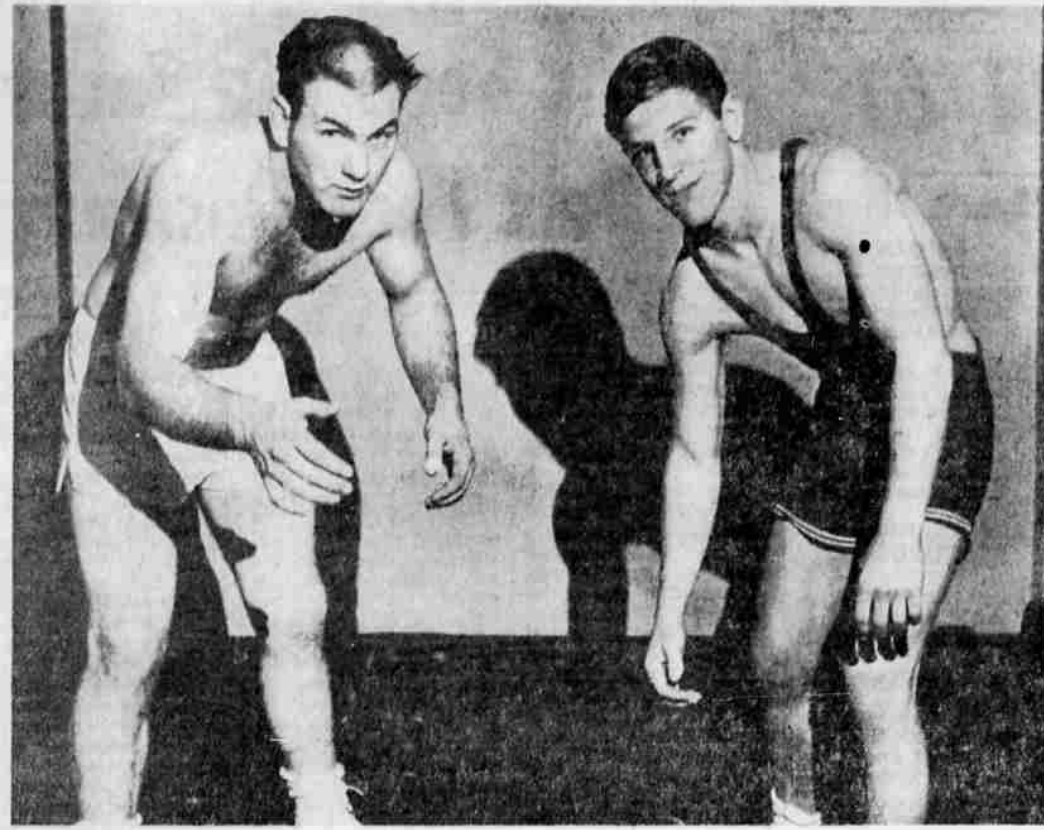


Pelican Grapplers Head Into First Meeting

A turnout of 80 now reduced to 69 grapplers seeking positions on the new Klamath Falls Pelican wrestling team.

This is the early picture for the Pelis as they head into the 1963-64 season Saturday at David Douglas in the annual Scot mat tournament.

A total of 14 lettermen return from the Pelican team of last year which captured third place in the state.

Of this number of veterans, coach DeLance Duncan counts six three-year men headed up by state and AAU 191-pound champion Bob Ewing and Grant Humphrey, runner-up in state and AAU 136-pound mat wars and a member of the Oregon prep team which visited Japan last summer where he posted a 6-3 record.

Another top three-year man is John Stilwell in the 130-pound division and district champion in this class last season. Other three-year vets are Dave and Terry Carnes (115) and Terry Christianson (160), all seniors.

One-year vets are Gary Wishart (121), a senior who has impressed in early workouts; Doug Davis, a junior in the 150-pound class; senior Larry Tice (141); Richard Swisegood, a senior in the 148-pound division; Andy

Martisak (157), a junior; Mike McKibbin (168), a senior; Dave Coulson (178), a senior and Bill Mills, a senior wrestling in the heavyweight class.

Last year the Pelicans took third in the state and second in the district competition and posted a dual match record of 8-2-1.

In addition to the lettermen listed, the Pelis will look to a large group of impressive non-lettermen who have done well in freshman and junior varsity action.

Glen Miller, a 169-pound sophomore, has been particularly outstanding in this group and was last year's district frosh champion in his division.

The Pelis open the new mat season with a pair of tournaments away from home Saturday at David Douglas and Dec. 13 at Grants Pass before hosting their own tournament Dec. 28.

