49ers Lose To Rams 21-17; Win First Draft Selection

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners lost the ball game, and maybe coach Jack Christiansen's job, too, but they won the right to pick first today in the National Football League draft.

The Forty Niners, making enough mistakes to lose two games, bowed to the Los Angeles Rams, 21-17, Sunday at Kezar Stadium. It was their 10th loss of the season in 12 games and sixth in eight games since Christiansen replaced Red Hickey as coach. The setback also gave San Francisco the worst record in the NFL today and the automatic first choice in the annual draft of college players.

There was no mistake that Christiansen was disappointed

with the work of journeyman quarterback Lamar McHan in the club's latest loss and, even though Bobby Waters came off the bench in the fourth period to pitch a TD strike on his first play, the Forty Niners more than likely will be shooting for a quarterback, and may even go for one on their first pick.

"We could use a quarterback," said Christiansen, "and some linemen and some defensive backs." The way he lingered on quarterback seemed to indicate he was more than just fed up with the men who have been filling the spot this year.

Brodie Sidelined

Of course, John Brodie has been of little help after suffering a broken bone in his pitching hand early in the season. McHan, signed and shoved into the breach much sooner than anticipated, has been both good and bad. Waters, relegated to No. 3, has been used only sparingly and hardly figures in the club's future plans.

When pressed on the needs of the club—in view of today's draft—Christiansen replied curtly. "I'm not at liberty to say. You can see as well as I what's wrong with the club."

McHan accounted for San Francisco's first touchdown

against the Rams when he connected on a 48-yarder with Bernie Casey while J. D. Smith was on the receiving end of Waters' pitch.

However, three different San Francisco drives were stalled by interceptions, one on McHan in the second period and two on Waters in the fourth. Mike Henry picked the first one off on the three-yard line just when it seemed the Forty Niners would score their first TD. Los Angeles was leading at the time, 14-0.

Costly Interceptions

The two off Waters were especially galling since the time was running out and San Francisco was battling desperately to keep possession.

Roman Gabriel, on the other hand, completed 10 of 23 for 206 yards. He was especially tough in the clutch, hitting for long yardage to set all three Los Angeles touchdowns.

The victory was the fifth in the last seven games for the revamped Rams and assured them of their highest finish in the NFL in the last five years when they had been either last or next to last. For the Forty Niners, it meant their first-ever cellar finish including play in the NFL and the All-American Conference.

Berry Praised Highly For Leading Duck Win

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon's football Ducks—thanks to the magic arm of Bob Berry—held their first win over Oregon State since 1955 and a 7-3 season's record today.

The fiery junior quarterback sparked the Ducks to a 31-14 homecoming victory over the Beavers in a season-ending game here Saturday.

"Berry did a tremendous job, Oregon Coach Len Casanova said after the contest. "He's terrific...the greatest competitor I've ever coached."

"Berry had as good a day as I've seen," Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro said. "His execution was excellent."

The Ducks' signal caller completed 18 of 25 passes for 249 yards and two touchdowns.

Berry's efforts enabled him to break two Oregon season records set by George Sluis in 1934 with 161 pass completions and 1733 total yards. The old marks were 91 completions and 1,536 yards.

Prothro said he'd take Berry over Baylor's outstanding quarterback, Don Trull.

"He does more things than Trull and is a better scrambler," Prothro said. "I'd rather have the scrambler."

Oregon State defeated Baylor earlier this season.

Oregon took a 17-0 halftime

lead on a field goal of 22 yards by sophomore Herm Meister, a 5-yard touchdown pass from Berry to end Corky Sullivan and a 4-yard touchdown run by fullback Lu Bain in the second period.

The Ducks moved in front 31-0 in the third period with touchdowns on a 13-yard run by Bain and a 29-yard pass from Berry to halfback H. D. Murphy. Murphy set up Oregon's first half touchdowns by intercepting passes aimed at the Beavers' Vern Burke.

Oregon State collected 11 touchdowns in the final period on a 6-yard run by halfback Cliff Watkins and a 3-yard run by quarterback Marv Crowston.

It was Oregon's 31st victory to 27 for Oregon State in the teams' 67-game rivalry. There have been nine ties.

