

# TV Dropping Of Fray Brings Loud Charges

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — The decision of a broadcasting network and former sponsors to drop the annual telecast of the Blue-Gray football game because Negro players were barred was termed "tragic and irresponsible" by Gov. George Wallace Wednesday.

Wallace said the persons "who pressured and intimidated" the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) and the game's sponsors into dropping the bowl game "hurt all races, especially the Negro race."

During the 26-year history of the bowl classic, proceeds of the game between North and South All-Stars have gone to a program of the local Lions Club set up to help blind and needy children. Lions Club President Harris Dawson said the funds are distributed "without regard to race, color or creed."

Bowl officials were notified last week by the network the game would not be televised this year because Negro players were not invited to participate. The network had carried the game annually since 1934.

Chrysler Corporation and the Gillette company sponsored the broadcast.

Wallace said in a prepared statement, "those who pressured and intimidated the sponsors and the network have, as they always do, hurt all races, especially the Negro race, with this petty attempt to satisfy their own selfish motives."

"The receipts from the game are used for charitable purposes, including sight conservation, and almost 60 per cent of the people who received eye care under this program last year were Negroes. Children in the first grades of 35 Negro schools and 24 white schools had eye tests paid for by proceeds from the game," Wallace said.

Dawson said "it is a fair assumption that the ban resulted from pressure applied either to NBC or game sponsors by Negro organizations."

Allyn McKeen, general manager of the Blue-Gray Association, said "we are trying to find out just what is behind it—where the pressure that caused the cancellation came from."

He said negotiations were under way to get NBC's permission for a regional telecast. Under a contract which expires in 1966, NBC may determine whether or not the game is televised or broadcast.

McKeen added Don Faurot, athletic director at the University of Missouri and recruiter of the northern squad, assured him the ban was not hampering efforts to line up the North team.

# 'Coach Stilt' Makes Decision: Feed Chamberlain To Win Game

With Coach Wilt directing signals, player Wilt went on to score 19 points in the second period, 13 in the third and 14 in the fourth for a game-total of 49 Wednesday night that lifted the Warriors to a 98-92 victory. It was a complete turnaround from Wilt's early games this season during which he was acted with more emphasis on play-making than in his four previous seasons in the National Basketball Association.

"I told 'em what I thought would go," said the 7-foot, 1-inch Chamberlain after the game. "And I got their cooperation."

Playmaker Guy Rodgers said it more succinctly: "We knew where our bread and butter was — and that's where we went."

Rodgers' steal and layup gave the Warriors a 91-90 lead with 4:28 left and then Chamberlain's rebounding kept them ahead the rest of the way. Robertson wound up as the Royals' high scorer with 28 points.

The Boston Celtics defeated the Los Angeles Lakers, 114-110, and the New York Knickerbockers beat the St. Louis Hawks, 106-102, in a double-header that drew 18,137 to New York's Madison Square Garden. The crowd was the largest Garden basketball crowd since Nov. 11, 1960.

Tom Heinsohn scored 31 points and Sam Jones had 16 for the Celtics, who scored their 10th win in 11 games, while Jerry West had 35 for the Lakers. Billy McGill, acquired two weeks ago from the Baltimore Bullets, scored 23 points to lead the Knicks, who held Bob Pettit to a 4-for-21 shooting night and only 13 points.

Wilt Chamberlain, thrust unexpectedly into the role of coach, viewed the San Francisco Warriors' state of affairs and made a firm decision.

The Warriors trailed, 29-19, at the end of the first period, Coach Alex Hannum was banished to the dressing room and the Cincinnati Royals' Jerry Lucas and Oscar Robertson were running wild.

Coach Chamberlain decided that the Warriors' best bet was to feed the ball to player Chamberlain.

# NBA Metes Record Fine For Baltimore Move

BALTIMORE (UPI) — The owners of the Baltimore Bullets readily admitted today that haste makes waste. It also costs money.

The Bullets were fined \$5,000 Wednesday by the Board of Governors of the National Basketball Association for failing to ask league permission to move their franchise from Chicago at the end of the 1962-63 season.

It was the largest fine ever assessed by the NBA, and it was paid immediately by Munya Goldman, executive vice president of the Bullets, to league President Walter Kennedy.

Goldman conceded that the fine was "fair," and then proceeded to explain why.

"Our transfer to Baltimore was in violation of an agreement with the NBA," he said in a prepared statement. "It called for us to stay in Chicago a minimum of three years when the new franchise was issued (prior to the 1961-62 season)."

"We were so anxious to make the move to Baltimore that we made the lease and contractual agreements... before we got the final approval of the NBA Board of Governors for the transfer of the Chicago franchise."

The announcement of the fine was made in New York by Kennedy following a meeting of the Board of Governors.

The Bullets originally were fined \$25,000 but it was reduced to \$5,000 following a review requested by Goldman.

During its two seasons in Chicago, the club did poorly, both at the gate and in the standings, winning only 25 of 80 games last season. The switch to Baltimore hasn't worked any miracles. The Bullets remain at the bottom of the NBA's Western Division with a 3-7 record.

# Portland Overtime Victor

Seattle's Guyle Fielder has passed another milestone in his record-breaking trip through the Western Hockey League.

Fielder, who has spent 10 of his 14 years in pro hockey at Seattle, had a couple of assists Wednesday night to pass the 800 mark in WHL play.

The 5-foot-9 star has led the WHL for seven seasons in assists and in total points (for goals and assists) on six occasions. His 95 assists in the 1958-59 season is the league mark, as is his 122 points in the 1956-57 campaign.

His play Wednesday night helped Seattle tie Los Angeles 4-4. That's all it took for the Totems to grab undisputed first place in the WHL because San Francisco dropped a 5-3 decision at Denver. Portland moved into a tie for fourth only four points behind Seattle by slugging out a 5-4 overtime win over Vancouver.

It was 2-2 after two periods at Los Angeles, when Bev Bell hit a quick goal for Seattle. But Bruce Carmichael and Camille Bedard fired goals just 10 seconds apart to put the Blades back on top.

# Dunsmuir Man Bags Largest Black Bear

DUNSMUIR — A 527-pound male black bear, believed to be the largest ever killed in California, was shot Sunday afternoon about 15 miles southwest of here by Ruben Dominguez of Dunsmuir.

According to Fish and Game Department records available this tops the previous record by 29 pounds.

Dominguez is an experienced bear hunter having shot at least one every year since his first kill when he was 13.

He had the bear weighed officially before sending it to Redding for mounting by a taxidermist.

Dominguez said he was hunting on the north fork of Castle Creek, behind Castle Crags, on Sunday afternoon when the huge bear ambled down the trail toward him.

"He was just about 20 feet away when I first saw him," Dominguez explained. "There was no time for a select shot. I just aimed at the biggest thing in sight, his head."

On Sunday's hunt the biggest problem was getting the bear down trail to the dirt road about a half mile away.

For bear hunts he wears a Army surplus camouflage suits which he washes in special soap to avoid human scent. He also wears soft soled shoes because next to his sense of smell, a bear's ears are his best defense.

Dominguez does not believe in using dogs for bear hunting. He says harrasing game is not sporting and that meat from an exhausted, tormented bear makes poor eating. He also feels it unnecessarily cruel to dogs.

His last year's kill, a 379-pound bear has been mounted for display in a proposed museum and park just south of Dunsmuir.

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
