

Luxury Gift List Includes Chinchilla Peignor, Blue Fox Fur Blanket, Rolls Royce Certificate

NEW YORK (UPI) — Memo to Santa: Forget the new housecoat I originally requested for Christmas. Instead, remember me with a floor-length chinchilla peignor.

Skip past the new draperies I said would be welcome for the big bedroom. Cut instead instead imported blue fur blanket with matching pillows for the bed.

Never mind I mentioned I could use a new wool for the office. Make the list read instead a fur coat dress of

black broadtail — plus dinner date with today at Le Pavillon to show it off.

Rolls Too
We want to go not by mere tail but roll up by Rolls with chauffeur courtesy of a gift certificate which you can — if you're feeling really elegant — drop into our Christmas catalog.

Such luxury offerings mentioned are appearing in infinite variety this year, indicating there are a lot of people with a lot of money to spend on gifts. Walk in any store to see what I mean.

That floor-length chinchilla peignor (Saks Fifth Avenue) goes for \$14,000.

The blue fur blanket, to fit a double bed, are \$1,800. Matching pillows are \$65 each (both from Georges Kaylan, New York).

The assortment on fur variations in the luxury class turns out to be amazing. Several furs and fur departments in stores offer mink lap robes, mink duffel bags, blue fox or mink slippers for \$500 each. And one furrier (Kaylan) offers mink boots with leather sole and low stacked leather heel

or \$150 a pair. There's a white mink throw from one store (Saks) for \$600; it also offers for coat dresses a variety of pelts including black broadtail priced at \$5,000 and jaguar for \$3,000.

For Men
One chain of men's stores (A. Sakai) has turned gnomes, far from an Andes mountain animal with a coat similar to vicuña, into lap robes in natural shades of beige and white to sell for \$750 each.

Vicuna remains a luxury fabric; a man's vicuña robe is available for \$600. Vicuña car

muffs, in turn, are a mere \$7 per pair.

But it's in the jewelry world that the costliest gifts abound.

One store (Neiman-Marcus) offers a catseye necklace with matched stones surrounded by diamonds priced at \$19,000. One jewelry firm in New York (Cartier) offers a cushion-shaped emerald ring set on platinum and surrounded by diamonds for \$175,000. An 18-carat gold mesh evening bag, envelope shape, with a diamond border is available for \$4,000. Another evening carryall with a gold and diamond design is \$9,000. A diamond necklace choker goes for \$85,000.

What may well rank as the world's most precious picture frame consists of 100 diamonds arranged in a scroll of 13 carat gold. The frame, two and one-half inches tall, sells for \$2,500 (Vanetta, New York).

Other luxury gift items available:

At least one New York limousine rental service (Blackburn Livery, Inc.) offers gift certificates for Rolls Royce rentals including a uniformed chauffeur for \$10 an hour.

Men's umbrellas with copper and sterling antique handles at \$50 each; a vicuña sports shirt (plain polo style) for \$100; a silver and gold, 18-carat humidor, shaped like a drum for \$200.

A heads up falls coin for tossing, \$64; a good golf tee, \$10; a sable lapel brush in gold case \$27; a lifetime nail file of sapphire and diamond crystals, \$12.

For the kiddies, a train composed of electric locomotive and Pullman car which can haul the "engineer" and five of his playmates, priced at \$1,500 with track.

And of course everyone's already heard of that "has" and "her" submarine, which it's marketers call the "ultimate in togetherness" for \$10,700.

Relief Aid May End For Exiles

MIAMI (UPI) — If the federal government ends its \$2.5 million monthly relief aid program to some 32,000 Cuban refugees here next year, "the result will be chaos in Miami," some exiles predicted Saturday.

Others, acknowledging the Johnson administration's "right" to economize, said they are asking for "arms and the right to fight Fidel Castro, not relief checks."

There was mixed reaction to apparent plans for an end to the relief payments in 1964. Physically handicapped exiles, and those who are sick or aged would be exempted.

But John F. Thomas, director in Washington of the U.S. Cuban relief program, told a news conference that all eligible refugees who refuse to accept settlement in other cities will be dropped from the Miami relief rolls.

He did not specify an exact date for the cutoff but said all job resettlement interviews are next March 31. Thomas said the move is "not connected" with President Johnson's economy drive.

Although more than 71,000 refugees have been resettled from Miami since 1961, this city continues to be the hub of exile activity with perhaps as many as 150,000 Cubans residing here.

Sees All The Cards

East wins the first trick with the ace of spades and returns a trump whereupon South is able to run all the rest of the tricks.

Had East simply led the ten of spades at trick two the story would have been entirely different. South would have had problems in every suit and would have probably wound up making either two or three hearts, but not any more, so East's lead at trick two cost him six at least three tricks.

In double dummy play declarer has the same advantage you readers have. He can see all the cards! Therefore he makes plays he would not attempt in a real game.

With that advantage he wins the second trick with his king of spades, leads a diamond to dummy's queen, cashes the ace, ruffs a third diamond, finesses dummy's ten of hearts, cashes the king, and is finally ready for the key double dummy play. He leads a fourth diamond from dummy. East's best play is to trump and South must not overruff. Instead he discards a spade from his hand. East has to lead a club whereupon South gets back in dummy, leads his last diamond to get rid of his last spade. Thus, South winds up losing one spade and two trumps and makes four odd.

DEAR POLLY — When painting chair legs, put each leg in a jar cover placed upside down on the floor. This allows room for the brush to get around the legs and the cover catches the paint drippings.
