

Computer May Eliminate St. Paul As Author Of Nine Of 14 Epistles

CHICAGO (UPI) — A Scottish minister-mathematician described Thursday how a computer may eliminate St. Paul, the soldier-turned-apostle, as author of nine of the 14 epistles attributed to him in the New Testament.

A Roman Catholic theology professor said that "absolutely no conflict exists" between the computer findings of the Rev. Angus Q. Morton, minister of the Church of Scotland at Culross, and the position of the Roman Catholic Church.

The Rev. Mr. Morton will speak at the University of Chicago Oriental Institute on "The Pauline Epistles: A Scientific Approach," the first in-depth

explanation of his seven-year study. He has said the implications of the study have deep portents to Christianity, especially Roman Catholics.

But the Rev. William T. Cortelyou, C.M., chairman of the De Paul University Theology Department and dean of its graduate school, said the Presbyterian minister's findings "confirm a well-developed opinion and agree with what has been taught by scriptural scholars for quite some time, though this is confirmation from an unexpected source" referring to the computer.

Conservative theologians, however, believe that St. Paul

wrote all of the letters, or epistles, that the Bible credits him with.

The Rev. Mr. Morton was invited to air his views by Prof. Robert M. Grant of the university's divinity school, the only theological school which has asked to hear about the study, according to Morton.

Friday the Rev. Mr. Morton will discuss criticisms some theological school which has about his work in a talk entitled "The New Testament and the Church Fathers in the Computer Age."

He told today how he tested the original Greek of the epistles by sentence length, word pattern, and the occurrence of common words of Greek prose to establish their authorship.

In one of his first articles on the subject, Morton said that his computer tests showed Paul wrote only Romans 1 and 2 Corinthians, Galatians and Philemon. The remaining nine came from "at least five other hands," Morton maintains.

"By applying with the help of our computer, the seven tests of authorship (such as word and sentence length), we discovered that each one gave the same result. Five of the 14 epistles were indistinguishable," he said.

AMA Head Says Medicare Unnecessary, Dangerous

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Dr. Edward R. Annis, president of the American Medical Association (AMA), described the administration's medicare proposal Thursday as "not only unnecessary but also dangerous."

The legislation, now before the House Ways and Means Committee, would provide hospital and nursing home care for all Americans over 65. The money to finance the program would come mainly from higher Social Security taxes.

President Kennedy has said that the nation's oldest need the program to aid them in paying medical expenses.

But Annis, a Miami surgeon, told the committee in prepared testimony today that "the aged who need help in meeting medical bills are receiving it."

The AMA president said "the vast majority of the aged enjoy reasonably good health." He said that those in really poor health are only "relatively few."

Annis charged that payroll taxes would have to be increased by twice as much as supporters of medicare claim. The increase in the administration's bill would amount to one-fourth of 1 per cent paid by workers and employers under Social Security.

Izaak Walton President Raps Commission Stand

SALEM (UPI) — Allen Kelly, president of the Oregon Izaak Walton League, Thursday criticized the State Fish Commission for voicing opposition to the plan to bar the state's inland waters — including the Columbia River — to commercial fishing.

Kelly also is president of Save Our Salmon and Steelhead, Inc., which is spearheading a drive to place the commercial ban fishing measure on the ballot next year.

Kelly praised the State Game Commission for remaining neutral and admonished it to "keep straddling the fence." He said the Izaak Walton League was

not out of character in backing the initiative movement. He said "it is our job to protect the sport fishery. This resource is in jeopardy."

More than 200 persons attended a public hearing on the controversial issue.

At a meeting in September, Fish Commission biologists said eliminating commercial fishing in the inland waters would not benefit the fish population. At that time Game Commission spokesmen refused to take a stand on the issue.

Gov. Mark Hatfield then criticized the Game Commission for not making recommendations. Hatfield said that "our responsibility is clear for the development of information relative to the initiative measure and to make recommendations based upon such information."

Kelly said that promotional material now being circulated by opponents of the initiative, Salmon for All, Inc., declared the Fish Commission had voiced "strong opposition" to the initiative. He said, "We are concerned and deeply disturbed that the Fish Commission's stand is being used by opponents."

Seashore Bill Wins Approval

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Public Lands subcommittee Thursday reported out favorably a bill to establish a national seashore at the Oregon Dunes, Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., said.

The subcommittee version trimmed the boundaries originally called for in her bill.

Mrs. Neuberger said the subcommittee move cleared the way for action Friday by the full Senate Interior Committee. She described Thursday's action as "a favorable omen" for early Senate approval of the new national park unit on the Oregon coast.

The subcommittee decided to establish the southern boundary of the seashore at Tenmile Creek and to move the eastern boundary generally to conform with terms of legislation introduced in the House by Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore.

The new seashore would include Honeyman State Park.

The subcommittee added a provision that would allow the National Park Service to acquire contiguous property outside established boundaries that property owners are willing to sell, and if Congress provides funds.

The park service also would be given authority to acquire scenic easements for 50 feet on both sides of Highway 101.

The Senate Interior Committee was scheduled to meet in executive session Friday morning. If approval is given to the subcommittee's version, the Neuberger measure would then go on the Senate calendar, the Oregon Democrat said.

APPROVES SUBSIDY
WASHINGTON (UPI) — A \$5 million subsidy — \$2 million more than the House approved — was voted by the Senate Wednesday for helicopter service in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

The difference between the House and Senate bill must now be ironed out by compromise conferees.

Cambodia Turns To France

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (UPI)—Cambodia plans to turn to France and not the Communist world to fill the gap left by its refusal of U.S. aid, informed sources said today.

Chief of state Prince Norodom Sihanouk, who asked for an end to the more than \$30 million in U.S. economic and military aid in a series of statements this month, had been feared to be turning toward Communist China.

But the sources said the prince has turned Communist aid "particularly dangerous" and declared Thursday night that "France is the most capable power to represent the Western world in this part of Asia."

of Cambodia's strategic imports and 40 per cent of army salaries, is terminated.

(Communist China warned the United States Thursday it would give Cambodia "all out support" if it is invaded in an action "instigated by the United States and its vassals.")

Makes Plot Charges
Sihanouk, in renouncing U.S. aid, charged that the United States was aiding Cambodian rebels who were plotting to overthrow him. He said the rebels were headquartered in neighboring South Viet Nam.

The sources said the prince has not yet asked France directly for aid, but has made it clear Cambodia would be glad to accept it from France. He is reported to have said that France was the only Western

nation not "practicing an imperialist or neo-colonialist policy in Asia."

The future of the French military advisers in Cambodia was not clear. In his original request for the end of U.S. aid, Sihanouk also called for their withdrawal.

His statements on French influence also were not being taken as his final word on the subject. The 41-year-old prince is noted for changing his mind, and did so several times on the subject of U.S. aid this month.
