



Solon Critical Of De Gaulle

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. J. William Fulbright Saturday accused French President Charles de Gaulle of being "unnecessarily hostile" to Britain and the United States. This, he said, has had "a very disruptive influence" on the Western alliance.

In an interview on the U.S. government's "Voice of America" radio, Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, also said there should be certain restrictions on any West German participation in nuclear defense arrangements.

And of President Johnson, Fulbright described the new Chief Executive as "one of the greatest political animals I have ever seen, in the best sense of that word." He said Johnson "knows how to get people to do things for him which is essential." He said he has high hopes that Johnson "will make a great president."

Fulbright was very critical of De Gaulle's "contemptuous reference to the Anglo-Saxons as though they were a species beneath notice." This had to do with the French leader's action last January rejecting British entry in the Common Market and the late President Kennedy's offer of nuclear cooperation.

Asked whether he thought it would be "wise to have the West Germans participate in a common Atlantic atomic force equipped with rockets," Fulbright said it would depend on the "nature" of the organization.

He said he was "most sympathetic to the Germans" and admired many of their qualities.

"But, nevertheless, they have been a dangerous people," he said, "and this is why I think they should be a part of an organization in which these other countries participate and this is—I hope you understand this—is no way a reflection...and I think the present government, the Germans have done a remarkable job since World War II."

As for Johnson and relations with Congress, Fulbright said, "I think Johnson understands the Senate and how to make (it) responsive to his policies better than President Kennedy did."

Reds Give U.S. Files On Oswald

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Soviet Embassy Saturday turned over Russian consular files on Lee Harvey Oswald, accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy, to the State Department.

The files, presumably containing information on Oswald's unsuccessful application for Soviet citizenship in 1959, were immediately delivered to the FBI to aid its investigation of the assassination and Oswald's subsequent slaying.

Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin brought the documents, written in Russian, to the State Department Saturday afternoon.

Their contents were not known but they probably referred to Oswald's attempt to become a Russian citizen shortly after he began his three-year stay in the Soviet Union in October, 1959.

The files also may contain information relating to Oswald's more recent application for a Russian visa. He applied for the visa at the Russian Embassy in Mexico City a few weeks ago.

The number or exact nature of the documents delivered by Dobrynin to the State Department were not disclosed. The department confirmed, however, that the consular files were turned over to U.S. officials.

Rosellini Suggests 'Unity Day'

OLYMPIA (UPI) — Washington Gov. Albert D. Rosellini Friday urged President Johnson to designate Nov. 22 — the day of the assassination of President Kennedy — as a "day of national unity" each year.

Rosellini, who is president of the Council of State Governments, said he believed the annual observance of the day of Kennedy's death would "perpetuate the spiritual and patriotic unity which the people of the nation experienced during the days immediately following the assassination."

The governor also announced he would urge the Board of Managers of the council to go on record in opposition to three proposed amendments to the federal Constitution which Rosellini said were backed by the "extreme right wing."

Rosellini will preside over the board's annual two-day meeting Monday and Tuesday in Miami Beach. He said he would present the full details of his proposals at that time.

Group Proposes Erection Of Berlin Wall Crosses

REDONDO BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — A plan to undermine the purpose of the Berlin wall with the erection of a string of wooden crosses is gaining momentum in this Southern California beach community.

If the plan were successful, an estimated 5,000 crosses painted a luminous white would run parallel with the 26-mile cement and barbed wire Berlin Wall separating free West Berlin from the Communist East.

The idea gained local notice recently in an article appearing in the Daily Breeze newspaper.

Then Dr. C.T. Walberg, minister of the First Congregational Church of Christ in Redondo Beach, sought the opinion of West Berlin officials. He said they thought the idea was "terrific."

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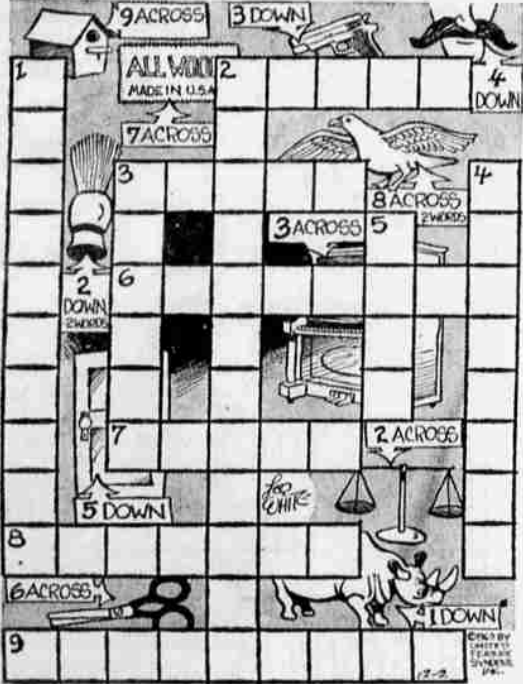
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Pen Saves Man's Life

McAdams had just parked his bus at a service station and taken his day's receipts into the restroom. He was shot as he emerged from the restroom.

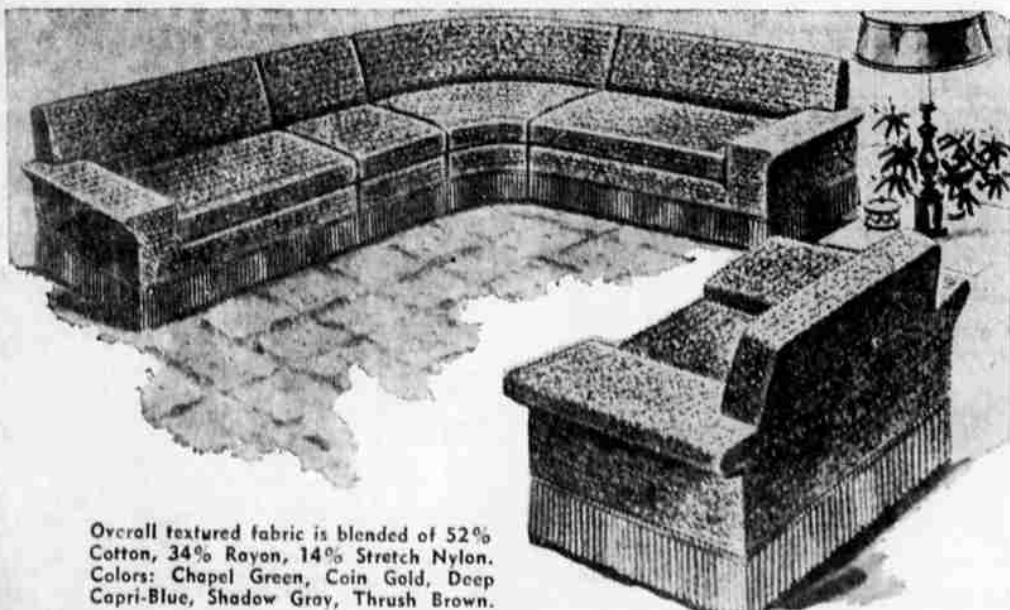


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
