

# Higher Finish Figured For Gilchrist Cagers

(This is the first in a series of articles outlining Klamath B League basketball prospects.)

"Gilchrist has always been the cellar team, but last year we surprised a few people and took fourth place.  
"We have height and have improved considerably to the point where I feel we could be among the top contenders this year."

So speaks Jerry Bennett in pre-season look at the Gilchrist Grizzlies.  
The Gilchrist head man is not alone in his optimistic appraisal.

Other league mentors see the Grizzlies as a definite threat to the title taken last year by the Chiloquin Panthers and the district crown grabbed by the Merrill Huskies.

Height and experience are the Grizzlies' strong suits. Nine lettermen were counted by Bennett at the initial turnout led by three-year veteran Dan Hoff, a senior standing 6-5 and the team's leading scorer last year. The Grizzlies look to the rebounding strength of 220-pound,

6-1 senior Conley Elms, who also was a top scorer for the Grizzlies and ended the season with the most outstanding percentage on free throws.

Another three-year letterman is 5-11 Jack Hazelwood, while additional height and experience is offered by junior Denny Jessup, who stands 6-1.

Other one-year men are Jim Lash (6-0); Ken Erickson (5-8), a senior guard; Mathew Koski, standing 6-2 and a junior; Glenn Mount, a junior standing 5-9; Donovan Kendall a 5-9 junior; and Don Bertram, a 6-0 junior.

Potential varsity material in the Gilchrist camp is available in such people as Roy Warren (5-8), Bob Anderson (5-9), Butch Hager (6-0), Calvin Bonner (5-5) and Tom Negus (6-3).

This is the group which Bennett feels will improve Gilchrist basketball fortunes considerably during the new campaign.

Last year the Grizzlies ended the season with a 500 mark at 10 wins and 10 setbacks.

It was a number of close setbacks stopping the Grizzlies from capturing a portion of the league and district crowns, such as an overtime loss to Merrill in the district tournament in addition to a 74-79 regular

season victory over Paisley—the team which finished the district show in second place.

The Grizzlies receive their first test of the new season Friday night, Dec. 6, in the Chiloquin cage jamboree facing the Bly Bobcats, with the jamboree contest a league counter.

## Sports Center To Be Named For JFK

PORTLAND (UPI)—The proposed Delta Park complex north of Portland may be renamed the John F. Kennedy Memorial Park and Stadium.

Naming the sports complex for the late president was suggested Wednesday by two Delta Park Commissioners, Edward Whelan and Robert Gunderson.

The idea drew some support from city and county officials at a meeting that was organized by the City Commissioner O'Bean.

He said the city had gone to a lot of trouble to name the park site and if it were changed the public would have to be re-educated. He indicated also he

would be reluctant to again go through the proceedings to name the park.

The commission decided to study the proposal for future recommendation to city and county commissioners.

The park belongs to the city, but the stadium, if approved by voters, would be built by the county.

A plan for creating an international center for athletics at Delta Park was proposed by Ed Welch, representing Ebasco, Inc., of San Francisco.

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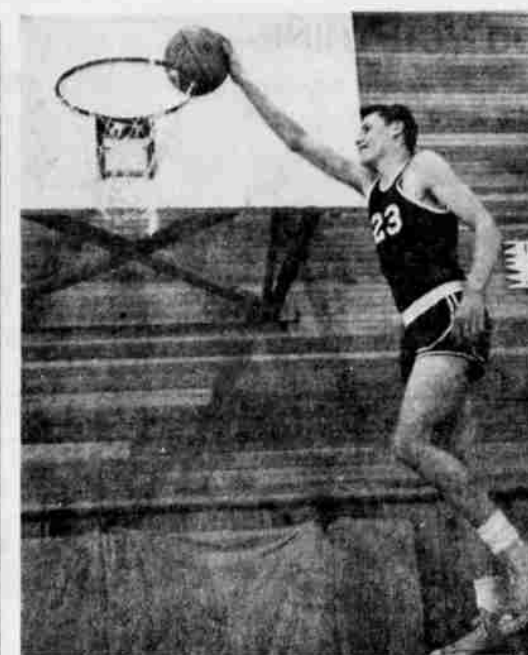

## Final Opportunity Due Unit Permit Holders; Quail Good In Lake County

PORTLAND (UPI) — The weekly fishing report prepared by the State Game Commission:

**Northwest:** Fishing has been slow on Nehalem and streams to the north; Tillamook-Nestucca district streams have been muddy; steelhead plunkers doing well in the lower Salmon, Siletz and Alsea rivers; Clackamas River should be fair for salmon and steelhead from boats below River Mill Dam; Fern Ridge, Dorena and Cottage Grove Reservoirs at winter levels.

