



(Ed. Note: This column was written early Friday. Late Friday it was reported that Dr. Alex Petersen of Southern Oregon College had been hanged in effigy Thursday night and had been relieved of his duties at SOC Friday afternoon.)

About togetherness—or lack of same... News of a family spat at Southern Oregon College broke this past week and came to light at all places—the annual fall meeting of the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

The head of the Red Raider physical education department, Dr. Alex Petersen, charged Red Raider athletic director and basketball coach, Dr. Ted Schopf, with allowing organized basketball practice prior to the Nov. 1 starting date as prescribed in the OOC rules; and charged the athletic department with issuing athletic scholarships not within the conference grant-in-aid code.

Petersen was quoted by Carl Cliff of the Oregon Journal as follows:

"To me it is as simple as reading it (the conference code). Southern Oregon has been violating two of the rules."

The SOC official went on to cite three basketball practices allegedly held prior to the official starting date and alleged scholarship practices not within the code.

If the events leading up to and including the coup de grace at the conference meeting were not so serious they would be highly humorous.

Not since a rhubarb at Seattle University a few years ago beyond athletic director Eddie O'Brien and Chieftain coach Vince Cazzetta, the culmination of which was the firing of Cazzeta, has such a situation arisen.

And even the O'Brien-Cazzetta fracas was handled within the confines of the school and not offered to one and all at a well-attended confab.

To say the Red Raider cage coach was shocked at the allegations would be a gross understatement.

He had not been forewarned.

And picture this:

Petersen and Schopf leave Ashland by auto for the meeting in Portland and during the 300 some odd miles the two are traveling companions, still no indication is given of the blast to be leveled by one against the other at the meeting.

Then following the meet—the news of which was overshadowed by the Red Raider problem, the two returned to their auto and started the return trip to Ashland.

All Charges Are Denied . . .

Naturally, Schopf would not disclose what might have been said during the return jaunt—but it's a good wager just a small portion might have been printable.

When contacted by the Herald and News, Schopf issued this statement:

"I deny all of these charges. The charges just were not warranted. I feel sorry for the kids. This hurts them and it hurts the entire Southern Oregon College athletic program."

Schopf went on to state . . . there were no organized practices. We had a couple of team meetings prior to the official starting date and only because the kids were eager.

"They wanted to play, so we let them scrimmage and I did watch, but only for a short time. I had other work to do. (Work with the football team.)"

"In my book a practice is working on the court with the kids—showing them the skill of the game and working on plays. "This was never done."

"As far as the scholarship violation is concerned, we have a coaches committee which determines what players are to receive tuition assistance and this practice has always been followed."

Prexy Sees Change Forthcoming . . .

Southern Oregon president Elmo Stevenson was quoted in a wire story Friday, "There will be some changes within a year."

He did not elaborate but an educated guess would be the changes would involve Petersen more than Schopf.

The SOC prexy called Petersen's scholarship charges . . . quite wrong."

"Where Petersen is a little excited is that some scholarships were given without the entire 10-person committee operating. However, no coach has given any scholarship or grant on his own."

He added.

Petersen declined further comment on the action aside from saying . . . other school officials were well aware of the situation."

Petersen had discussed the upcoming action prior to the meeting with other school officials—but not with Schopf!

Seems very strange, indeed.

The Vital Big Game Win . . .

The winning of the "Big Game" continues to be the key to whether a football coach survives a hazardous season at a given school.

The most recent to fall after having lost this highly important encounter:

Mary Levy at California.

Humors of unrest were buzzing through Berkeley after the Bears were overtaken and lost the Big Game to Stanford, 28-17.

Going into the game the Bears were 4-4-1 and had a chance of finishing with a "winning" season.

But, they blew a 17-9 lead in the second half.

Levy was quoted prior to the UCLA game, "If we don't win this one, I'm in trouble."

Obviously, the pressure was on at that time.

