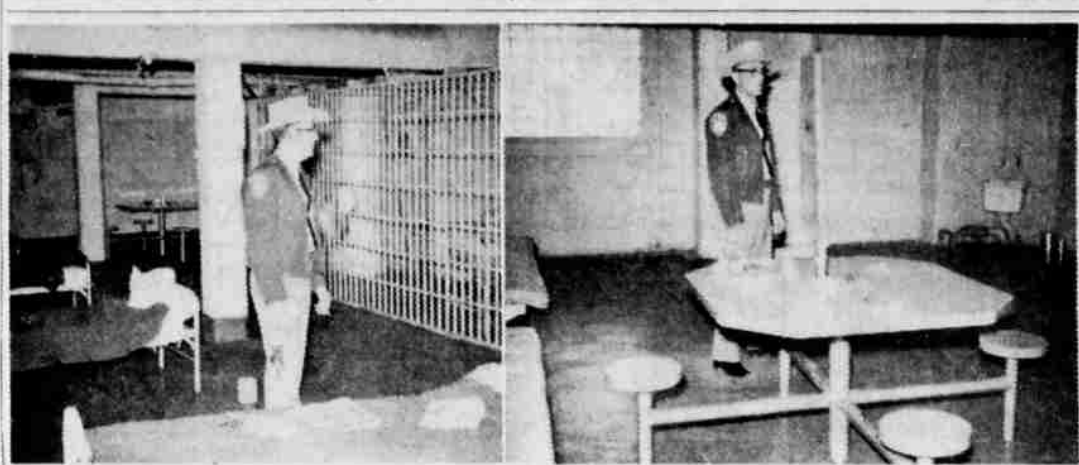
Guidance Session Scheduled

left picture shows the main cell block with exposed overhead pipes. Three years ago an inmate hung himself from the pipes. The sheriff looks at the six individual cells which have the only bathroom facilities and must remain open for use of the men in the dormitory. This prevents housing of the more dangerous criminals in private cells. The whole block was built in 1911 for 10 prisoners, but on some weekends it houses as many as 14.

Authorities In California Condemn Modoc Jail For Housing Juveniles; New Building Needed

ALTURAS — The Modoc County Jail was condemned for use of juvenile prisoners by the State of California Youth and Adult Corrections Agency last week, according to Sheriff Lynn Harris. The jail was inspected by the Youth Authority on June 5, 1963, and according to the report is lacking qualifications on five points. 1. Supervision is not provided for juveniles 24 hours daily. There is no girls' matron to check on the girls once each hour. Supervision is not supplemented by a sound system designed to detect overt, aggressive, or assaultive behavior and to summon aid in emergencies. Juveniles are not observed on an hourly basis from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. because the radio dispatcher is located in a different area of the courthouse. 2. There is no present requirement for daily bathing of each minor prisoner. 3. The food is not certified by the local health officer. 4. Every juvenile shall be issued a clean mattress, a freshly laundered mattress cover, and at least one freshly laundered sheet if two sheets are issued, the mattress cover may be deleted in addition to

the regular bedding. A sheet is not being issued. 5. All minors shall be examined by a licensed physician within 48 hours after booking. Medical care procedures have not been established for routine medical examinations. Supervisor Bill McCall stated that spending any money on the old jail would be "just throwing good money after bad." Sheriff Harris said a new jail would cost in excess of \$300,000. The new unit would be built to house 40 to 50 prisoners including juveniles. The justice court, probation office, sheriff's office and jail would all be incorporated into the one building. The jail proper would include a laundry room, change room, six single cells for adults, five juvenile cells for boys and five juvenile cells for girls, women's quarter, two drunk tanks, a padded cell, infirmary, and sound devices giving the deputy in charge a continuous report on activities in the cell blocks at all times.

Tito Frees Political Offenders

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI)—Husbands kissed wives and children hugged fathers Friday when almost 2,500 political offenders pardoned on Yugoslavia's 20th anniversary as a Communist state emerged from the country's prisons. President Tito signed the amnesty decree Thursday. Today he heard himself praised by visiting Romanian President Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej before a joint commemorative session of parliament. The Romanian leader lauded Tito's courage and skill as commander of the anti-Nazi Yugoslav guerrillas who founded Communist Yugoslavia at a wartime mountain stronghold on Nov. 29, 1943. The nation's best-known political prisoner, former Vice President Milovan Djilas, was not among the 2,456 offenders released, according to his wife. He received a nine-year sentence in 1962 for writing books offensive to the regime. According to Mrs. Djilas, her husband told a visitor Sunday that it must be taken for granted he would have to serve the full term. Informed sources said the mass amnesty left about 1,000 "unredeemed" political prisoners behind bars. Djilas, once one of President Tito's closest aides, was first sent to prison in 1955 for publishing criticism of Tito's regime. While serving this term he wrote and smuggled to an American publisher "The New Class," a critical survey of modern communism.

Current Stand Is Now Longest

SALEM (UPI)—Although now in recess, the calendar continues for the Oregon Legislature, and today the current session will become the longest special session in the state's history. Today is the 21st calendar day, and because lawmakers will not reconvene until Monday, the session cannot adjourn short of its 22nd day. The longest special sessions now on record are the 29-day meetings recorded in 1890, 1933 and 1955. The regular session this year lasted 141 days, topping the 1957 record by 13 days. The two sessions in 1957 included 147 calendar days. When the session reconvenes Monday, it will be the 163rd calendar legislative day this year.

British Slate JFK Memorial

LONDON (UPI)—Prince Philip, five other members of Britain's royal family and leading Britons will attend a national memorial service for the late President Kennedy at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday. The archbishop of Canterbury will lead the Anglican service, which will be broadcast to the United States by the British Broadcasting Corp. Among those scheduled to attend are Prime Minister Sir Alex Douglas-Home and ex-Prime Minister Harold Macmillan. Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's sister, Princess Lee Radziwill, and her husband also will be there.

Petition Seeks Kennedy Stamp

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—More than 2,000 persons have signed a petition requesting a commemorative stamp bearing the photograph of John F. Kennedy Jr. saluting his father's casket during the President's funeral Monday, a committee chairman said. Jack Brandwein, chairman of a committee boosting the proposal, said the names were obtained in the first 24 hours after the project was announced.

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Four Commencements Planned For First Time

EUGENE—For the first time in its history, the University of Oregon will conduct four commencements during the academic year, with the first to be Dec. 13. The new policy is designed to ease the load on the traditional June commencement and also make it possible for students who have qualified for graduation to receive their degrees as soon as possible. The policy is part of the university's program for year-around operation. In past year, there have been the traditional June commencement and another commencement at the end of the summer term. Beginning this year, there will be commencements at the end of the fall term, in December, and another at the end of the winter term, in the spring. The Dec. 13 exercise is scheduled at 4 p.m. in the Music School Auditorium. The commencement address will be given by Dr. Roy E. Llewellyn, chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education.