**Southwest:** Lower Umpqua from Elkton to Scotsburg fair to good for steelhead on fresh salmon eggs; Tenmile Creek picking up; Coos and Coquille systems spotty; Rogue above Graves Creek has been slow due to high water; Sunday, Dec. 1, marks the deadline change in the Rogue from Gold Ray dam

downstream to Hells Gate Canyon.  
**Northwest:** Steelheading slow throughout the region; Willowa Lake fair for rainbow.

PORTLAND (UPI) — Here is the weekly hunting report issued by the Oregon State Game Commission:

**Northwest:** Duck hunters on the Sauvie Island game management area are averaging from one to two birds per visit. Hunting pressure is heavy on the weekends.

**Southwest:** It will take a storm to put any numbers of waterfowl into the Umpqua Valley.

**Central:** Wasco unit permit holders will get a chance at antlerless deer only on the Ramsey Creek extended area, located between Eightmile Creek and Ramsey Creek. It will be posted. Archery hunters

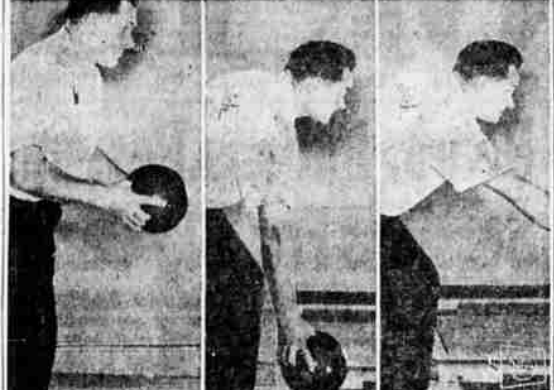
should connect in the Pine Grove area between the Wapinitia highway and the White River.

**Northwest:** Valley quail are abundant in brushy stream bottoms in Grant, Baker and Willowa counties. Chukars are plentiful in Baker and Grant counties, but are scattered. Waterfowl hunting is slow in Umatilla County, fair in Union County with a few geese reported in the Grande Ronde Valley.

**Southeast:** Chukars and valley quail are numerous and accessible throughout Harney, Malheur and Lake County, waterfowl prospects are poor to fair except on stormy, windy days. Fairly large numbers of ducks and Canada geese remain at Summer and Goose lakes and in Warner Valley areas. Duck shooting on the Snake and Malheur rivers has been fair.

### 2-Squared Shoulders

We turn to that gloriously young old-timer Steve Nagy for an example of perfection in one important phase of the delivery that too often is executed in a sloppy manner by even the best.  
It is essential that the shoulders be square throughout the swing. If you start with the shoulders square, it will give you a solid foundation at the finish which comes from squared shoulders.  
Dropping the shoulder affects the straight pendulum swing and usually results in loss of control.  
Keeping the shoulders in square position not only helps the bowler maintain perfect balance throughout, it allows him to impart a follow-through.

The accompanying photographs show how well Nagy does this.

His 50 years sit lightly on Steve Nagy, who continues to roll with the very best. The winner of many national tournaments, Nagy, a native of Shoaf, Pa., who headquarters in Los Angeles, was twice voted Bowler of the Year by the B.W.A.A. He holds a two-year average record in the ABC Tournament of 1951-52. He tied with Don Carter and Thern Gibson for record number of consecutive 1,000 or better series in the annual ABC tournament with three rolled in 1951 (1,976, 1952 (2,065) and 1953 (1,923).

## Rangers In 3-2 Victory

Talk about courage.  
Jacques Plante, the New York Rangers' goalie, suffered a severely bruised shoulder 10 nights ago, sat out two games, and then decided to return to action Wednesday night although he still was in considerable pain.  
All "Jake, the Snake" did was turn aside 34 shots in helping the Rangers post a 3-2 victory over the Detroit Red Wings in the National Hockey League's only holiday eve game.  
"My shoulder was hurting plenty in the third period," Plante confessed after the game. "I hope I can raise my arm tomorrow."  
Despite the agony, Plante was especially brilliant in the final session, blocking 12 shots to only three for Detroit netminder Terry Sawicki.  
Don McKenney tipped in a long shot by defenseman Harry Howell for the Rangers' winning goal at 12:24 of the final period. New York had gone ahead, 2-1, earlier in the session on a bouncing, 65-foot drive by Don Johns. Detroit tied the score two minutes later when Norm Ullman beat Plante from close range.  
Rod Gilbert of the Rangers provided another highlight of the game in the first period when he converted a penalty shot, which was called when Detroit's Larry Jeffrey fell on the puck in the crease during a New York attack.

Kilmer had his right ankle crushed in a car accident last Dec. 5. Christiansen said Kilmer, at one time rumored to be out of football forever, "will be invited back to camp next year."  
Stickles will move up to the first team for the first time in six weeks. The big end was bothered in the early season by a knee injury suffered in the exhibition season.  
Christiansen said there would be no other changes in the starting lineup for Sunday's game against the Los Angeles Rams at Kezar.

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
