

Oregon Tech Grapplers Stop Southern Oregon

Chalk up the second win of the season in as many starts for Howard Morris' Oregon Tech Owl grapplers.

The Owls raced to a 15-3 lead over the visiting Southern Oregon Red Raiders at the end of four matches Wednesday afternoon and went on to record a 21-9 decision.

Terry Bond started the Owl victory march in the opening match as he scored a pin over former Klamath Falls Pelican Jim Long in 48 seconds of the second round in the 123-pound action.

John Thennes picked up where Bond left off as he met the Raiders' Frank Issi in 130-

pound action and pinned his man in 42 seconds of the third round for a healthy 10-0 Oregon Tech lead.

The Raiders finally scored as ex-Pelican Trenton Douglas came back to haunt his old home grounds and decided one of the Owls' top men, Hank Isenhardt, by a score of 4-1 in the 137-pound class.

With the score standing at 10-3 for the Owls, it was West Linn freshman Don Reed giving the Owls additional scoring as he added the third pin victory.

Reed met John McKay in the 147-pound class and pinned him in 2:50 of the second round.

Another top Owl matman was upset in the 157-pound class as John Norton was decisively defeated by the Raiders' Don Deplace 5-3 to close the gap to 15-6.

But the next two Owls came on to insure the triumph as Verl Miller and Noah Wright posted decisions in the 167 and 177-pound divisions.

The Raiders closed out the meeting as Joe Cox decisively pinned Jack Kutter in the heavyweight class, 7-3.

The Douglas-Isenhardt meeting was a continuation of a rivalry in which each had posted victories last year—Douglas winning 6-0 and Isenhardt coming back for a 4-2 win.

The junior varsity match also scheduled was scrubbed when the Raiders were not able to suit enough men to make a representative meeting.

The Owls are now off until Jan. 10 when they host Portland State.

However the Owl frosh travel to Corvallis Saturday for a meeting with the Oregon State Rocks.

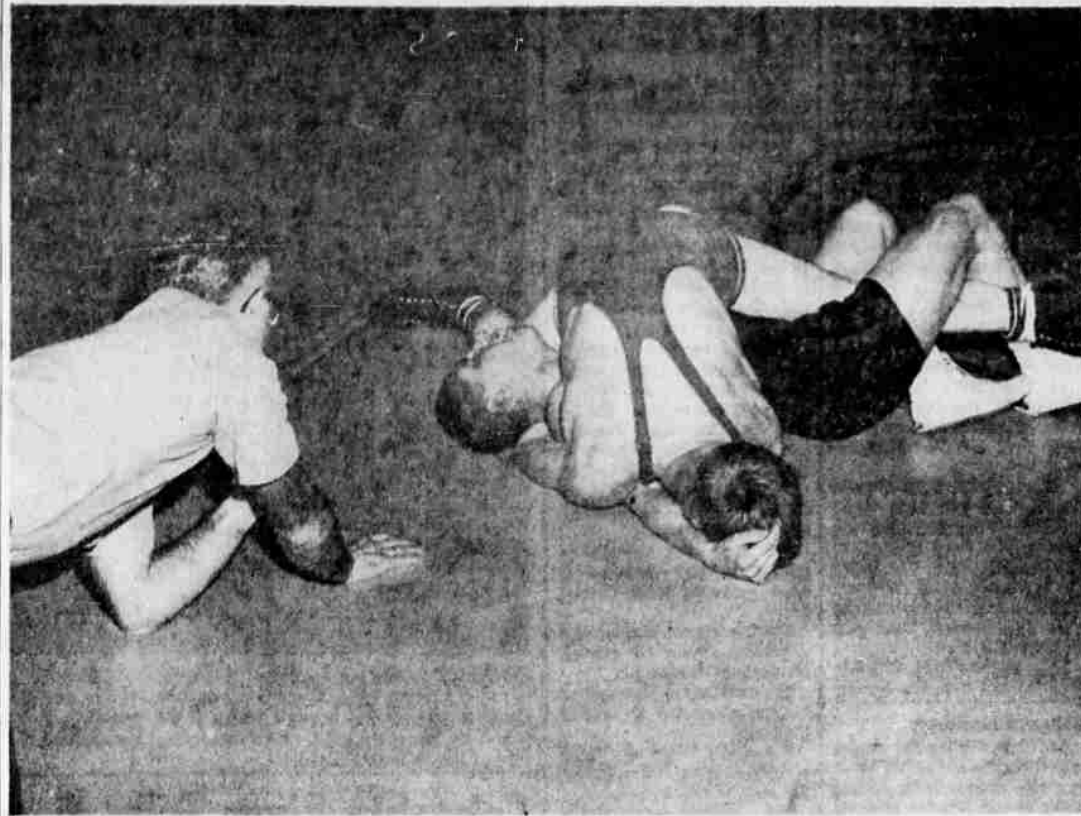

Small Man, Small School Upset Duke

A little guard and a small school proved that size alone doesn't count—not even in basketball—as they combined to score two of the biggest upsets of the college season.

