Although he sat out the entire fourth quarter, Wilt scored 33 points and pulled down 14 rebounds. He and Guy Rodgers teamed up to break the game open in the second period, Chamberlain scoring 24 points and Rodgers registering 11 assists.

The Boston Celtics handed the Los Angeles Lakers their worst licking of the season, 114-78, for their sixth straight victory and 11th in 14 starts this season.

Sam Jones led all scorers with 20 points while a hard-pushing Celtic defense held Jerry West to 16 points and Elgin Baylor to 13.

Oscar Robertson led a second-half rally that enabled the Cincinnati Royals to overcome a 14-point deficit and beat the Baltimore Bullets, 122-119.

Baltimore shot to a 92-78 advantage with 3:14 left in the third period at which point Robertson started collecting 16 of his 28 points to lead the Royals

to their third straight win. Terry Dischinger had 29 and Walt Bellamy 28 for the Bullets, who dropped their fifth straight.

The St. Louis Hawks outlasted the Detroit Pistons, 113-105, as Velmo Beatty tossed in 30 points for the winners and Bob Pettit 23. Bailey Howell and Don Ohl had 18 apiece for the Pistons.

Canuck defenseman Dunc McCallum got Vancouver's only goal in the second period, and the two teams battled through the third scoreless.

Referee Lorin Doolittle clashed with members of both sides and demanded police assistance to eject fans from ice-side seats in the third period after a fight between Doolittle and a spectator.

In tonight's only game, Portland plays at Denver. San Francisco has no immediate fear of losing its present fourth position, because Portland trails the Seals by five points.

UO Cagers Eye Indians

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Coach Steve Belko sends Oregon's basketball team, its roster liberally sprinkled with sophomores, into the season opening series Monday and Tuesday against Stanford at Palo Alto.

The Webfoots are expected to open with a lineup featuring three regulars from last year's squad and two sophomores against the Indians, rated one of the top teams on the Pacific Coast in pre-season reckoning.

Veterans Steve Jones (6-5) and Jim Johnson (6-5), the top Duck scorers last winter, will open at forwards along with letterman Elliott Gleason (6-2) at guard.

Sophomores who figure to crack the starting lineup are Jim Barnett (6-3), who averaged 22 points a game with the freshmen last season, at guard and lanky Gene Brockmeyer (6-10) at center.

To Brockmeyer will fall the rugged task of checking Tom Dose, Stanford's outstanding 6-8 senior center. Dose holds the Tribe single season scoring record of 320 points and has been especially sharp against the Webfoots the past two seasons.

Last season Stanford tripped the Webfoots twice at McArthur Court and the overall series standing favors the Indians by a 24-6 margin.

Belko, commenting on the series, stated, "This will be a tough way to open the season. Stanford has a fine team, possibly the best in the Big Six, and they have an automatic ten-point advantage playing in their gym."

The Webfoots leave Eugene by plane Sunday morning for the two-game series with the Indians.

Bears, Indians Resume Sessions For 'Big Game'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — It was "work as usual" Thursday for Stanford and California football teams as they pushed ahead with their final preparations for Saturday's 66th annual "Big Game" at Stanford.

Stuffed with turkey, just like the rest of us, the gridders went out to practice again Thursday afternoon — slightly slowed from the heavy load of food, but still determined to get in tip-top shape for the season's most important battle.

Coaches Marv Levy of Cal and John Ralston of Stanford both put their men through hour-long workouts—the last before the clash on Saturday.

A crowd of "upwards of 80,000" will see the battle in Memorial Stadium that was supposed to have been held last week but was postponed because of the assassination of President Kennedy.

The forecast is for clear and warm weather.

Both coaches agreed that the week's delay helped their crisples get ready to the big test.

"We have five or six men who would have played, but would not have been up to their full capabilities due to slight injuries, who now will be at top speed," said Levy.

HAYS NOMINATED
 DETROIT (UPI) — Hayes Jones was nominated Wednesday by the Michigan AAU as a candidate for the James E. Sullivan Award.

Jones, 24, is rated as the nation's number one hurdler and he has won 48 straight indoor events and holds the indoor high hurdles record.

OSU Opens Campaign

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY, Corvallis (Special)—Oregon State's Beavers, defending Western Regional NCAA basketball kingpins, open another season next Monday and Tuesday night at Pullman against Washington State.

Coach Sids Gill, now in his 38th season as OSU headman, has the potential for another strong team, despite the loss of 1963 regulars Terry Baker and Steve Pauly. Heading the list of returning vets, of course, is all-America candidate Mel Counts, the 7-foot center who scored 661 points a year ago.