The loss left the Beavers with a 3-3 record for the year.

Jimmy Brown rode to glory by land and Y.A. Tittle through the air, but rookie Ron Vanderkelen scrambled his way to fame, just like he did in the last Rose Bowl game.

All in all, it was a hectic National Football League Sunday that produced two records, two tie games and the further tightening of both conference races.

Brown gained 179 rushing yards in the Cleveland Browns' 24-10 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals and set a new NFL single-season record of 1,577. He broke his own mark of 1,327 gained in 1958.

Tittle's winning 17-yard touchdown pass to Del Shobier in the New York Giants' 34-27 triumph over the Dallas Cowboys gave

him a career record of 197 TD tosses, one more than the old mark set by Bobby Layne.

The Cleveland and New York wins kept them tied atop the Eastern standings with 9-3 records while St. Louis dropped back to third with 8-4.

Vanderkelen Shines

Of less permanent significance, but just as heroic among the day's achievements, was the emergency performance of Vanderkelen in the Minnesota Vikings' 17-17 tie with the favored Chicago Bears.

In Sunday's other games, the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Philadelphia Eagles battled to a 20-20 tie; the Baltimore Colts trounced the Washington Redskins, 36-20; and the Los Angeles Rams defeated the San Francisco Forty Niners, 21-17. The Bears, with a record of

nine victories, one defeat and two ties, compared to the Green Bay Packers' nine victories, two losses and one tie, now cannot afford another defeat.

Vanderkelen got his chance to play against the Bears when Fran Tarkenton was injured early in the game. The former Wisconsin star set up Minnesota's first touchdown with a 30-yard pass to Gordon Smith. Vanderkelen then completed a 53-yard pass to Smith for the first touchdown pass of his pro career.

Bears Battle Back

The Bears battled back in the second half, however, to wipe out that 17-3 halftime deficit. Billy Wade went over on a one-yard buck after a Viking punt gave the Bears possession on Minnesota's 49-yard line and

his eight-yard scoring pass to Joe Marconi tied the game with 7:49 remaining.

Jimmy Brown broke his rushing record with a 61-yard bolt in the first period. He scored two touchdowns on short carries to give the Browns a 21-3 halftime lead and they coasted home from there. Frank Ryan passed 23 yards to Rich Kreidler for Cleveland's first touchdown.

New York, harassed during the first half by a fierce Dallas defense and the rushing of Don Perkins and Amos Marsh, battled back from a 27-14 halftime deficit to win. Three of Tittle's passes were intercepted during the first half before he rallied the Giants.

Steelers Rally

A 24-yard field goal by Lou Michaels with 40 seconds re-

maining enabled Pittsburgh to tie Philadelphia and remain in the running. It was the Steelers' third deadlock this season, and second against the Eagles. The Steelers trailed 17-3 entering the final quarter but battled back on a pair of touchdown passes from Ed Brown to Gary Ballman.

Johnny Unitas, in one of his old-time performances, completed 24 of 37 passes for 355 yards in Baltimore's win over Washington. He threw for three TD's and set up another touchdown and two field goals with his passes.

The Rams made it five wins in their last seven games when Dick Bass scored two second-period touchdowns and Art Perkins added another in the win over San Francisco. The win assures Los Angeles of its best record in five seasons.

Babe Parilli survived a case of "rabbit ears" and now can relax from hometown Boston jeers while he tries to steer the Patriots to an Eastern Division title in the American Football League.

Parilli, beset by Beantown taunts of "take him out," quarterbacked two touchdown drives in the second half against Buffalo Sunday for a 17-7 victory and a first place tie with Houston.

San Diego helped set up the deadlock by clobbering Houston, 27-0, while New York edged into the tight Eastern picture by disposing of Kansas City, 17-0, to move within a half-game of the lead.

Boston plays its "crucial" game against the Oilers in Houston next Sunday and closes out the season at Kansas City on Saturday, Dec. 14. So any future boing of Parilli by the Boston fans will have to be directed at their home television screens.

Cougars Rejoin Big 6 For Basketball Season

PULLMAN (UPI) — Washington State rejoins its Big Six brothers this season as a full basketball member after five years in exile following the demise of the old Pacific Coast Conference.