John Ed Miller, the smallest man on the court, tossed in 39 points in a phenomenal shooting display to lead Vanderbilt to a 97-92 overtime victory over second-ranked Duke, and tiny Davidson, the smallest school in the Southern Conference, clubbed 10th-ranked Ohio State, 95-73, in Wednesday night's feature games.

Miller, whose three names only average out to six feet, connected on a fantastic 17 of 23 shots from the floor, mostly on fading jumpers, to stun the Blue Devils.

The victory gave Vanderbilt, ranked 16th in the latest United Press International ratings, its

fourth win in four games. The loss was the first for Duke, which had swept its first three games.

Davidson handed Ohio State its first home-court loss in 51 games and its second defeat of the season. The Wildcats ran away from the Buckeyes in the first half.

Sophomore hot-shot Dick Snyder paced Davidson with 25 points and teammate Terry Holland contributed 22 to the Wildcats' fast-break offense, but Ohio State's All-America center Gary Bradds led all scorers with 26 points.

Unranked Bradley produced the third upset of the night when it stunned Arizona State, the nation's fourth-ranked team, 92-85. The combination of Joe Strawder and Eddie Jackson and a man-to-man press carried the Braves to their victory.

Fifth-ranked Michigan barely managed to keep its head against winless Butler. The Wol-

Next For Pels: Young, Strong Bend Lava Bears

Next for the Klamath Falls Pelicans—a surprising group of young cagers wearing the colors of the Bend Lava Bears.

At Klamath's Pels, fresh from an impressive dual victory over the tall Roseburg Indians, invade the home of the Bears Friday night for the first of two court encounters with Chuck Hudson's five.

The two teams return to Pelican Court, Saturday night, Dec. 21, for the second contest of the home-and-home series.

To say the Lava Bears were impressive in the opening con-

test, they will improve over the next two years to a possible winning season three years from now.

However, he isn't one to discount the possibility of the Bears coming through this year. "They're all young, but having a leader such as Ward (Jack) will help them considerably," Hudson observes.

Ward is a 6-1 senior forward who last year led the Bear scoring figures with a 12.0 per game average and in the opening contests this year hit for 17 points both nights to pace

eye who collected 18 points in the opening contests and ended the season last year with a seven point per game average.

Other height is available in 6-4 sophomore Mark McGinnis and brother Neal (6-0), or in transfer from Taft, 6-1 Clyde Smith.

Against this cage talent the Pels will answer with 6-4 junior forward Terry Ash who laced the basket for 42 points against the height offered by the Roseburg Indians last weekend and displayed polished moves for this early stage of the campaign.

Also 6-6 Gene Kingsbury, who received his first tough basketball test against the Indians and revealed surprising quickness few realized he possessed. This resulted in a 35-point scoring effort in the two nights and placed him and Ash as the top rebounders of the two-game set.

The Pelicans were impressive also in seeing three of the starting five hit both nights in the double figures as backcourt speedster Lanny Guyer came through with a total point production of 24.

But almost as impressive as Guyer's scoring was his feeding of other Pels throughout the series. His numerous assists resulted in two points.

These three paced the Pels in scoring, but the added work of John Jendzjewski and Jim Patzke on the starting five and the relief work of such people as Bob Moore, Larry Binney, and Steve Baker all added immensely to the final success.

This week it's been much work on both offense and defense for the Pels—offense defense for a total point production against the Indians last weekend of 129.

And defensive work despite leading the Indians by 13 points on one occasion Friday night before winning by eight and by 20 points the following night before a 17-point difference was recorded.

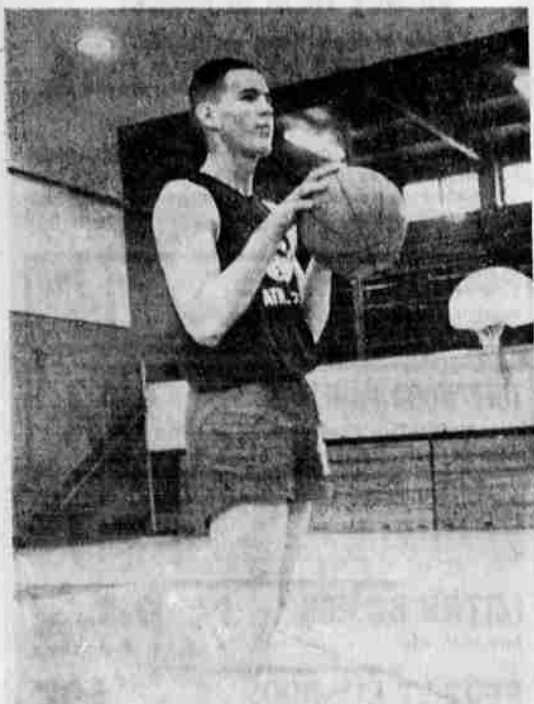
Monday's session was devoted to limbering up and shooting in a short practice, followed by the viewing of game films Tuesday and Wednesday.

