Formosa Raps Thant Remarks

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI)—Nationalist China Friday rebuked United Nations Secretary General Thant for remarks he made recently concerning possible recognition of Red China. Foreign Ministry spokesman Patrick Pichli Sun said "The Chinese Communist regime stands condemned by the United Nations as an aggressor" and "the secretary general has no right to make any statement that is contrary to the purposes, principles and policies of the United Nations."

In a speech in New York Monday, Thant questioned whether the world body could continue to ignore Communist China indefinitely.

"It is not clear what U Thant meant by the word 'ignore,' the Nationalist Foreign Ministry spokesman said.

Housekeeping Occupations Subject Of Board Meeting

SALEM—The second meeting of a conference board on revision of state employment regulations in public housekeeping occupations will be held Tuesday, Nov. 19, in Portland. Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen states the meeting is open to all interested persons. It is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the Bureau of Labor's conference room 408, State Office Building.

The conference board was appointed by the Wage and Hour Commission to review regulations applying to women and minors employed in hotels, restaurants, motels, taverns, clubs, boarding houses and similar establishments.

Proposals of a \$1.25 wage floor for the industry's women employees and \$1.15 for minors was made by the board's labor representatives at an October meeting. A maximum 40-hour, eight-hour day, five-day week also was proposed. No vote was taken upon the proposals. The board will hear further discussions on minimum wage and work time standards. It also is expected to take up employees reporting pay when work does not materialize, meal and rest periods and other working conditions.

Mrs. Gertrude Hour Fariss of Portland serves as chairman of the nine-member board which has equal representation of employer, employee and public representatives. Revisions recommended by the board must be approved by the Commission and given a public hearing before becoming effective under the Oregon Wage and Hour Law.

Prof. Jerome J. Kesselman of Denver will address the group on the subject of depreciation. Speaking on the tax effects of mortgages will be George F. Kratz, instructor in income tax accounting at Golden Gate University, San Francisco.

Speakers include two Seattle tax attorneys Woolvin Patten, former assistant regional counsel for the Internal Revenue Service, and Allen A. Bowden, former special assistant to U.S. Attorney General, tax division. Patten will speak on "Whither Tax Revision," and Bowden on travel and entertainment expense as a business deduction.

Portland tax attorneys who will address the conference include John Foulkes Jones, Leo Meyring and Donald H. Burnett. Jones will speak on pensions and profit sharing. Meyring on buy and sell agreements. Burnett, until recently an assistant attorney general assigned to the Oregon State Tax Commission in Salem, will cover the Oregon state tax picture as it appears at that time.

Serving under OAPA President Helen Feuerstein as general chairman of the Oregon Tax Conference is Ray Lesley, Portland P.A.

The conference opens with a banquet Thursday evening and ends Saturday noon.

Ann Favors Clucks Over Clicks

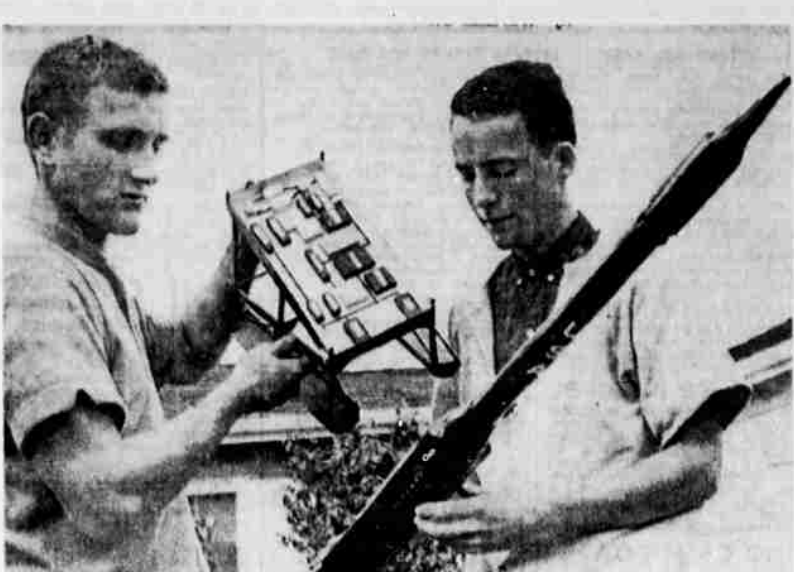

THE DOCTOR SAYS Clearing Up Itchy, Cracked Hands

Q — I have had "detergent hands" for over a year. They itch a lot, then they blister and crack. I have to have them in water a lot and rubber gloves seem to make them worse. What can I do?

A — This condition has been getting a lot of attention lately. It is usually a chemical irritation and not an allergy. When you wear ordinary rubber gloves, your hands become soaked in their own sweat. This is the reason the gloves can make things worse. However, rubber gloves that are lined with cotton are available. You should use these whenever your hands would otherwise come in contact with the strong detergents used for washing clothes, dishes, walls or floors. Above all, do not use these strong chemicals to wash your hands.

When you must expose your hands to strong detergents you may prefer to rub a thin layer of petroleum jelly on them rather than wear gloves. To wash your hands use one of the non-alkaline (neutral or slightly alkaline) soaps now available. Alkaline soaps remove the protective oils in your skin and cause excessive drying. This leads to itching and cracking. Avoid washing your hands frequently and dry them by patting with soft disposable tissue rather than rubbing with a rough towel. With these measures your hands won't clear up overnight but they should show a marked improvement in 10 days.

Q — I am using saccharine tablets to skip a beat? Is this serious?

A — The tablets are not the cause of your skipped beats. The skipped beats are harmless. You should first learn to accept them as a minor annoyance, then to ignore them.

Q — What causes swelling of the legs in people with heart disease?

A — Persons with leaky heart valves, congenital or resulting from rheumatic fever, eventually reach the point where much of the blood which should be forced into the aorta slips back-

ward with each beat. This damping back of blood is called compensation. When it occurs, it chiefly affects the most dependent parts of the body. This would cause edema or waterlogging of the ankles in a person who is standing or sitting in a chair but in a person who is lying in bed the edema would be most noticeable around the hips. It might also involve the internal organs. Appropriate doses of digitalis strengthen the heart beat and give partial relief.

Fund Plan Hits Snag

PORTLAND (UPI)—A routine application for a solicitation permit turned into a hot potato at City Hall Thursday.

Acting Mayor Ormond R. Bean halted proceedings on a permit application by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People after two men at the hearing protested granting the organization permission to solicit funds through a sale of special Christmas seals.

Bean said he also had received telephone calls requesting that the matter be referred back to the solicitations committee for further investigation. He did not identify the callers.

The two men who objected at the hearing were Dale J. Benjamin and Sylvester P. Ehrhart, both of Portland.

Benjamin said he could if necessary, fill the council chamber "to overflowing" with people opposed to the NAACP request.

Mayfield K. Webb, head of the Portland chapter of the NAACP, characterized the opposition in the council session Thursday by saying, "It appears someone wants to choke us off."
