

New Weapon Offered Members Of Arnie's Army By Leader

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Arnie Palmer would like nothing better than to equip every member of "Arnie's Army" with the appropriate weapon — a golf club manufactured by their "leader."

And the fairway wizard from nearby Latrobe, Pa., already has made a move in that direction.

A golf club tinkerer from 'way back, Arnie now heads up a company in Chattanooga, Tenn., which manufactures golfing equipment bearing his name.

"I've always wanted to manufacture golf clubs and now my dream has been realized," Palmer said from his home in Latrobe. "Ever since I was a kid I've been interested in repairing and designing clubs. I've spent hours down in the basement perfecting the clubs which I think were best for the game."

Just Resting Up
As for his mass production venture, Arnie disclosed that about 200 workers and 17 salesmen are currently employed at the Chattanooga plant.

"Our clubs are plain, solid-looking equipment," he said. "There is a better weight distribution and I think this will make hitting the ball a lot easier. We are putting the weight where the 'sweet' spot of the club is and in a wider area."

In his spare moments these days Palmer is resting up for his scheduled return to the pro tour early in January when he will play in the Los Angeles Open. A few weeks later he plans to participate in the Bing Crosby Invitational, also on the West Coast.

Arnie has had varied commercial interests before his current project represents his first venture into the manufacturing end of the business.

"I've spent a lot of time at the factory, consulting with the designers and offering them my ideas," he said. "Our products will be sold only at pro shops throughout the country."

But the first set of clubs off the Palmer production line were saved for a "special account." They went to Arnie's father, M. J. (Deacon) Palmer, the man who taught Arnie the rudiments of the game and encouraged his progress.

Know what the elder Palmer's response was?
"I guess this makes up for all the clubs I gave you when you were a kid."

Trial Due Basketball Fray Fixer

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UPI) — Frank Larry Rosenthal of Miami, Fla., will stand trial in Superior Court Dec. 9 on charges he tried to rig a basketball game here in 1960.

Rosenthal was ordered to appear in court on that date Friday by Judge Francis O. Clark.

Rosenthal and David Budin of New York are accused of trying to bribe Ray Paprocky, a former New York University basketball star, before the NYU-West Virginia game played here during the 1960 regional NCAA tournament.

They also are accused of attempting to bribe Paprocky in the NYU-Ohio State game in the national NCAA finals.

A trial date for Budin has not been set.

Purdue Sputters To Victory Over Gophers

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (UPI) — Purdue's inept ground game, helped along by Minnesota fumbles and erratic field goal kicking sputtered to a 13-11 Big Ten football triumph over the Gophers before nearly 39,000 fans Saturday.

The victory snatched a two-game losing strangle for the Boilermakers giving them a 4-4 season record while Minnesota absorbed its sixth loss, third in a row against two victories.

All the scoring occurred during the first half and Purdue got its two touchdowns in the initial period, then hung in for its narrow victory as fullback Mick Reid missed four field goal attempts.

Gordon Teter, a safety man, electrified the crowd in 56-degree weather, when he returned a kickoff 88 yards for Purdue's first score, after Reid booted a 33-yard field goal to give the Gophers a 3-0 lead in the opening minutes.

Then Nat Jackson fell on Larry Peterson's fumble, one of three bobbles by the Gophers Saturday, on the Minnesota 47 and Purdue scored again in nine plays.

Quarterback Ron Di Gravo set the score up with a 10-yard pass to Gene Donaldson and his 19-yard run on the one yard line. Di Gravo then plunged for the score.

NFL Head Says No Playoff

DETROIT (UPI) — National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle made it obvious Friday that his league has no plans in the near future for staging a playoff game with the American Football League.

"We have no plans for any games at all with the other league," Rozelle said at a luncheon in Detroit Friday.

He added with a smile, "I remember receiving a telegram from San Diego Coach Sid Gillman in which he said, 'Pope John was a great man. He recognized the other league.'"

"Well, I answered him, true, but it took 2,000 years," Rozelle also indicated that Detroit Lion all-pro suspended tackle Alex Karras may have trouble getting reinstated next season.

Rozelle suspended Karras and Green Bay halfback Paul Hornung indefinitely last April 11 and said he will not review their cases until next January.

When asked about their cases, Rozelle said, "I would say that they must develop an awareness of the problems that brought on the present situation for them and the league."

"Then they must act independently and take steps to eliminate these problems."

Vaunted Chicago Bears' Defense Receives Test

Now it comes out: That famed Chicago Bear defense is a product of selective thievery.

The Bears, who admittedly owe their current success to the defensive crew, best in the National Football League, have built their defenses up by sampling the best from three other teams, a Bears player said Saturday.