But the green crew which staggered through a 5-20 record last year will have to give evidence that it is ready for the better competition this time around if Cougar hoop fortunes are to rise.

Couach Marv Harshman welcomed back five of his top six scorers from the 1962-63 squad and has 10 men from which to choose his starting contingent.

About the only man sure of a job is 6-1 playmaker Byron Vadsset, who led all scorers last season with 385 points and a 15.4 average.

Ted Werner, 6-8 junior center, is being pushed by 6-5, 190-pound sophomore Walt Frieron. Werner ranked right behind Vadsset with 239 points and led the Cougars on the board with 218 rebounds.

Harshman says "as a team we should shoot better this season," and shooting will be the factor which decides the outcome of the donnybrook going on for the other three starting positions.

Pushing for the job opposite Vadsset are Jim Walton, 6-1 senior who was third in scoring last year with 235 points; 5-11 sophomore Tom Tommervik, and footballer Dennis Kloke, who should be ready by the first of the year.

At forward, Jim Knostman, 6-7 junior scored 40 points and grabbed 56 rebounds, and squadman Ken Hammer and Brent Watson, who scored 32 points between them, are the choices. Football quarterback Dale Ford, a junior who scored 156 points, will be in the running when he makes the transition from the football field to the court.

SEATTLE (UPI) — University of Washington football coach Jim Owens today began making preparations for his third trip to the Rose Bowl in five years.

The Huskies earned the right to meet Illinois in the annual New Year's Day classic by defeating Washington State 16-0 here Saturday to wrap up the Big Six Conference title.

All-Coast fullback Junior Coffey bulled to two touchdowns to lead Washington to its triumph over its arch rival from the Palouse Country. The win gave the Huskies a 4-1 conference record and a 6-4 mark for the season.

Bowl Pick Celebrated

SEATTLE (UPI) — Rose Bowl fever Saturday night infected nearly 500 University of Washington students and caused a demonstration which took two hours to quell.

Shortly after word came that Washington was going to the Rose Bowl, students began pouring into the streets of Greek Row, the fraternity sorority house area near the campus.

School songs, shouts and blasts from horns filled the air—then amok.

A bonfire in the middle of the street blazed brightly for over an hour while students threw mattresses, homecoming signs, trees and traffic signs into it.

Firemen were unable to put out the fire until police broke through a student ring around the blaze and dispersed the crowd.

Students let the air out of the tires of one fire vehicle, tied fire hoses in knots and then stood on them to prevent their use. Some hoses were disconnected and hung from trees.

Eggs and tomatoes pelted the fire rigs.

about two hours until word came from conference executive director Tom Hamilton in San Francisco that the Huskies had been picked for the Rose Bowl bid in a vote of faculty representatives.

Southern California, with a 3-1 conference mark and 7-3 overall record, also was in the running.

But Seattle let out a big sigh, and Owens responded with a whoop and a jig on a local television show when the bowl invitation was made official.

Owens got the word directly from Hamilton while the Husky head man was being interviewed on a local television program.

"Congratulations on a fine game," said Hamilton, referring to the win over WSU.

"Oh gosh! Don't keep me hanging any longer," g a s p e d Owens.

Hamilton then began, "It gives me great pleasure to announce that the University of Washington..."

That was as far as he got. Owens let out a whoop, dropped the phone and did a fancy jig for the local viewers. His face lit up like a kid who had just found what he's always wanted under the Christmas tree.

Later Owens said he couldn't pay enough tribute to what he called a young team that had come a long way from the first game of the season. The Huskies dropped their first three contests of the year, then won five in a row before splitting the final two games.

Coffey, who had been demoted to the second string after a disappointing performance against UCLA two weeks before scored on a four yard plunge in the second period and a three yard smash in the final quarter to lead Washington past the Cougars.

The Huskies got their last two

points on the last play of the game when Cougar quarterback Dave Mathieson was tackled in the end zone.

A homecoming crowd of 55,000 saw the annual grudge battle played on a soggy turf under sunny skies. The Cougars dominated play in the first period and drove to the Husky four yard line on one occasion. But Washington threw the Cougars back and took over on the Husky five.

Washington was in charge the rest of the way.
