Final Stats Give Troy Big Edge

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Southern California lost to Washington in the 1963 Big Six football race, but overcame the Huskies in the battle of statistics.

Final official team figures showed that the Trojans took five categories, Washington two, and UCLA one.

USC won the scoring title with 267 and lowly California second in this department at 193 points. Southern California also held foes to 114 points to edge the second place Huskies, who surrendered 124.

The Trojans also outgained the Huskies in total offense, averaging 331 yards per contest for 11 more than Washington.

Indiana's Court Twins Pacing Scoring Marathon

Indiana's basketball rivals can thank their lucky stars the Van Arsdale twins aren't triplets.

Just the two of 'em are threats to outscore whole teams.

Take Wednesday night when the identical 6-foot, 5-inch forwards combined to score 76 points and lead Indiana to a 106-102 victory over Notre Dame. Dick connected for 15 field goals and 12 free throws for 42 points and Tom tossed in 15 field goals and four free throws for 34.

That tremendous two-man performance earned Indiana its

second straight victory on a night during which Texas Western upset fifth-ranked Wichita, 75-74, and second-ranked Cincinnati squeaked past Miami of Ohio, 60-56.

Jim Barnes scored 32 points to lead Texas Western to the bit upset of the night at Wichita, Kan. Dave Stallworth scored 37 points for Wichita, which suffered its first loss after two wins.

Cincinnati had a close call at home when Miami's Charlie Coles developed a "hot hand" and threw in five straight long-range field goals to reduce the Bearcats' lead from 12 to four

points with 1:34 left. The defense - toughened Bearcats refused to panic, however, and held their lead. Ron Bonham had 26 points and 12 rebounds for Cincinnati.

New York University, ranked No. 3 along with Duke, opened its season with an 82-55 triumph over host Cornell. Happy Hairston had 24 points and Barry Kramer 23 for NYU.

Michigan State defeated Western Michigan, 101-100, and Purdue downed Detroit, 66-60, but the Big Ten's spotless record against outside competition was sullied when St. Louis beat Illinois, 81-78.

In other games St. Joseph's of Philadelphia beat Gettysburg, 73-58; Pennsylvania crushed Rutgers, 91-82; Bradley rolled over Idaho State 101-70; Xavier of Ohio topped Tennessee, 69-57; Villanova beat Princeton, 72-50; and Eastern Kentucky State College defeated the University of Louisville, 78-65.

Woodson Rewriting NFL Runback Marks

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI) — While most of the San Francisco Forty Niners probably will be fighting just to hold their jobs next spring after their dismal 1963 season, there is one member of the team who deserves a raise.

Slim Abe, Woodson is rewriting the record book in the specialized art of running back backs and kickoffs.

He already holds a fist full of marks including most yards from runbacks during a career, 2,938; most kickoff returns in a season, 37; most kickoff returns in a game, 7; and most yards from kickoffs in a season, 1,157.

Woodson has led the loop in kickoff runbacks two years and could become the first man ever to annex three crowns this year.

Lynn Chadnois held the highest lifetime average with a 30.0 record for 90 returns. Abe has lugged back 131 for 30.1 yards per try.

Woodson already has scored five touchdowns on kickoff runbacks, one short of Ollie Matson's mark.

San Francisco Forty Niner coach Jack Christiansen credits Abe's great speed and reactions for his "broken-field wizardry." "Woodson also has the long strides of a hurdler that enables him to glide around a tackler with no loss of speed," Jack adds.

The young coach also had a few comments about Sunday's battle at Chicago against the Bears.

"Even though we beat them the last time out, we're not taking the Bears lightly," he deadpanned.

That Forty Niner was the only time that the Bears have tasted defeat this season, but Chicago has had trouble the past two weeks with ties against Pittsburgh and Minnesota.

Christiansen said the Bears' defense is still muddled, but fumbling, dropped passes and injuries to such stalwarts as Rick Casares and Ronnie Bull have crippled the offense.

Only Forty Niner missing from Wednesday's practice was defensive back Herbert Kimbrough. He stayed indoors, receiving treatment for a muscle pull. Woodson's shoulder was still sore, but he worked out.

Ex-Miami fullback Jim Volenweider of the Forty Niners

applauded the team's drafting Miami quarterback George Mira.

The two players were teammates for one year and Volenweider commented: "If you say everything good about him, you can't go wrong."

Young Bly Team Seen As League Play Nears

(This is the fourth in a series of articles outlining Klamath County B League basketball prospects.)

If any team must be given the basement berth in the present analysis of the Klamath B League, the Bly Bobcats must be accorded this dubious honor.

Coach Wayne Snobzy takes over the cage coaching at Bly this year and in his words, "We'll be the definite underdogs."

The smallest school in the six-team circuit, the Bobcats counted a total turnout of just 12 from a total enrollment of 35 students—and just 15 of these students boys.

The small turnout also prompts the news head man to announce the Bobcats will not

be fielding a junior varsity squad.

The Bobcats will enter a young team into the league wars, with two seniors, one junior, four sophomores and five freshmen.

Three lettermen return from the club which ended the season with an overall record of 2-18.

The tallest of these is Mike Chandler at 6-0 and a senior, while a pair of 5-8 sophomores who won their letter as frosh last year return in Johnny Godowa and Jack Patzke.

All three are one-year veterans. Expected to assist considerably are senior T. J. Nelson (5-0); junior Robert Hunter (5-11); freshman forward John Ashford (5-10) and freshman guard Leon Hutchinson (5-7).

"We could come along and win a couple, but our lack of

experience and depth are the key factors working against us this year."
