The Klamath County Decent Literature Committee has been organized in an attempt to keep obscene material from the eyes of the county's youth. District Attorney Dale Crabtree said Tuesday.

Crabtree, a member of the group, said the committee was organized several months ago from among various organizations which have been concerned about the circulation of

pornographic material at newsstands and other retail outlets.

The primary target of the committee is the licentious paperback novel which could not be branded as obscene literature under state law but yet is in extremely poor taste, Crabtree said.

Fraudulent UF Solicitation Lands Young Lad In Trouble

A 12- or 13-year-old youth who had been fraudulently soliciting donations in the name of the United Fund was taken into custody of the Oregon State Police about 10:30 a.m. Wednesday and cited to appear in juvenile court, the police have reported.

Police learned the identity of the youth through his school and recovered \$10.75 he obtained through the solicitations.

Police were alerted to the youth's activities Tuesday when they received a call from a Klamath Falls woman who said she had given \$8.50 to a youngster who told her he was soliciting money for the United Fund. She said the youth had a label pinned to his clothes which read "United Fund Contest."

The woman later became suspicious and reported the incident to Phil Parsons, executive secretary of the local United Fund, and then to the state police.

Parsons alerted the public that, except for unusual circumstances, door-to-door solicitations are conducted only in small outlying communities, and "in those few instances, we do not engage young people as solicitors," he stressed.

It is our view that adults should do the soliciting, because the campaign is an adult responsibility, he explained.

Parsons said that almost all of the donations collected for the fund are received from individuals through their places of employment. Only retired people, those who have businesses in their homes, or others who have requested that they be contacted personally are solicited at their homes, he concluded.

Murder Charges Filed Against Suburban Pair

Two South Suburban area men were indicted Tuesday by the grand jury for the murders of their wives.

Three other men were indicted by the grand jury on charges stemming from forged checks.

All five were arraigned this morning in the circuit court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper.

Both murder charges are first-degree. They name Eugene Angus Beirele and Oliver Wendell Dixon. Both men will submit pleas to the charges Monday morning.

Beirele is charged with shooting his wife, Gloria Faye, 23, in their home at 1059 Kane Street early Nov. 22. The woman was shot with a rifle in the chest and Beirele, 48, was arrested later that day in downtown Klamath Falls.

Dixon, 32, 1925 Ogden Street,

is charged with the fatal shooting of his 42-year-old wife Nov. 25—just four days after the Beirele incident.

State police said Mrs. Dixon was shot in the Dixon auto on Summers Lane and then Dixon brought his dying wife to the state police office. She died minutes later.

Two of the other three indictments charge Jimmie Lee McCarty with forgery by endorsement on an \$85 check Nov. 22 and Ulysses Ford with knowingly uttering and publishing the same forged check.

The final indictment charges Donald F. Ellis with knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check.

Ellis, who was arrested just Monday after passing two bad checks at a local bank, pleaded guilty to the charge today and will be sentenced Monday.

In other action before Judge Piper today, Willa Claire Riley pleaded guilty to a charge of obtaining money and property under false pretenses and will be sentenced Monday. She was indicted last week by the former grand jury.

Another person indicted last week, Fred Puckett, pleaded not guilty to a charge of non-support of minor children and his trial was set for Jan. 17, 1964.
