World's Bowling Tourney Shows Level Of Popularity

CHICAGO (NEA) — Bowling probably originated when some sports-minded ancient started knocking over sticks with the skull of a next-door neighbor who had hammered after hours on a mastodon-bone marimba.

Through the centuries the sport became as American as buckwheat cakes with maple syrup, until a highly refined version was reintroduced abroad at the turn of this decade.

Now kegling has become so cosmopolitan that the biggest tournament of them all, the World's Invitational Match Game Championships, draws able competitors from foreign countries.

High rollers from Finland, Australia, Japan, Mexico and Canada will be among the 128 men and 64 women competing in the Bowling Proprietors Association's seventh annual big show in Chicago which runs to Dec. 1.

None of the five male invaders is liable to dethrone amazing Don Carter, who won the world's title five times in the past six years and was runner-up in 1958. Neither do any of the three women visitors figure to supplant grandma Marjorie Ladewig, who also won the crown in 1957 and 1960. Nevertheless their presence officially lifts bowling from the provincial to the international.

Tauno Nieminen of Helsinki has long been one of Europe's best. He won the championship of Finland, averaging 227, and was winner of the International Match Game Tournament in Brussels in October, where he averaged 201 for the 25-game final and had a 408 for a two-game block.

John Fitch of Sydney won the Australian National All-Star singles title, averaging 199 for 32 in the final.

Kojiro Wada, 23, is a student at Meiji University in Tokyo. He beat 150 of his country's top rollers in a special qualifying trial for the World's, averaging 191 although still recovering from an automobile accident that kept him hospitalized 45 days.

Tony Chibi, from Leamington, Ont., is Canadian Masters singles champion. Tony Reynolds, the Mexican representative, won the world's amateur singles and doubles titles in Hamburg. He was on Mexico's eight-man winning team.

The women's invasion is headed by Maria Luisa Anaya, 40, who has been All-Events champion of Mexico seven times. Competing in a men's tournament in 1959, she averaged 191 for 54 games. She won the women's world's amateur championship in Hamburg in 1959 and was named her country's Woman of the Year in 1962.

Pearl Sullivan of Melbourne won the women's singles title in the same tournament that her teammate, John Fitch, competed. She averaged 188 for 23 games in the final.

Nancy McAlpine of Toronto is the top girl tenpin performer in Canada.

The United States field includes the winner of every major individual championship in this country.

The men will roll 100 games apiece, the women 72. Total prize money is \$48,240, with the man champion receiving \$7,500 and the woman winner \$4,000.

Men's and women's finals, head-to-head matches between the No. 1 and No. 2 survivors, will be nationally telecast.

Someone in the National Hockey League had better come up with a way to stop Stan Mikita and Bobby Hull soon or those go-go Chicago Black Hawks will be clear gone.

Scoring four goals in the first period, the Hawks crushed the Montreal Canadiens, 7-3, Sunday night for their fifth straight victory and 10th straight on home ice.

The triumph increased the Hawks' lead to 4½ games over the second place Toronto Maple Leafs, who played to a 3-3 tie with the New York Rangers, and naturally Mikita and Hull were two of the prime movers in Chicago's rout.

Mikita rambled home a pair of goals and assisted on another pair to take over the NHL scoring leadership with 31 points while Hull also was credited with two assists that upped his point total to 30.

Ab McDonald also scored twice for the winners and John Ferguson notched a pair for the Canadiens, who trailed 6-0 at one point in the second period. Jean Beliveau had three assists for Montreal and has 29 points so far this season.

Bob Fillion scored twice for Toronto in the opening period and Earl Ingarfield of the Rangers matched both goals in the same stanza.

The tournament was won by Rex Baxter, Jr., of Amarillo, Tex., with a 13-under-par 275. He came through with a 34-34-66 in the final round to beat Bob Shave of Portland, Ore., by two strokes. Shave had a final round 54-35-69 for a 277.

Jack Rife Jr., of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Tommy Aaron of Gainesville, Ga., tied for third with 278.

Nebraska Goes To Orange Bowl; Rose Bowl Berths Undetermined

One Orange and a Tangerine have already been picked but a lot of ripe fruit in the form of lucrative bowl bids remains to be divided as spoils among the nation's major college football powers this week.

Nebraska thrashed Oklahoma, 29-20, on Saturday to nail down an Orange Bowl bid and Western Kentucky accepted a berth in the Tangerine Bowl immediately after crushing Murray State, 50-0.

But most of the "bowl deciding" games as well as conference "championship" contests were postponed due to the death of President Kennedy, and have been rescheduled for this week.

The situation is as easy as pumpkin pie in the Big Ten where fourth-ranked Michigan State and eighth-ranked Illinois square off on Thanksgiving Day with the league title and Rose Bowl trip at stake. The winner goes, the loser stays, and in the event of a tie, the Spartans get the nod.

