3 Top Ranked Cage Powers Given Short End Of Score

Cincinnati, Ohio State and Wichita—three of the top ranked college basketball powers—were tripped at the foul line during the season's first big weekend.

Kansas, last in the Big Eight season, stunned Cincinnati in the fading seconds, stealing the consecutive foul shots, to deal the second-ranked Bearcats a 51-47 defeat. The loss was the first for the Bearcats at Cincinnati in 90 games, stretching back to March 1, 1957, when Dayton bounced them.

Duke's Steve Vacendak sank two free throws in the final 46 seconds Friday night to provide the Blue Devils with their 76-73 margin over seventh-ranked Ohio State in the West Virginia Centennial tourney. Duke (No. 3) won the championship Saturday, 86-81, over West Virginia on a second half rally led by

Jeff Mullins, who scored 60 points in the two games.

Dick Ricketts' jump shot at the buzzer gave the Buckeyes a 66-64 consolation victory over St. John's.

Sixth-ranked Arizona State raced to a 93-87 upset over fifth-ranked Wichita, sinking 23 free throws in the process. Dave Stallworth of Wichita scored 43 points and Art Becker totaled 38 for the Sun Devils.

Three foul shots by Brian Generalovich and a basket by Willie Ross in overtime gave Pittsburgh the Steel Bowl championship 69-67 over Duquesne after an official ruled that a last second tip-in by the Duke's John Cegalis, which regulation time, came after the buzzer. George Washington won the consolation in extra time, 87-86 over Westminster.

High-scoring rounds marked the success of the other top 10 members.

Loyola of Chicago, the No. 1 team, clobbered Kent State, 100-59, and 10th-ranked Texas overpowered Tulane 95-63 in Saturday night games.

Tonight's schedule includes Louisiana State at Texas, Kan-

sas State (No. 16) at Indiana and Oklahoma State (No. 19) at Arkansas in the only games involving ranking teams.

Kentucky, No. 11, overwhelmed Northwestern, 95-63, with Ted Deeken and Cotton Nash scoring 29 and 27 points, respectively. Foul shots again were the difference for 13th-ranked San Francisco as Dave Lee calmly sank six charity tosses in the last minute to give the Dons a 64-60 win over California.

Providence (No. 12) outlasted St. Francis (N.Y.), 67-56; UCLA, tied with San Francisco for 13th, whipped touring Butler, 80-65; Villanova (No. 15) trounced St. Peter's, 83-42. Kansas State, tied for 16th, shaded rugged St. Louis, 68-67; and 20th-ranked Bradley stopped Murray (Ky.), 85-78 in Saturday night games.

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Joey Plans Return Go With Tiger

CHERRY HILL, N.J. (UPI)—Carmine Tilelli today became manager of Joey Giardello, the brand new world middleweight champion, and when pilot Carmine congratulated Joey upon the deal, the manager found himself talking to himself because they are the same person.

Giardello, who was christened Carmine Tilelli back in 1930 and still lives outside the ring as Tilelli, sent a check for \$10,000 today to his attorney Mike Del Collo in nearby Philadelphia for purchase of his manager's contract from Arman Lorenzi of Philadelphia.

That \$10,000 was a major part of Joey's purse from Saturday night's fight at the Atlantic City Convention Hall. His purse was estimated at \$12,000.

Arrangements for purchase of the contract were made before 33-year-old Joey won the 160-pound crown from 34-year-old Tiger on referee Paul Cavalieri's 15-round decision, 8-5-2. There are no boxing judges in New Jersey.

As manager-fighter, Tilelli-Giardello notified the press that the "gentleman's agreement" with ex-champion Tiger will be kept and that present plans call for Tiger to get a return shot at the 160-pound diadem in June at New York, Philadelphia or Atlantic City.

Floridian Eyes Top Money In Golf

SEBRING, Fla. (UPI)—Dave Ragan, the blond, blue-eyed "All-American Boy" of pro golf, slipped \$2,500 into the family kitty today and allowed that while golf's big guns talked of the "grand slam," all he wanted in the year ahead was "just one leg."

