

Top Money Makers Tee Off In Cajun Classic; Jack Nicklaus Favored Over Defending Champ

LAFAYETTE, La. (UPI) — Ten of the top money winners on the professional golf circuit tee off today in the \$22,500 Cajun Classic golf tournament.

The favorite is big Jack Nicklaus, who is seeking another \$1,010 to make him the second man in history to win \$100,000

in one year on the professional golf tour. Arnold Palmer is the only man to do so up until now.

Defending champion in the tournament is John Barnum of Columbus, Ohio. Barnum set a tournament record and a course record last year when he turned in a four round total

of 270 and a third round 63 at Oakbourne country club.

The course is 6,700 yards, par 72 layout that favors long hitters like Nicklaus.

All four previous winners in the tournament will compete this year. Besides Barnum they are Doug Sanders and Jay and

Lionel Hebert, the golfing brothers from Lafayette.

Officials of the tournament announced Wednesday that the purse this week was hiked from \$17,500 to \$22,500.

Cage Show Due Soon

ALTURAS—The seventh annual Modoc Union High School holiday basketball tournament will feature 14 teams vying for varsity and junior varsity honors Dec. 13-14 in Alturas. It was announced this week by tournament director Wally Griswold.

Varsity teams slated to appear are Modoc, Lassen, Herlong, Hayfork, Trinity, Fall River, Big Valley and Surprise Valley. Junior varsity teams entered are Modoc, Lassen, Hayfork, Fall River, Big Valley and Surprise Valley.

For the first time in more than 30 years, Modoc will return to a varsity and junior varsity classification of players. Coaches are hopeful that this will produce a higher caliber brand of basketball and at the same time allow more player participation. Class C competition will continue at the school.

"We think you'll see a better, more enthusiastic brand of basketball at the school this year," Griswold stated.

Another change this year will see coach Bob Ciele installed as the varsity head replacing coach Ed Carver who will take over the junior varsity team.

Prior to the tournament, the Braves will warm up in non-league play with McCloud on Dec. 6 and with Herlong Dec. 7.

Hank Iba Watches As Shockers Appear Top Team In Midlands

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Watch out for Wichita.

That's the new warning being sounded by basketball coaches throughout the Midlands before the season even opens.

Even Cincinnati Coach Ed Jucker, whose teams have dominated the Midlands since 1958, agreed that the reign of his potent Bearcats apparently ended when they lost their bid for a third consecutive NCAA championship last March to Loyola of Chicago.

"Wichita should lead the whole parade in the Midlands now," said Jucker.

Whether Wichita can rule the Midlands with the iron hand that Cincinnati wielded is yet to be determined. But coaches in both the Missouri Valley and the Big Eight conferences, during a recent meeting here, agreed that Wichita is the team to beat.

In the Big Eight Conference, the coaches indicated they are most concerned about the potential of Kansas State and Oklahoma State.

Eyes On Wichita
But the eyes of the Midlands coaches are on Wichita as a team and on 6-foot-7 Dave Stallworth as an individual. Stallworth is the lad who led Wichita to a 19-8 record last season, good for sixth place in the final 1963 national rating, and to two stunning upsets—over no lesser teams than Loyola of Chicago and Cincinnati.

Wichita loses only center Wayne Durham next season, although guards Leonard Kelley and Ernie Moore will be available for only one semester each.

Cincinnati, on the other hand, loses Tom Thacker, his fellow playmaker Tony Yates, and Larry Shingleton. Bonham and 6-foot-8 center George Wilson will be back, however, and Jucker has a strong crop of sophomores.

The Big Eight coaches saw no particular favorite in their league, which they feel will be stronger.

But Oklahoma State Coach Hank Iba sounded a warning of his own.

"We have a lot of potential," he believes. "This is the best squad we've had since we entered the league."

Top Scorers Return
Oklahoma State returns its top four scorers, including All-Conference guard Larry Hawk, from the team that posted a 16-9 record last season.

Kansas State and Colorado, which currently share the Big Eight championship, both have All-Conference players return-

ing. But Colorado, the nation's ninth-ranked team in 1963, lost Big Eight player-of-the-year Ken Charlton.

Colorado still has Jim Davis, another All-Conference selection and Kansas State has All-Conference Willie Murrell. Both are forwards.

Tex Wimer of Kansas State, Dick Harp of Kansas and Bob Vanatta of Missouri said their

teams would be improved this year. The only teams that appeared to be out of the running were Iowa State, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

The strongest independent in the Midlands was expected to be Oklahoma City University, as usual. Coach Abe Lemnos will have back the core of his 1962-63 edition, which finished the season with a 19-10 record.
