DEER MEAT CONFISCATED — Some 33 quarters of deer meat have been confiscated by Oregon State Police from a California man who admitted having the deer within a period of two days. The hunter, Patrick Erin Shelp, 27, of Livermore, a one-eighth Indian who has withdrawn from the Klamath Indian tribe, was arraigned in district court by Judge Robert Kerr and released on \$150 bail while the judge takes the case under advisement. The carcasses (above) will be retained as evidence until completion of the case, after which they will be passed on to county institutions designated by the court, state police said.

Unemployment Takes Unexpected Jump

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Labor Department reported Friday that unemployment climbed by about twice the expected amount in November to 3,936,000. The increase of 463,000 in the jobless ranks came as total employment fell by 565,000 to 69,325,000. The key seasonally adjusted unemployment rate climbed from 5.5 per cent to 5.9 per cent of the labor force last month. Department officials, however, said part of this increase was inflated because of statistical deficiencies in their estimates. The jobless rate rose to the highest level since last May as construction jobs and other outdoor projects laid off workers with the coming of colder weather. The department also reported an increase in the number of teen-agers who could not find part-time jobs.

A spokesman for the Labor Department said the employment situation showed basically no change and was "reasonably strong." The number of jobs in nonfarm category climbed by 1.4 million over the year. Unemployment, expected to rise by about 220,000 in November, climbed by more than double that amount. Joblessness was higher across the board for men, women, and teen-agers.