Ragan teamed with long-hitting, oft-winning Mickey Wright to capture the Haig and Haig mixed scotch foursome tournament against 23 other teams of men and women pros. It wasn't his best check of the year, because he picked up \$7,000 finishing second to Jack Nicklaus in the PGA championship.

But he regarded it, this pleasant, quiet Floridian, as a good omen for the year ahead.

"I really don't think I've come close to my potential," he asserted. "I've taken a definite step forward every year since I turned pro in 1956, except this year. But I know a lot of us have to work harder and longer than others to get to the top and I'm willing to work."

Natural Talent

"Ben Hogan had to work and wait a long time to get there," he added. "On the other hand, fellows like Nicklaus, Ken Venturi and Gene Littler have such tremendous natural talent that they hit the top right at the start. Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer talk of the big slam, but I've got to win one of the four major tournaments before I can start thinking along those lines."

That big "breakthrough" is one of the major events, such as the U.S. Open, the PGA, the Masters or the British Open, is Ragan's target.

He didn't have an "exceptional" year, winning a mere \$30,000. Which shows you the push shape of pro golf today in view of the fact that Ragan was about 30th on the money winning list.

But the 28-year-old from Orlando, who carries a muscular 183 pounds on a five-foot, 11-inch frame, has had moments.

Bogeyed 17th Hole

"I bogeyed the 17th hole in the PGA championship at Dallas," he remembers without a trace of bitterness. "Jack won it. But if I hadn't let myself down, the outcome could have been different."

Still, he earned the largest check of his career and, to boot, went over to Scotland with six other American pros for the "Little Ryder Cup" — later playing in the big one at Atlanta—and won the Dalmahony Senior Service Tournament.

Ragan, who has three children, has turned in enough victories and been close enough to the top in a number of others to figure as one of the top threats. His log includes such as the Eastern Open, the Florida Open, two Florida PGAs, the Waterloo Open, Beaumont and West Palm Beach. He has crowded the \$40,000 bracket the last three years and is a steady, sensible young man devoted to his career and his family.

Anti-Scalp Plan Slows Ducat Sale

SEATTLE (UPI) — The enthusiasm of University of Washington students desiring Rose Bowl tickets has apparently been dampened by nearly 50 per cent this year. The suspected dampener is a special identification system used to prevent possible "scalping" of ducats for the New Year's Day classic, where Washington will meet Illinois.

Ivan Travis, university ticket manager, announced Saturday that Washington students bought day buying period ending Friday.

Some 7,000 student ducats were sold for the 1961 Rose Bowl game in Pasadena, Calif. There was speculation then that many of the spectators in the rooting section were not students and that many student tickets had been resold to the general public.

Travis said the university had expected to sell about 7,000 student tickets again this year. He added that the "leftover" tickets will go to alumni and season-ticket holders.

The new selling system forced Washington students to sign their names on envelopes when they paid for the tickets, which were not given out at that time.

Each student buyer has to pick up his ticket in Los Angeles, where he must match his original signature with another signing of his name.

Bobo Olson Is Favored To Defeat Hank Casey

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Carl (Bobo) Olson, the former world middleweight champion, is a 10-8 favorite to post his fifth straight win tonight when he meets Hank Casey in a 10-round battle that rates as a comeback test for each fighter.

Twice retired in the past, Olson is seeking to battle his way out of debt as a light-heavyweight contender and currently is fifth in the World Boxing Association rankings. Casey, boxing's forgotten man, will be making his first appearance in a ring since May of 1962 when he outpointed Fernando Barreto of Brazil.

The contract calls for Olson to receive a \$3,000 guarantee while Casey collects 55 per cent of the net. Promoter Don Chargin has guaranteed light heavyweight champion Willie Pastrano \$30,000 to defend against the winner.

Balding Bobo, now 35 but still a tough body puncher, probably will go into the corner without a manager. Long gone is Sid Flaherty, who piloted him to the world middleweight crown in 1953. Olson then severed connections last week with Gene Rossetti, who handled him for one fight.

Vanucci of Corsica at the Palais des Sports in Paris Monday night.

Sugar Ray won an unpopular decision over Vanucci in Paris, Oct. 14.
