

Kentucky Returns As A National Basketball Power With 4-0 Mark

Kentucky is back as a national basketball power — in case no one noticed that they were away.
One man who did notice is Adolph Rupp, the Kentucky coach who has compiled a fantastic 83.6 winning percentage in his 33 years at Lexington. The "Baron of the Blue Grass" suffered through a "dismal" 15-9 season last year, the worst in his career, and uncharacteristically declared he was going into this season with "possibly the poorest outlook for a winning season since I have been coaching."
But the Wildcats appear to be heading back to the top after disposing of strong North Carolina Monday night, 100-80, at Lexington. Kentucky, ranked seventh in the nation in the latest United Press International poll, now has won all four of its games this year, all by substantial margins.

Unbeaten and ninth-ranked Texas also captured its fourth victory of the year by tipping Louisiana State, 70-65.
Roger Suttner, a 7-foot center, paced Kansas State to a surprisingly easy 93-84 win over Indiana. Suttner scored 28 points while Indiana's Van Arsdale twins combined for 40 before both fouled out.
Two other Big Ten teams fared just as poorly. Previously winless Wake Forest held on for a 77-72 upset of previously unbeaten Purdue.
An Illinois rally fell short at the final buzzer as Oklahoma edged the Illini, 105-104. Iowa salvaged some Big Ten prestige by surprising St. Louis, 79-77, on the strength of Dave Roach's 32 points.
Rice rolled to its third victory in four games over an SEC rival with 90-82 whipping of Tulane.
In other major games, Utah routed University of the Pacific, 90-72; Texas Tech won its first game by beating Nebraska, 76-60; Alabama defeated Florida State, 62-53; Mississippi State whipped Delta State, 67-52; Creighton nipped Idaho State, 63-61; Texas Christian topped Houston, 65-59; Oklahoma State dumped Arkansas, 74-65; Seattle defeated St. Mary's (Calif.), 84-69; and Baylor bounced Southwest Texas, 71-61.

He Can Still Smile—He Always Could; Even With Count Of 3-2

SEATTLE (UPI) — You ran out of seat when the big, roly-poly guy was pitching because he always did it the hard way. There would be three men on, nobody out and the count 3-2.
Up in the booth, the radio announcer would be saying:
"Roses are red, violets are blue; Barrett's pitching, it's three and two."
Then "Kevpie Dick" Barrett, grinning, would turn loose that big curve ball. The batter would swing and miss, thump the bat

down on the ground and lecture himself all the way back to the bench.
He'd strike out the next two men, too. You knew it was impossible and wouldn't happen again in a million years.
And the next inning there would be three men on, nobody out, and the count 3-2. The big guy would still be out there. Still grinning.
They talked about him a lot then. "How about that Barrett?" they'd say. "Did you hear what he did last night?"
He fanned 1,860 before he was

through in the Pacific Coast League and it's still there in the books. There was only one way to color him and that was colorful.
Last week, though, he was just another guy on relief when he walked into a Seattle grocery and stole a few pieces of chicken worth \$1.48.
He's 32 pounds lighter now than when he was breaking off that big curve ball. He has cirrhosis of the liver, high blood pressure and diabetes. His legs are swollen and it's pain to walk even a block or two.
He's no saint and he paid for a six-pack of beer before he tucked the chicken pieces into his pocket.
They caught him and hauled him into court but the fine and jail sentence were suspended because he'd never done anything like that before.
"I'm so ashamed," he said. "I hope the kids don't think I'm bad."
When he was on top, he talked at 635 meetings of Little Leaguers and civic organizations.
The world which had forgotten all about Dick Barrett sud-

denly remembered him. A fund has been started and there will probably be the thing he wants most, a job he can do.
They went to his neat apartment where he and his wife live on relief to get his picture for the paper.
"Do you want me to smile," he asked. "I can still smile, in spite of everything."
That he always could.
Especially when the count was 3-2.

