'Rebels' Try To Block RR Merger

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A fight was underway today by dissident shareholders and directors of Western Pacific Railroad to block merger of the line with the Santa Fe Railway.

The group, which includes three of the 16 directors, hopes to keep the 1,193-mile San Francisco-to-Salt Lake City line independent. The WP board majority has voted to support Santa Fe's application to the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to acquire stock control of WP.

The "rebels" maintain that the railroad is solvent and as such should continue to operate independently. Both Santa Fe and Southern Pacific applied to the ICC to acquire the WP. An ICC commissioner recommended on Sept. 10 that Santa Fe be authorized to acquire WP through a common stock exchange. The full commission has yet to rule on the case.

Monday, the "rebels" vowed they would fight the board down to the last vote in an effort to keep WP independent. The group announced that as soon as filing can be made with the Securities Exchange Commission, it will solicit proxies in opposition to management's position.

AFL-CIO Snubs Longshoremen, Teamsters

NEW YORK (UPI)—The AFL-CIO Tuesday refused to consider readmission of the Teamsters and International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's (ILWU) Unions unless they clean out alleged corruption and communism, respectively, in their ranks.

Before the biennial convention took a vote on a resolution concerning the readmission, AFL-CIO President George Meany took issue with a charge by National Maritime Union President Joseph Curran that the federation has kept the Teamsters Union out because of a difference in personalities.

The Teamsters, headed by James Hoffa, was ousted from the AFL-CIO on charges of corruption. The ILWU, headed by Harry Bridges, was expelled for alleged Communist leanings. Neither union has applied for readmission to the federation.

Curran sent a message which said the AFL-CIO had taken "the flat position that as long as James Hoffa is president of the Teamsters Union" the union will be given no consideration by the federation. He said this was "double standard treatment" based on personality.

Meany told the convention that there was no truth in the

charges that there was something personal between him and Hoffa. Meany said he doesn't know and hasn't had any association with him.

"What I know about him comes from the record," Meany said.

Three resolutions concerning readmission for the two unions were originally offered by the convention. One for the ILWU was offered by the International Woodworkers of America. Two others for the readmission of the Teamsters were submitted

by the Woodworkers, the Journeymen Stonecutters Association and the Building and Construction Trades Department of the AFL-CIO.

But the resolution which was voted upon was a substitute one offered to the convention by the resolutions subcommittee of the federation. It said the readmission of the unions should be considered only if the two unions have cleaned up their ranks. The resolution, the same one passed in 1961, was passed by the delegates.

Earlier, the national commander of the American Legion told the convention that the United States could not sit idly by while the Soviet Union is showing signs of weakness.

Fact Sheet Describes Efforts Of Red Cross

DUNSMUIR — Increased awareness of the local role of the American Red Cross is the objective of a Red Cross fact sheet being circulated in Dunsmuir by the Siskiyou County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

"Because much of the work is done without publicity to individuals involved or without fanfare, it is hard to publicize Red Cross work," Charles O'Donnell, Siskiyou County Red Cross director, said.

Water safety programs which involve over 600 Siskiyou County children each year and first aid courses which are required for school bus and ambulance drivers are part of the Red Cross work, O'Donnell pointed out.

O'Donnell concluded that while the major aim of the Red Cross is alleviation of suffering and distress in disasters, Siskiyou County has received more financial aid through the years than it has contributed. Disaster relief for fire and flood damage in the county in 1955 totaled more than \$150,000, and

this exceeded the county's national contribution for the past 30 years.

Mrs. Harold Walsh assisted O'Donnell and Floyd Dill, Siskiyou County Red Cross chairman, in preparation of the fact sheet which has been sent to local clubs and organizations.