The other berth at Pasadena's Rose Garden will be decided Saturday when Washington hosts Washington St. and South-

ern Cal tangles with rival UCLA. Should the Huskies whip State, they will get the nod. A Washington loss would throw the Big Six into a frenzy with even State in the running for the bowl bid.

Texas, which has already mapped its cattle drive to the Cotton Bowl, meets arch-rival Texas A&M on Thursday with mostly prestige on the line. The Longhorns, top-ranked in the country, are aiming for their first undefeated - untied season in some 40 years.

Third-ranked Mississippi can complete its annual travel plans for the Sugar Bowl by whipping Mississippi State in one of the formidable "family feuds" scheduled for Saturday. The Rebels can wrap up the South-eastern Conference title with a win but a loss would give the title to the winner of the Alabama-Auburn clash. Auburn defeated Florida State, 21-15 Saturday.

The Pentagon must decide this week if the football spectacular of the year, the Army-Navy game, will go on as scheduled Saturday. The second-ranked Middies, with the brilliant Roger Staubach at quarterback, will probably go to the Cotton Bowl opposite Texas if they beat Army. If not, they will go nowhere.

In feature games last weekend, Florida shattered Miami, 27-21; Tennessee stunned Kentucky, 19-0; Louisiana State zeroed Tulane, 29-0; Vanderbilt scored its first win of the season with a 31-0 spanking of George Washington; Arkansas bested Texas Tech, 27-20; and Utah upset Utah State, 25-21.

Ohio U. blanked Marshall, 17-0, to capture the Mid-America Conference crown but the Ivy League and Atlantic Coast Conferences won't be settled until this week.

Ivy leader Princeton faces Dartmouth while runnerup Harvard observes its "traditional" with Yale on Saturday. Duke and North Carolina slug it out on Thanksgiving with the winner gaining a final tie with North Carolina State in the ACC.

Other major contests to be held Thanksgiving include Wisconsin at Minnesota, Clemson at South Carolina, Virginia at Maryland, Furman at West Virginia and Notre Dame plays Syracuse in New York.

Portland (UPI) — The Oregon Isaac Walton League was urged Saturday to plug a unified fish and game commission.

William B. Morse, regional Wildlife Management Institute representative, said divided authority was wasteful.

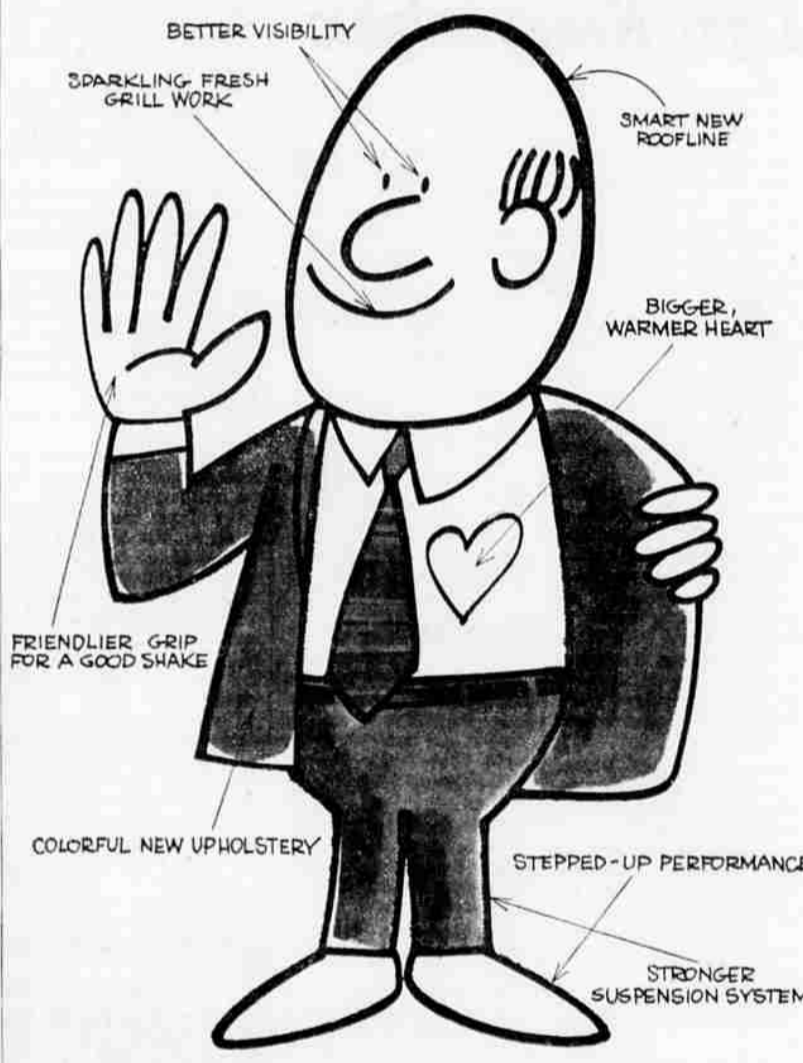