Jaycee Wrestling Program Plans Registration Saturday

Began three years ago, the Klamath Falls Jaycees' annual wrestling program for grade-schoolers is nearing the starting time, with the initial registration period set for Saturday at Pelican Court.

The local program, headed up by Jaycee chairman Cliff Paugh and KU wrestling mentor DeLance Duncan, last year drew some 200 youngsters from throughout the Klamath County area.

This year, upwards to 300 are expected to participate in the two plus months of wintertime activity climaxed with a trip to the state Jaycee wrestling tournament at Corvallis in March.

The registration hours Saturday are from 9 until 11 a.m. and those not able to sign up at that time will be allowed to register the following Saturday.

Those boys interested in the program must be accompanied by a parent at the time of registration.

The program is designed for youngsters from the age of 4 through and including 12 years of age and offers the fundamentals of the mat sport.

The program is divided into to age groups and the boys are further divided as to weight.

Each boy is given thorough instruction in the sport by qualified men and each boy given an opportunity of participating each Saturday during the program.

One division is designed to participate from 9 until 10 a.m. each Saturday and the other from 10 o'clock until 11 a.m.

The youngsters wrestle in jeans and two shirts, or shorts may be used.

Participating certificates are awarded each boy at the end of the program and emblems and ribbons won during regular matches and tournaments conducted during the length of the program.

There is no cost to the boys or parents with the exception of a \$5 fee for those boys wishing to participate in the state Jaycee tournament at the end of the program.

In this climax to the season, each boy is eligible and there

is no qualifying wrestling needed in order to enter the state show.

The local program is a part of the state and national Jaycee wrestling program for youngsters.

The local program is open to all youngsters in the county and those able to do so are asked to register this Saturday, leaving the extra day of registration available to those who cannot possibly sign up at the first session.

Since its start three years ago, the kid wrestling program has been well received all over the nation and is rapidly approaching the stature of kid basketball and baseball programs.

Friday night eight basketball frays are slated, with some teams moving into league action and one wrestling test on the agenda.

In Klamath B League action, two counters are scheduled, with the Merrill Huskies (1-1) traveling to Bonanza (0-3) and the Chilcoquin Panthers (2-0) on the road to Malin (1-1).

In a pair non-counters involving Klamath B League teams, the Bly Bobcats (1-1) are at home to Paisley and the Gilchrist Grizzlies (1-2) entertain Westfir.

In California action, Fort Jones joins other teams in the Tulalake Kiwanis Tournament at Tulalake and Dunsuir travels to Etna.

Locally, it's the Oregon Tech Owls opening the home season against the strong Pacific Badgers of the Northwest Conference in a two-game set Friday and Saturday nights.

And the Klamath Falls Pelicans, fresh from a sweep of a

two-game series with the Roseburg Indians last weekend, travel to Bend for the first of two meetings with the Lava Bears.

In wrestling action Friday, the Klamath Falls Pelicans and the Henley Hornets both take to the road for competition in the annual Grants Pass Invitational Tournament.

Saturday night sees Bly traveling to Lakeview for a meeting with the Honker JVs and the Sacred Heart Trojans in their second game of the new season as they travel to Malin.

Paisley moves to Gilchrist for Saturday night cage action, while the Chilcoquin Panthers are expected to receive their most severe test to date in a meeting with the Henley Hornets on the Henley court.

California basketball has the second night of the Tulalake Kiwanis Tournament and Central Valley visiting Dunsuir.

Also on Saturday night, the Oregon Tech Owls entertain the Pacific Badgers in the second game of this series.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — The University of California was in the market for a new football coach today after the surprising resignation of Marv Levy.

Levy Wednesday night quit his job "in the best interests of the university." In doing so, he gave up a year of his two-year contract.

Director of Athletics Pete Newell called it "a very regrettable decision."

Levy, 38, came to California in 1960 from the University of New Mexico, where his teams had compiled a record of 14 wins and six losses.

In the four years under Levy, California annually played one of the nation's most ambitious schedules and wound up with an 8-29-3 mark.