"We took the Packers' defense, the Giants' defense and the Eagles' defense, put them all together and kept the best parts of each," he said. "As a result, we have simplified defenses which are easy to work."

The defense, as well as the offense, rested Saturday, and there was nothing left to do about Sunday's game with the Green Bay Packers except play it.

Day's Top Game
The Bears-Packers clash overshadowed all other games on Sunday's NFL program, including an important Eastern Division meeting between the Cleveland Browns and St. Louis Cardinals. The Cards, one game behind the leadlocked Browns and New York Giants, need a victory to stay alive in the race.

Cochran Blanton Collier of the Browns may start Jim Ninowski at quarterback in place of Frank Ryan, whose performance in recent games has not measured up to his brilliant season start. The Browns, who have lost two of their last three games, are favored by 7½ points for the game at Cleveland.

In Sunday's other games, the Giants are at home against the San Francisco Forty Niners; the Pittsburgh Steelers play the Redskins at Washington; the Detroit Lions are host to the Los Angeles Rams; the Cowboys play the Philadelphia Eagles at Dallas, and the Baltimore Colts take on the Vikings at Minnesota.

Similar Records
The Bears and the Packers each have 8-1 records. Sunday's winner will gain sole possession of the Western Division lead and become a choice to represent the division in the championship clash with the Eastern Division winner.

Sunday's loser is almost certain to wind up with a consolation prize of winding up in Miami's Jan. 5 Runner-up Bowl game between the second-place teams from the East and West.

The Bears and Packers lead the Detroit Lions and Baltimore Colts by four games with only four left after Sunday. Each needs only two victories for a sure second-place finish.

As great as the Chicago defense is, it will have to pass its toughest test of the campaign against the Packers, who will be in no mood to lose twice to the same team in one season.

The Bears held Green Bay to three points in winning the first game. They have blanked one team this season and kept three from scoring a touchdown. In all, they have permitted an NFL low of 10 touchdowns, three on foot and seven by passing.

Chicago's defense has intercepted 23 passes, four of them against the Packers. The Packers have intercepted 19, second best in the league.

Ohio State Tripped By Wildcat Attack

COLUMBUS (UPI) — Northwestern flushed a surprise ground attack against Ohio State Saturday for a 17-8 victory that knocked the Buckeyes out of the Big Ten football title race.

The Wildcats, with quarterback Tommy Myers and substitute fullback Steve Murphy leading the way, jolted the Buckeyes with a 10-point second period and clinched it with another touchdown in the fourth period set up on a pass interception.

It was a coach word for Ohio State and Coach Woody Hayes in more ways than one. An airplane circled overhead bearing a trailer reading "Goodbye Woody" as the Bucks went down to their worst season since 1959.

Ohio now has four victories, three losses and a tie as it goes into its final game against Michigan at Ann Arbor next Saturday.

Myers, mixing the Northwestern offense with the touch of a magician, set up the Wildcats' field goal and first touchdown drive with his passes and then settled down to a running game in the second half before 83,988 fans.

Murphy, 201-pound junior from Peoria, scored both Northwestern touchdowns. He ran 16 yards on a draw play when Myers had the Buckeyes looking for a pass with 2:08 left in the first half and smashed over from eight yards out in the final period with the clincher.

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Quarterback Bob Grim ran 65 yards and passed 22 yards to Greg Hartman for touchdowns to lead the Oregon State Rooks to a 27-0 football win over the Oregon Ducks Friday.

Quarterback Paul Brothers passed 24 yards to Hartman and fullback Mike Shinn plunged 1 yard for Oregon State's other scores.

The Rooks rolled up a 14-6 edge in first downs and a 546-45 margin in total yardage.

The decision completed the teams' seasons with 3-1 records. Oregon edged Oregon State 8-6 in an earlier game.

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Using oxygen and a hot driver, Al Balding, the Canadian PGA champion, went into the third round of the \$16,000 Mexican Open Saturday two strokes up on Juan Neri de Mexico.

"The altitude of 5,000 feet has to be taken into consideration on every shot made here," Balding explained. "That ball really travels. My driving kept me in there yesterday. I also used oxygen, which proved to be a big help."

The 39-year-old pro shot a 69 Friday.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Anybody looking for a crackling outfielder? Jackie Jensen, who retired from the game a couple of years ago while still a comparative youngster, has his weight down to the point where he looks like a slender Ted Williams.

"But it just came off from hard work," he says. "I'm not trying to get into shape for baseball."

Jensen now weighs only 185 pounds — compared with his normal weight as a football and baseball star of 197. He is working in the "hero" category up in the cold country.
