In satisfactory condition at the Klamath Valley Hospital today is Lindy Ray Rogers, 38. who sustained bruises, cuts and a rib injury when he was beaten unconscious and robbed of his billfold containing \$3 in payment for his attempt to be good Samaritan.

Rogers told police that he was en route to Chiloquin from Klamath Falls early Sunday morning when he was hailed near Wocus by a motorist whose car had apparently stalled

Police records indicate that Rogers stopped his car on the edge of the road and then was forcibly removed from his vehicle by the man who flagged him for assistance. Rogers' assailant then summoned two companions from the stalled car and the three men beat the

Rogers regained consciousness later the same day and discovered that he had been relieved of his billfold and his car had been ransacked.

He described the man who hailed him as about 20 or 25 years old, 5'9" tall, 150 pounds. with dark hair combed in a ducktail. The car of his assailant was a light green, 1955 Mercury. Anyone having informa-