Service Classic On Tap

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — In any rivalry like Army-Navy, the intangibles often play strange tricks and this is exactly what Paul Dietzel will be hoping for Saturday in Philadelphia Stadium.

His psychological warfare campaign against Wayne Hardin and Navy has been a masterpiece, but whether it can change the expected outcome is the question some 100,000 fans will be awaiting at kickoff time.

The Middies have been installed as 11-point favorites and many of the experts are calling the current squad one of the best in the Naval Academy's history.

Navy has an 8-1 record and All-America quarterback, Roger Staubach, which all leads back to the psychological warfare.

Hardin, the Middle coach, is proud of his team's accomplishments and is not afraid to say so publicly. The trouble is, Dietzel has a way of getting these comments to his team.

His favorite quote is one he found after last year's Army-Navy game. He has kept it on his desk since then.

It reads: "The turning point of the game came when we showed up."

"That quote," Dietzel attributed to a very smile, "was submitted to Wayne Hardin." Dietzel then reached into his pocket and began reading other clippings, just as strong.

"These boys can read," he said, "they know what has been said about them by the Navy people."

Despite the psychology, Dietzel realizes it will take a maximum effort to beat the Middies.

"We have a lot of respect for the Navy team," he said, but this is a great challenge. I never went into a game I expected to lose. If you expect to lose you usually do."

'No Money' Venture Parlayed Into Buy

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) —

Trim and slim Jerry Wolman, a Washington 6-footer who went to Washington on a whim and "booted" into a barren strip of land into a building company, had the Philadelphia Eagles to blend into his successful business ventures today.

He picked up the land tract in the capital 10 years ago with "no money down."

He tossed \$5.5 million, plus a few odd thousands, on the table Thursday for the National Football League team and now needs the approval of Commissioner Pete Rozelle and 12 of the other 13 franchise holders to step out as a grid magnate.

He'll keep the team in Philadelphia, he assured all. "There's no question about that," Wolman said. He even plans to move here.

Wolman, whose age is 36, puts his lifetime earnings at an average of \$1 million a year, offered \$5,500,000 for the club, a tab of \$60,000 for each share of stock which cost Eagles investors \$3,000 apiece 15 years ago when the club was purchased from the late millionaire sportsman Alexis Thompson.

A Philadelphia group headed by Credit Corporation head Jack Wolgin bid \$3,100,000, a Cherry Hill, N.J., group which

included race track owner Gene Mori bid \$5,105,000.

A last day bid of \$5,120,000 by a Baltimore group headed by James Keely Jr., former president of the Baltimore Orioles Baseball Club, drew little consideration, for some involved technical reason.

Wolman picked up all of the marbles when the stockholders considered the bids. They also voted that if for any reason Wolman weren't acceptable to the league, Wolgin could make a pitch to Rozelle's office as second highest bidder, and if he failed, the New Jersey group would be next in line.

But, as one observer commented, "with that kind of money and his personality, Wolman should be a cinch."

Eagles President Frank McNamee explained how Wolman was a charmer when he said the new buyer "was acceptable in everyone's opinion, everyone was impressed with him. He met all of the standards, all requirements, and we were pleased with all he did and with all he represented."

"Besides, he put in the highest money," McNamee said.

SEATTLE (UPI) — Richard "Kewpie Dick" Barrett, longtime pitcher with the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast league, pleaded guilty Thursday to a charge of shoplifting.

AFL Pacers Seek Titles

The San Diego Chargers and Houston Oilers go stumping for division titles Sunday in pivotal American Football League games.

San Diego, boasting a 9-2 record that is the best in over-all AFL warfare, can clinch its third Western Division crown in four years with a win over the Raiders (7-4) in Oakland.

Oakland has the longest win streak of the season—five—while San Diego is unbeaten in its last four starts. A sellout throng of 29,500 will fill Frank Youell Field for the rematch.

Houston's task is much tougher. The Oilers tangle with the Boston Patriots in a showdown for the Eastern Division sweepstakes that has become an annual Texas donnybrook for the past three years in Jeppson Stadium.

A Boston victory would give the Pats a 7-5-1 mark and a lever toward ending Houston's three-year reign in the East. The Oilers (now 6-5) dashed Boston's title aspirations about this time last year and in 1961.

In other games, the New York Jets (3-3-1) try to stay in Eastern contention by beating the last-place Bills (5-6-1) in Buffalo, and Kansas City's defending champion Chiefs (2-7-2) entertain the Denver Broncos (2-8-1) in a clash of Western also-rans.
