, said at Kansas City, Mo., that the teams will be selected Nov. 24.

The NAIA named St. John's of Minnesota to one of the berths Tuesday. Northern Illinois, top-ranked in the NAIA poll, took itself out of contention Wednesday by accepting a bid to the Mineral Water Bowl at Excelsior Springs, Mo., Nov. 30.

The teams still being considered, in addition to Lewis and Clark, are College of Emporia (Kan.), Kearney (Neb.) State, Northeast Oklahoma State, Prairie View and Southwest Texas State. All but Kearney State have at least one game remaining.

Lewis and Clark completed a perfect eight-game season last weekend.

The two finalists in the NAIA playoffs meet in the Camelia Bowl at Sacramento, Dec. 14.

Owl Duo Honored

PORTLAND (UPI) — Offensive and defensive standouts shared Lineman of the Week honors in the Oregon Collegiate Conference today with the selection of Oregon Tech's Vic Ventura and Portland State's Gary Kmetec.

Freshman quarterback Mike Glines of Oregon Tech was voted Back of the Week by conference coaches.

Ventura caught 9 passes for 185 yards in a 13-7 loss to Southern Utah last weekend.

Kmetec, a linebacker, was a defensive standout in his team's 14-7 loss to Linfield.

Glines completed 15 of 32 passes for 273 yards.

Bob Battle of OTI leads the league in rushing with 647 yards, but SOC's Mike Hood has a chance to pass him this week end. Hood has 573 yards. Bill Bailey of SOC appears to have the passing title wrapped up with 87 completions in 169 attempts for 888 yards.

King Leads Bowl Test

These are two of the younger aspirants for starting berths, with experience coming from senior backcourt man Lanny Guyer, who stands 5-8.

Other juniors showing well have been 6-2 John Jendrzewski, Steve Baker, standing 6-2, Jim Patzke at 6-1 and Jim Drew at 3-11.

Sure to see action will be 6-6 Gene Kingsbury, a transfer from Fall River, who gives the Pels additional needed board strength.

Offense has been the principal target in practices thus far, with defense to receive the majority of the work bearing the end of the week.

With the two big men in the Pelican camp, Keck has been experimenting with a double post offense, however, he quickly offers, "I really don't know if we'll be able to use this offense. We're only looking at it as a possibility."

It would be Ash and Kingsbury at the double post if the Pels went to this type of offense.

In offensive pattern workouts this week, Ash has shown the better moves of the two, with Kingsbury looking good on rebounds and tips.

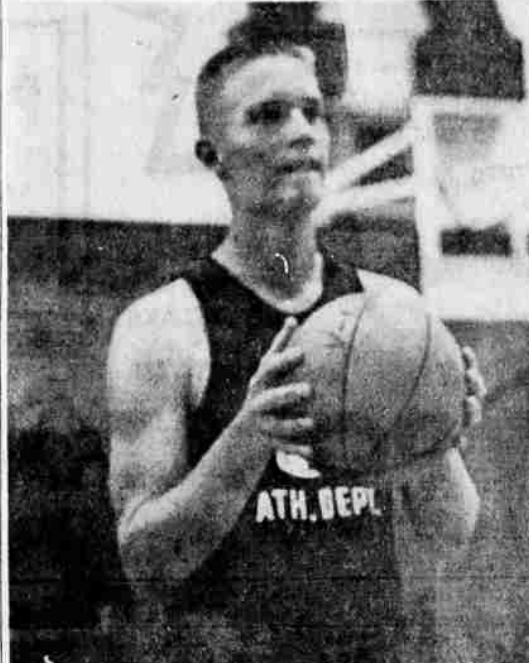
