

Church Group Raps Legalized Gambling

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A resolution denouncing legalized gambling as an "insidious menace to personal character and social morality" was presented to the council's General Assembly for action at today's session.

Approval was assured. The resolution came to the floor with the backing of the National Council's policy-making General Board and the assembly's Resolutions Committee.

It warned that proponents of legalized gambling are pressing in all parts of the country for legislation authorizing "state and national lotteries."

It called upon churches to "arouse their members" for a counterattack against legal gambling which "encourages a distortion of human and economic values."

Also scheduled for assembly action was a resolution condemning all forms of "extremism" in American political life.

It said the assassination of President Kennedy should awaken all Americans to the dangers involved in permitting "hatred, prejudice, and bitterness" to poison discussion of national problems.

"Extremist groups have sowed seeds of dissension and discord, and Nov. 22, the country reaped part of the harvest," the resolution declared.

"The shots fired on that day had as their target a government of law and order... we cannot allow such a scourge to continue unchecked."

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said Mrs. Kennedy will move to a home in the Georgetown section of the capital tent to her by Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman.

Despite the sad break with the executive mansion, one Kennedy will remain on the premises for a time.

Six-year-old Caroline will continue to attend first grade in the White House at least through the end of this school year.

The school is on the third floor of the mansion and is run by two teachers, Elizabeth Boyd and Alice C. Grimes.

Attendance was by invitation only, and most of the students were children of government officials or friends of the Kennedy family.

After the death of Kennedy, President Johnson and Mrs. Johnson insisted the school be kept in operation so that the children would not have their education interrupted in the middle of a term.

Paul VI closed the second session of the Ecumenical Council today with an announcement that he will make a historic pilgrimage to the Holy Land, the birthplace of Christianity.

The visit, planned for next month, will be the first time a pontiff has set foot on Holy Land soil since St. Peter left Palestine and established the papacy in Rome. Peter, Christ's apostle and the first Pope, died a martyr's death in the eternal city in 64 A.D.

It also will be the first time a Pope has left Italy since the time of Pius VII, who died in 1823. Pius VII was taken prisoner by Napoleon and carried to Fontainebleau, France.

The surprise announcement was made by Pope Paul at the end of a half-hour speech closing the council's 1963 session. In the Latin-language discourse, he ordered a simplifying and shortening of proposed decrees in hopes of completing the gathering next year.

He said the "practical implications" of the council's work will be decided by commissions after the great Roman Catholic meeting has drawn to a close.

Shortly before, Pope Paul had promulgated the first two final actions of the council—a decree on the form of public worship and another on modern communications media.

They were the sole final results of the first two sessions of the council which met 79 times. Fifteen other documents remain to be decided on, but three are near completion. A total of 69 faced the council fathers when they first met last year, but they were condensed and combined into the 17.

The next session of the council is scheduled to begin Sept. 14, 1964. It had been expected there would be at least one more session after that, and perhaps two.

The pontiff's announcement that he would try to wind up the council next fall thus came as a surprise.

Kennedys Will Move On Friday

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy will move out of the White House Friday, but it is not known yet when the Johnson family will move in.

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
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
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
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
