Tree Plant Bid Given

LAKEVIEW-A ground preparation contract for future tree planting on the Fremont National Forest was let to Ernest Darst early this month.

The contractor is presently using two Caterpillar D-8's preparing "contours" in the old Cox Creek burn. The contours are flat trails approximately 12 feet wide and sometimes one-half mile in length.

The removal of competing vegetation is necessary so that small planted pine seedlings can take root and survive. Pine planted in areas of grass or brush cannot survive because of moisture competition.

Tree survival in prepared areas over the past three years has averaged about 70 per cent of the total number planted. The public is invited to inspect the pine tree plantations.