Burke Wins Voit Award

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — All America end Vern Burke of Oregon State today was named the winner of the W. J. Voit memorial trophy as the outstanding collegiate football player on the Pacific Coast.
In balloting conducted among Pacific Coast sports editors and broadcasters, Burke beat out Mel Renfro of Oregon by eight points, both receiving seven first place votes.
This was the second straight year in which an Oregon State football star has been named for the Voit award presented annually since 1951 in memory of West Coast Sportsman W. J. Voit. Last year Heisman Award winner Terry Baker was the recipient.
California quarterback Craig Morton was third and Mel Frogt of UCLA was fourth followed by Willie Brown of Southern California, Rick Redman of Washington, Damon Bame and Pete Beathard of Southern California and Mary Harris of Stanford.

Huskies Count Much Experience In Klamath B League Cage Race

Last year it was a dogfight between the Merrill Huskies and the Chiloquin Panthers for Klamath B League honors, with the Panthers winning.
This year it appears the same two teams will be the clubs to heat in the race for the league crown, with the Panthers holding a slight edge.
At Merrill, Husky mentor Jerry Greenfield is minus just one starter from last year's club which came on in the district tournament for a big victory and the state tournament berth which accompanied it.
Although losing starting center Dave Hill, the Huskies have returning lettermen—five—who have gained valuable experience and figure to take the Merrill club a long way.
A slow start was anticipated by Greenfield as the Huskies—most of whom were members of the winning grid aggregation—shed the football kinks

and redeveloped the basketball muscles.
This was apparent in the Huskies' opening two-game set in last weekend's cage jamboree play, where Merrill posted a win over Malin and lost to a strong Henley Hornet five.
"If we start slowly, I feel the kids will come on later. We're lacking in size (6-0 the height of the biggest returning veteran), but I feel hustle could make the difference," Greenfield states.
Returning for a final year is three-year letterman Ken Smith a 5-8 senior guard who paced the Huskies in the two opening games last weekend hitting for 12 and 11 points.
Joining Smith are a pair of two-year vets in 5-10 senior guard Dale Kurtz and 5-9 senior forward Bob Moore.
Why the smaller Moore at forward?

"He has springs for legs. He was our top rebounder last year," Greenfield advises.
The Huskies' veteran height is in one-year letterman Larry Conner at center and standing 6-0. And at the other forward is one-year veteran Marlin Barnes at 5-8. Both Barnes and Conner are juniors.
Figured to see action is junior Jack Cahnan standing 6-3, with junior varsity experience a junior Jim Merrilees at 6-1 and both center candidates.
Three other juniors figured in the Merrill plans are Larry Kurtz (6-0) at forward, Rocky Liskey (5-9) at guard and Bob Merrilees (5-8) guard.
The Husky mentor welcomed a good turnout of 34 candidates this year, with the aforementioned five lettermen.
Greenfield also sees the league as more even than in sev-

eral years, still the Huskies and the Panthers must be ruled the favorites.
The Huskies will use a pattern offense, with a bit of fast-break a possibility on occasion. Defensively, the Huskies have been through the years a zone ball club, but the head man sees a change of this standard defense changing during the course of action this year.
The Huskies opened with a victory over Malin Friday night in the Henley Jamboree and then lost last Saturday night to the host Hornets.
The Huskies return to action Friday night traveling to Bonanza.

Koufax Takes Records

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Fireballer Sandy Koufax of the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers set two records and won or shared four individual titles in 1963 en route to becoming the National League's most valuable player and the major leagues' pitcher of the year.
Koufax' all-around performance was the most glittering of a "pitcher's season" — a season in which five NL pitchers won 20 games and five had 200 or more strikeouts. It also overshadowed the magnificent relief pitching of teammate Ron Perranoski, whose .842 won-lost percentage was tops in that department.
Koufax set a single-season league mark of 396 strikeouts and set a record for left-handers by pitching 11 shutouts, in addition to winning the earned run average title with 1.88 and sharing the lead in victories with 25. He is the first NL pitcher since Bucky Walters in 1939-40 to win two consecutive ERA titles.
The league's other 20-game winners were Juan Marichal of the San Francisco Giants, 25-8, Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves and Jim Maloney of the Cincinnati Reds, 23-7 each, and Dick Ellsworth of the Chicago Cubs, 22-10. Spahn's 20-win season was the 13th of his career and Ellsworth is the first Cub 20-game winner since 1945.
