

Union-Management Relationship 'Like Marriage'

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — The similarity between a labor contract and a marriage contract is obvious to anyone who knows anything at all about collective bargaining.

Up until now, however, I was not aware that the resemblance had any official standing with the National Labor Relations Board.

My eyes were opened on this point by a decision recently handed down by an NLRB trial

examiner in an unfair labor practice case in Tennessee.

The examiner, George L. Powell, ruled that a dairy products firm acted wrongly in turning over to an independent contractor work that had previously been performed by its own employees.

Powell held that the company should have notified the union before taking this step, which resulted in the dismissal of some of the workers.

In support of his decision he noted that the union-management

relationship "in certain respects is like a marriage."

"... we can well imagine the almost universal cry in every home in the land should the husband, without first talking it over with his wife, rent out the spare room in the home to a lovely young roomer, be she blonde, brunette or redhead," he wrote.

Yes, indeed, I can well imagine that. In fact, I can visualize the negotiations step by step.

First there would be what is

known in labor-management-marriage circles as a "lock-out." The wife would lock her husband out of the bedroom while she had a universal cry.

These pressure tactics would force the husband to the bargaining table. He would rather go to the dinner table but there wouldn't be any food on it because she was in the bedroom crying when she should have been in the kitchen cooking supper.

Below Par Health Can Affect Youngster's Ability To Study

 If your child is having difficulty with his school work now is the time to begin helping him. Any of the normal problems of adjustment should have been corrected by now. If problems still exist, they should be checked carefully.

Discuss the child's problems with his teachers. If the problems appear complicated, seek the advice of school specialists such as the nurse, psychologist and remedial reading teacher.

A thorough physical examination is in order. A child cannot concentrate properly on learning if his health is not up to par. Sight and hearing should be checked. Headaches, tenseness, sluggishness and lack of appetite, may indicate that the child has a health problem. Proper sleep, exercise, and nourishment are important to school success. Discuss these aspects with your family physician.

Emotional or psychological problems will interfere with learning. Psychological assistance is a necessity in such cases. Correcting this type of problem is a job for a well trained professional. It may require guidance and advice to teachers and parents or it may involve extensive therapy. In any case, the psychologist is an important consultant.

A child's ability naturally is a major factor in his school success. There are various measures of ability. A qualified individual can give a reasonable estimate of the child's potential to learn, through the combined use of tests and observations. This may not be an absolute answer but it will give indications which can be used in the total evaluation of the child.

Diagnostic and achievement tests are valuable tools. They can give information concerning weaknesses or gaps in a child's knowledge. They will indicate if he is below normal in reading, arithmetic, etc. Some are more specific and will tell the area of reading in which he needs help. For example, he might show weakness in comprehension, vocabulary, phonics (sounds), etc. Some tests will show with which sounds he is having difficulty.

It is necessary to correct physical or psychological problems in order for tutoring to be effective. Tutoring may be based upon the diagnostic and achievement tests. If the need is not too extreme, the classroom teacher may be able to handle it. If a separate tutor is used, close cooperation with the school is important. The amount of time should be considered carefully. Make sure the child has an opportunity to relax and play. He should be consulted since his cooperation and motivation are essential. The advantage of tutoring is the close individual instruction. Therefore the tutor must be fully qualified and personally acceptable to the student.

 There is reason to believe that Oregon Tech's dean of education, Paul Meier, may go to Peru, South America, next summer — during the period that OTI will be moving to its new campus — to conduct a survey to determine the extent the need for technical education there and the types of technical education most needed. Oregon Tech has been selected by Teachers College, Columbia University, sponsors of the project, to conduct the survey.

Dr. Solon T. Kimball, professor of Anthropology and Education at Columbia, spent Thursday on campus discussing the project. It will require first a survey of the technical needs in the country and then the development of a plan for the nation's educational program in the technical field.

Dr. Kimball indicated that 16 polytechnic institutes are tentatively being considered in a 20-year plan. Oregon Tech's experience in the technical field apparently has made its personnel particularly well qualified to conduct the survey and also in all probability to help in establishing the technical education program for the whole of Peru.

Two faculty members in the English Department at Oregon Tech, Robert DeRosier, department head, and Jean Underwood, will spend Thanksgiving Day and Thanksgiving weekend attending the national convention of the National Council of Teachers of English in San Francisco. They will be particularly interested in the approach which other institutions use to teach English to foreign students.

English teachers at all levels from the first grade to the university and from all parts of the United States will be attending the convention. The OTI team will be particularly interested in the program of other two-year colleges.