Levy's record at Cal was 8-2-3 for four seasons. The Bears won two in 1960, one in 1961, one in 1962 and four this past season.

When he was hired by Cal, he was regarded as the ideal "image" for the big school.

He inherited a tough schedule and an average group of football players.

After the Oregon-Oregon State game, writers spoke of the stirring talk given the Ducks by Len Casanova prior to the game.

Sutherland Won, But Lost . . .

One wonders if words regarding Casanova's possible departure from Oregon might have been used to inspire the Ducks.

The Ducks hadn't topped the Beavers for five years and Cas is a very popular man with his players and in most cases with the almighty fan, and the players accept every word.

John McKay was in big trouble in his first year at Southern Cal prior in the Trojans' Big Game with UCLA. The Trojans came through.

At Washington State, Jim Sutherland won the Big Game with Idaho, but still failed to survive.

It's a great business — so coaching.

But the men in this business know they're a large target each week of the season.

Speaking of the WSU position, the names are being tossed around freely as the man in line to replace Sutherland at the Cougar post including former Cougar grad.

Jerry Williams, a halfback at Washington State in the forties is a prime target.

In high school play he was all-city three years in Spokane, named to all-coast honors for the Cougars and later played pro ball with the Rams and Eagles.

Friendship Ends With Check . . .

Then there's the story of the \$2-ticket paying off \$24,102.60 last week at Miami, Fla.

Chiloquin Rallies In Second Half For 65-44 Triumph Over Mustangs

The strong Chiloquin Panthers were forced to break away from a fired-up band of Malin Mustangs Friday night at Malin in the second half in order to preserve their undefeated mark in league and overall action.

Dave Sigado's crew broke up a tight contest with a 17-point output in the third period to go on and record a 65-44 triumph over the Ponies.

The Mustangs employed both the zone and man-to-man defense, while the Panthers stayed with the latter alignment the entire route.

In the JV prelim, the Mustangs posted a 64-30 victory, with Mike Kenyon and Kenny Longdon pacing the host club with 19 and 15 points respectively.

Saturday night the Mustangs returned to action entertaining the Sacred Heart Trojans, while the Panthers were at Henley.

The Bobcats now return to action next Friday night as they host the Malin Mustangs in a Klamath B League contest.

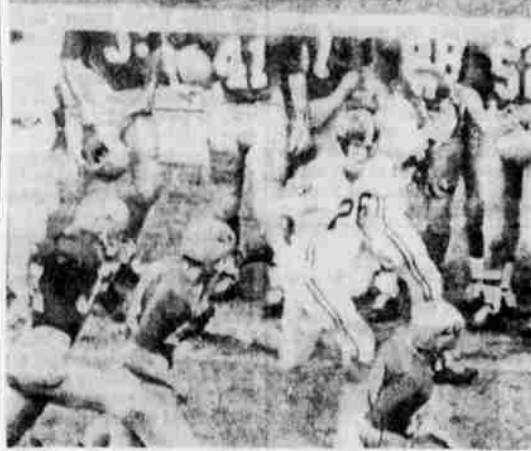

Parseghian Signs Notre Dame Pact

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI) — Notre Dame, never able to beat Art Parseghian's Northwestern football teams on the field, hired him under a four-year contract as coach Saturday to try to restore the Fighting Irish to their former days of glory.

Parseghian, 40, quit with one year remaining on his contract as coach at Northwestern to take the Irish job. Wildcat Athletic Director Stu Holcomb said Northwestern willingly released Parseghian.

Parseghian, head coach at Miami of Ohio for five years where he had a 39-6-1 record, tutored the Wildcats for eight years, posting a 36-35-1 mark.

In four straight years against the Irish, Parseghian won every time, 30-24, 7-6, 12-10 and 35-7, from 1959 through 1962.

"We feel very fortunate in securing the services of such an outstanding coach as Parseghian," the Rev. Edmund P. Joyce C.S.C., executive vice president of Notre Dame and chairman of the faculty board in control of athletics, said.
