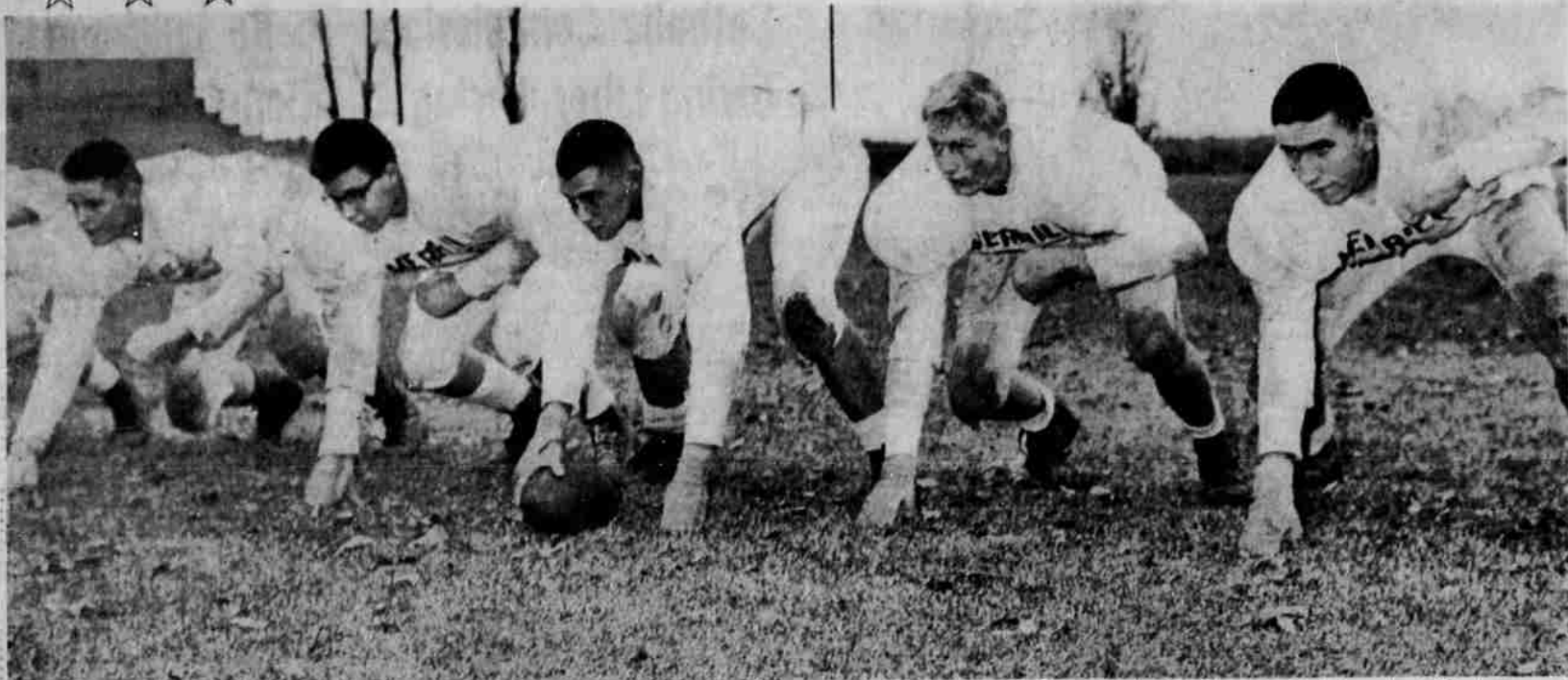




THE HEART OF THE OFFENSIVE MACHINE

Oregon Ducks Seeking First Victory Over Beavers Since 1958; Coach Prothro Installs Gate Guards

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon will be seeking its first victory over Oregon State since 1958 when the traditional rivals meet here Saturday in the final game of the season. The Beavers won 20-17 last year, 6-2 in 1961 and 15-7 in 1959. The 1960 game ended in a 14-14 tie. The Ducks have been made a 5-point favorite on the strength of a 6-3 season record and last weekend's come-from-behind 28-

