The All-America football player has reached the pinnacle of athletics.

He made the climb by consistent brilliance. He put all his gifts, some of which are intangible, together at the outset and kept them there all the way along the route. He gave his all unselfishly in the toughest, toughest and most intricate team game ever devised.

The world's greatest athletes are supposed to appear in the Olympic Games next October, but you saw the best of all on the college football fields during this fall season. The foremost runners, hurdlers, throwers, jumpers, weight lifters and gymnasts will compete in Tokyo. The American football player has to be a composite of them all.

With the thousands of young men playing college football, some deem it unfair to name the 11 best. But why take a negative approach and deprive certain combatants the awards they so richly deserve?

So again it is a privilege to name the extraordinary performers adjudged the most formidable in the college game at their respective positions. They are elected by the nation's coaches, professional scouts and football writers to the 1963 Newspaper Enterprise Association All-America team.

Each of the carefully screened perfectionists goes a beautiful 17-jewel, antimagnetic Trivera watch in a heavy gold-plated case. Each gets a specially designed certificate and will be further honored at a dinner in his home town.

Seven of the All-America men are juniors, so it might well be described as a team with a future.

An All-America team this year necessarily has to start with Roger Staubach, Navy's 21-year-old, 6-2, 190-pound All-Everything at quarterback. Schooled football people are calling the Great Scrambler the quarterback of the generation.

"I have seen better passers, better runners and better signal callers," says Wayne Hardin, the Naval Academy coach, "but I haven't seen anyone who can do all those things so well. In each game he does things he never did before."

There were many fine running backs in the college ranks, but the electorate settled on Gale Sayers of Kansas and Pittsburgh's Paul Marth as the halfbacks.

Don Klosterman, who screens talent for the Kansas City Chiefs of the American Football League, calls Sayers "the second best runner in football."

That logically would make Jimmy Brown of the professional Cleveland Browns No. 1. Marth is a breakaway runner who throws the ball like the quarterback he formerly was.

Vandy Posts First Duck Cage Game Postponed

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Vanderbilt won its first game of the season Saturday, rolling up its biggest victory margin in years with a 31-0 trouncing of George Washington.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Tentative closure of the Rogue River to salmon angling above Elk Creek was rescinded at the final hearing on 1964 angling rules by the Oregon Game Commission Friday.

Australian Champ Stuns U.S. Hopes

ADELAIDE, Australia (UPI)—Australian junior champion John Newcombe stunned America's Davis Cup hopes and possibly earned himself a berth on the Aussie Cup squad Saturday by upsetting Dennis Ralston, 6-1, 6-3, 15-17, 6-1, in the final of the South Australian tennis championships.

The victory gave Newcombe his first senior title. Ralston, Bakersfield, Calif., suffered his first defeat since arriving in Australia two weeks ago. He won the New South Wales tournament last week.

Newcombe reached the final by surprising Fred Stolle, the Wimbledon runner-up, on Thursday.

Ralston's defeat was all the more surprising because he had been playing the most consistent tennis of his career since his arrival in Australia.

He scored two victories in the past two weeks over Roy Emerson, the Aussies' top-ranked player, and had buoyed America's hopes of recapturing the Davis Cup despite injuries to Chuck McKinley and Frank Froehling.

Newcombe is one of nine Aussies named to the squad from which the defending Davis Cup team will be selected. Only three players—Emerson, Stolle and Neale Fraser—already have been chosen for the challenge round, Dec. 25-28.
