The St. Louis Cardinals should be grateful to their underrated defense for boosting them into a triple tie for the National Football League's Eastern Division lead, and the Chicago Bears can thank Roger LeClerc that things aren't all knotted up in the West, too.

The Cardinals upset the New York Giants, 24-17, Sunday and made it a new race in the Eastern Division. The Cleveland Browns, defeating the Dallas Cowboys, 27-17, joined in the

first-place tie with St. Louis and New York. All have 8-3 records.

The Pittsburgh Steelers nearly threw the Western Division into a deadlock, too, but LeClerc kicked an 18-yard field goal with 4:31 remaining to give the Bears a 17-17 tie.

The Green Bay Packers, who defeated the San Francisco Forty Niners, 28-10, would have tied for the lead if the Bears had lost. Chicago now has a 9-1-1 record; Green Bay is 9-2.

In Sunday's other games, played on a Sunday of mourning for President Kennedy, the Los Angeles Rams edged the Baltimore Colts, 17-16; the Minnesota Vikings squeaked past the Detroit Lions, 34-31; and the Washington Redskins defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 13-10.

The Cardinals broke a 17-17 tie against the Giants on Charley Johnson's three-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Joe Conrad early in the final period. Garland Boyette set up the score by recovering a fumbled punt by the Giants' Ed Dove on the New York 20.

At Pittsburgh, the Bears twice went ahead on short touchdowns run, by Willie Galimore and Ron Bull, only to have the Steelers come back to score on Dick Hoak's six-yard run and Ed Brown's 31-yard pass to rookie Roy Curry, tying the game at halftime, 14-14.

Lou Michaels put the Steelers' lead with an 11-yard field goal

in the final quarter, four minutes before LeClerc tied the score permanently.

Jimmy Brown gained only 51 yards in 17 carries against Dallas, leaving him 30 yards short of his own NFL season record of 1,327. But Frank Ryan's three touchdown passes of 11 and 16 yards to Gary Collins and Ross Fichtner ran back an interception 36 yards for another Cleveland TD.

The Packers, with Bart Starr back at quarterback, scored all 28 points during the first half against the Forty Niners. Elijah Pitts, filling in for injured Tom Moore, threw a 21-yard touchdown pass to Ron Kramer and also ran 14 yards for another score.

Danny Villanueva's 13-yard field goal in the third period produced the Rams' upset win over the Colts. Art Perkins scored two Los Angeles touchdowns of one-yard bucks and Jim Martin kicked Baltimore field goals of 39, 22 and 41 yards.

Fran Tarkenton's passes to Paul Farley set up a two-yard touchdown plunge by Tommy Mason with less than two minutes to play and gave Minnesota its win over Detroit.

Bob Khayat's field goal of 37 and 22 yards, followed by Dick James' spectacular catch of a 31-yard touchdown pass from Norm Sneed, produced all of Washington's points during the first half against the Eagles.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Los Angeles Rams—to the surprise of almost everyone—are involved in a three-way tie for fourth place in the National Football League's Western Conference.

The Rams scraped by the favored Baltimore Colts Sunday by a one-point—17-16—on Danny Villanueva's 13-yard field goal in the third quarter.

They now have a 4-7 record—the same as Detroit and Minnesota.

The game at Memorial Coliseum was played in a rather somber atmosphere—because of President Kennedy's assassination. The crowd of 48,555 observed a moment of silent prayer before the game started and entertainment films were largely omitted.

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—The Green Bay Packers, using the old one-two of Bart Starr and Jim Taylor, kept their National Football League title hopes alive Sunday by walloping the San Francisco Forty Niners, 28-10.

The Packers rolled up all 28 of their points in the first half on the pin-point passing of Starr, who had been sidelined with a broken hand for four weeks, and the power running of fullback Taylor.

Green Bay took the opening kickoff and marched into the Forty Niner end zone on 12 plays, with Starr hitting Boyd Dowler for the TD.

West Coast football ends its delayed schedule on a somber note next Saturday with four traditional games, two of which may decide the Big Six's Rose Bowl delegate.

The Washington Huskies could win the conference crown and a clear-cut invitation to Pasadena providing they defeat Washington State.

But if Washington State upsets Washington and Southern California beats UCLA, the Trojans then would win the Big Six title and presumably a second straight trip to the bowl.

The first team that can concentrate on football after this national tragedy could win, coach Jim Owens of Washington State said. Jim Sutherland, the Cougars' coach, refused to discuss the game until after President Kennedy's funeral.

In two other age-old contests, California faces Stanford and Oregon meets Oregon State while the University of the Pacific invades San Jose State.

The Bears will be trying to post their first winning season since 1938 when they take a 4-4-1 mark to Stanford which is 2-7. The Oregon-Oregon State game features a duel of good passers. Quarterback Ken Berry of the Ducks will be vying with Oregon State's Gordon Queen.