22 victory over Indiana. Oregon State has a 5-4 record after losing by an identical 28-22 score to Southern California last Friday night. Oregon's main job will be stopping the pass combination of Gordon Queen to Vern Burke. Queen leads the nation in touchdown passes this year with 16, and Burke has caught 9 of them. Burke, who led the nation with 69 catches a year ago, has 42 and is in second place

this year. The Ducks have their own explosive offense in Quarterback Bob Berry, who has thrown for 14 touchdowns, and All-America halfback Mel Renfro, along with halfbacks Larry Hill and H. D. Murphy, the hero of the Indiana game. Murphy caught a Berry pass for the winning touchdown with 11 seconds to play. The Webfoots continue to improve physically after taking a

beating from Washington in mid-season. The only casualties of the Indiana game were guard Mark Richards, who sprained an ankle, and end and kicker Buck Corey, who has a bruised elbow to go with a bruised back he suffered earlier. Both may play Saturday, however. At Corvallis, Beaver coach

Tom Prothro has had guards around his practice field all week and won't discuss the physical condition of his squad. The Beavers suffered several

injuries in the Southern California game and guard Al Funston will miss the Oregon encounter.

Battle Misses By Yard; Ventura Tops Receivers

PORTLAND (UPI)—Portland State fullback Andy Berkis won the Oregon Collegiate Conference rushing title by one yard on his last carry of the season, league statistics showed today. Berkis gained 133 yards against the Seattle Ramblers Saturday for a total of 648 yards on 134 carries for a 4.8 average. Oregon Tech's Bob Battle, who played the same number of games but finished a week earlier, had 647 yards on 169 carries for a 3.9 average. The passing title went to Southern Oregon freshman Bill

Bailey, who completed 97 of 198 for 1,026 yards and 7 touchdowns. Mike Schrunck of Portland State led in passing yardage with 1,058 on 66 completions and had 13 scoring passes. Freshman Vic Ventura of Oregon Tech led in pass receptions with 94 for 533 yards and 2 touchdowns. Jim Hollingsworth of Portland State caught 30, but they went for 564 yards and 10 scores. Doug Olsen of Southern Oregon won the scoring title with 8 touchdowns and 25 extra points for 73 points, and Keith Farrell of Portland State was the leading punter with 30 for a 34.6 average. Berkis was voted the conference Back of the Week and tackle Glen Moses of SOC won the Lineman of the Week award for his play despite a 32-0 loss to Santa Clara.

CELLAR-DWELLERS MEET

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y. (UPI)—The Washington Senators will play the New York Mets in the annual Hall of Fame baseball game here July 27, 1964. The game between the American and National League cellar-dwellers will help mark the 25th anniversary of the Hall of Fame.

It was disclosed Wednesday that Questad, a 20-year-old junior, had been suspended from school for a full year as a result of a prank in which he set off a burglar alarm attached to a hi-fi set. Extended Seasons Set Last Chances For Deer

Deer hunters holding unit permits for the Baker, Lookout Mountain, Catherine Creek, Fort Rock, McKenzie, Metolius, Paulina, and Wasco big game management units will get their last crack at deer this year when several extended hunts get under way this month. In all cases, an unused deer tag and unit permit are necessary to be eligible to hunt during the extended seasons. In northeastern Oregon, three holders. These include the Elkhorn Area for Baker permit holders, with the season scheduled Nov. 30 through Dec. 8; the Durkee hunt for Lookout Mountain permit holders, with the season also scheduled Nov. 30 through Dec. 8; and the Medical Springs area for Catherine Creek permit holders, with this season scheduled next month, Dec. 14-22. Permit holders in these areas must hunt for antlerless deer only. Four hunts are on tap in central Oregon. Fort Rock permit holders will get one last chance this weekend, Nov. 23-24, on the Fort Rock Winter Range area. Antlerless deer only may be taken. The Metolius Winter Range will also have a short season, Nov. 23-24, available to Metolius unit permit holders. Antlerless deer only may be taken. Paulina unit per-

mit holders will have the Paulina Winter Range for a week-end hunt, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, and may take antlerless deer only.
