Invaders Top Bucks To Take First Spot

The Denver Invaders have invaded the No. 1 spot in the Western Hockey League standings—and if statistics are any indication, they might be awfully tough to shoulder out.

The scrappy Invaders, who are leading the league in both offense and defense, moved into a tie with Los Angeles for the top spot Thursday night by defeating Portland, 3-1, in the only contest played.

The Denver team has scored a total of 73 goals during the season to hold a healthy lead in that department. Ironically, the team with the next highest total is a 11-a-r-dwelling Vancouver with 66.

However, the Invaders have allowed only 52 goals, four fewer than have been scored against their nearest competitor in that department, the Seattle Totems with 56. Vancouver has given up 73, which explains the last place position of the Canucks.

The game in Denver Thursday night started as a tight affair, with neither team able to score in the first period. Then John Sleaver hit for the Invaders midway through the second period and Rudy Migay, who scored a hat trick two nights before, slapped one in toward the end of the period to give Denver all the points it really needed.

Nod Goes To Thomas

NEW YORK (UPI) — Archie Moore's protégé, light-heavyweight contender Allen Thomas of Chicago, is favored at 3-1 to smack Brooklyn's Johnny Persol with his first professional defeat tonight in their nationally-televised fight at Madison Square Garden.

Mustachioed Thomas would be a longer choice but for the one-week presidential memorial postponement that gave substitute Persol more time to train.

Last week Thomas was favored at 4½ to 1 after 22-year-old Persol had accepted the 10-round as a short-notice replacement for Mauro Mina of Peru, who was officially banned from the bout because of previously secret eye surgery.

Thomas is 22 like Persol but he has been a professional since 1959 and has hammered out a 19-2-1 record that includes 11 knockouts. And he was stopped once.

Meanwhile Persol, unbeaten in 85 amateur bouts, didn't turn pro until last Jan. 5. He checked off nine straight wins this year. They included three knockouts.

3-Right Ball

It is important, especially to the beginner, that the ball be perfectly matched to the bowler.

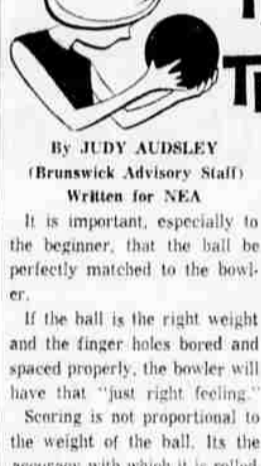
If the ball is the right weight and the finger holes bored and spaced properly, the bowler will have that "just right feeling."

Scoring is not proportional to the weight of the ball. Its accuracy with which it is rolled, not its tonnage, that takes to the pins. A ball that is too heavy can throw you off balance.

When the great Don Carter started, the only bowling balls he had access to were 16-pounders. They threw him off balance, so he compensated by developing his famed crooked-arm delivery. He could do it, but the best thing for the average roller is to use a lighter ball. Several top bowlers I know roll balls weighing 15 pounds or less.

Getting the ball drilled right is merely a matter of taking it to the right professional shop.

They have all sorts of gadgets for measuring finger span, etc.

Wittenberg Leads First Small Ballot

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wittenberg wound up on top last year and that's exactly where it's picked to finish again this year by the coaches who make up the United Press International small college basketball rating board.

The Tigers from Springfield, Ohio, who compiled a 26-2 record last season and have lost only one starter by graduation, received 10 first place votes and polled a total of 232 points in the pre-season balloting by the 35 coaches.

Evansville was second with 203 points and Grambling third with 190.

Wittenberg, which turned in the best defensive record in the country last season by holding its opponents to an average of 43.9 points a game, seeks its 67th straight victory at home Saturday when it opens the season against Otterbein.

South Dakota State, which beat Wittenberg for the NCAA college division title last season by two points, was ranked fourth in the coaches' pre-season size-up with 190 points.

One of the major surprises was the fifth place rating for Pan American, the NALA champion last season. Pan American drew 19 first place votes, the same as Wittenberg, but was named on fewer ballots than the Tigers and collected 188 points.

Southern Illinois was sixth

with 124 points, Tennessee State seventh with 107, Fresno State eighth with 84 points, Southeast Missouri ninth with 78 and Oglethorpe 10th with 55.

Bracketed in the second to were Pacific Lutheran, Akron, Philadelphia Textile, Hofstra, Prairie View, Westminster (Pa.), Lamar Tech (Tex.), Western Illinois, Tennessee A&I and Oklahoma Baptist.

The UPI small college board, similar to the board which rates the major teams, is composed of 35 coaches from seven geographical sections in the country. Voting is conducted on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1-point basis.