Counts has looked better than ever in practice, and in one session recently, connected on 14 out of 15 field goal attempts in a game scrimmage. Gill has been using Counts in an otherwise-small quintet composed of Frank Peters, Jim Jarvis, Scott Eaton and Rick Whelan. Peters and Jarvis were regulars much of the time a year ago, while Eaton and Whelan both are promising sophomores, up from the Rook squad.

If the Beavers lack enough height in that lineup, Gill can call upon another 1963 regular, 6-7 Jim Kraus, who also has shown marked improvement this season. The team has good speed and shooting ability. Peters and Jarvis both have shot well in practice, and should be much better than they were a year ago.

Other squad members include Terry Dreiseward, a transfer from Mt. San Antonio JC; John Chambers, a transfer from Antelope Valley JC; Rex Benner, a holdover letterman; Dave Fox, sophomore; Wiley Smith, sophomore; Randy Rothman, junior holdover reserve; Lynn Baxter, letterman from two years ago; and Maury Stevens, sophomore. Benner suffered a badly-sprained ankle earlier in practice, but should play a lot when healthy.

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Pels In Impressive Win; Local UF Gains

PELICAN COURT—For "old men," you've gotta admit they did a pretty fair country job.

Of course all were not of the "bulging forty" class and when they combined their court talents with those of the younger members of the KU faculty it made for a sound bit of competition for the Klamath Falls Pelican quint.

For the record, the score of the contest played here Wednesday night for the benefit of the local United Fund was 61-42 in favor of the Pels.

But, before the Pelicans were to register this lopsided "victory," they were forced to overcome a 21-21 halftime deadlock and fight off a closing-minute rally on the part of the faculty five.

Still, the Pelicans proved too much for their elders—several of these barely in the elder class—as they gave an indication of the type of play Pelican fans might witness during the upcoming season.

And that play was, in a word — impressive.

The Pelican big men did the job expected of them. Good rebounding and good scoring.

Terry Ash using his 6-4 frame to hit the boards hard against the faculty to pull down nine key rebounds and tally the same number of points.

And the work of new big man, 6-7 Gene Kingsbury, good for eight rebounds and tips adding 14 points to the Pel scoring total.

Then there was the floor work and outside shooting of diminutive Lanny Guyer as he added 10 markers to the Pel total and

set up the offense whenever the Pelicans failed to move the fast break downtown.

There were others, of course, as Al Keck attempted to see all members of the club under game condition play.

Such people as sophomore big man Bob Moore, or Bud Loomis and Jim Patzke coming off the bench to give the Pels added punch in the second half, with the latter impressive on both board work and scoring.

However, lest the incorrect impression be given that the Pels were running over a group of "old men," a clarification is necessary.

The play of former all-starer Butch Kimpton in the contest was outstanding in the scoring and floor-work departments. The former KU and Oregon stand-out hit for 12 points in playing about three-quarters of the fray and was a defensive thorn in the side of the Pels.

Or the play of Jim Smith as he hit the boards for six rebounds in the first period and a total of nine in just partial play during the first half. The former Grants Pass star's biggest problem was in being whistled down for four infractions in the first 10 minutes of play.

And the reverse layups tossed in by the boss of the KU coaching staff, former Willamette Bearcat cager Jim Johnson, left the Pels muttering under their breath.

After the Pelicans had rolled into a 19-11 advantage in the early moments of the second period, the "old men" came on as if no one had informed them of the fact they were to roll over and play dead.

Johnson's pair of free throws

started the comeback, followed by a bucket by Bruce Patterson and a reverse layup by Johnson to cut the margin to 21-17.

Then it was Smith hitting at the 1:44 mark for a 21-19 count and 25 seconds later feeding Kimpton on a fast break for the equalizer at 21-21.

This was to be the halftime count, before the Pels came on as the second half opened and laced the bucket for 19 markers in the third chapter while limiting the faculty five to just six points.

This was to be the turning point, with an additional 21 points tallied by the potent Pels while the faculty raised its quarter output to 15 including a rally in the last three minutes good for 11 of these points.

However, the last minute surge was too little, too late as Patzke, Ash, Kingsford and Loomis tallied with matching buckets for the Pels to fight off the comeback.

So opened the Pelican cage season, with those fans attending treated to a fine bit of basketball.

It was obvious to all, that the practice sessions by the Pels have paid off handsomely and if the play witnessed here Wednesday night is an indication of things to come, then the new season could prove productive.
