## Criticism Of Applause Leads To Resignation

WOODLAND, Ga. (UPI)—The principal of a grammar school has resigned after refusing to back down from his criticism of students' applause at the news of President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

Joseph Parham, in a letter to the Atlanta Constitution, charged that "a parent, who by flaunting the law, tolerating hatred and scoring justice, brings a child to hate..." He said criticism touched off by the letter was "almost unbearable."

The Woodland City Council passed a resolution censuring Parham and declaring his letter "does not adequately express the attitude of the Woodland people."

Talbot County School Superintendent Hugh Dixon said Parham "has ended his usefulness here."

In the letter Parham said that 11- and 12-year-old students applauded when told of the late President's death.

Parham refused to appear at a Parent-Teacher Association meeting Thursday night at the urging of Talbot County officials "to apologize" for the letter.

He said he resigned, effective immediately, because "the tensions, misunderstandings and animosities would be greatly lessened by my absence."

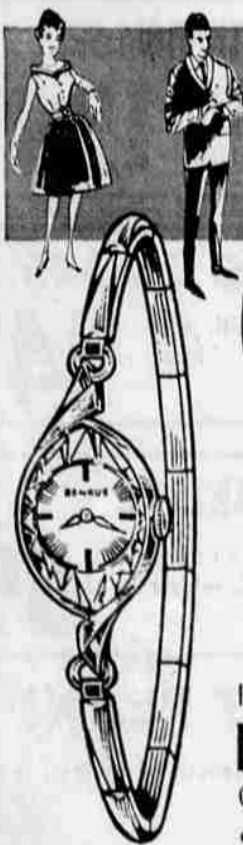

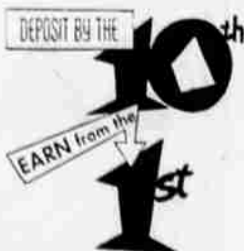
