Soviets Plan More Cuts In Military

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union, which has announced a \$600 million cutback in military spending over the next two years, said today that the possibility of "some further reduction" in the strength of its armed forces is being contemplated. The disclosure was made by Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, as discussion continued in the Supreme Soviet on the budget and economic plan for 1964 and 1965. The military spending cuts were announced to the Supreme Soviet Monday. They are part of the steps Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is taking to provide funds for his \$46 billion program to treble the capacity of the chemical industry in the next seven years. He hopes to use the increased production of chemical fertilizers to solve his farm crisis. Pravda charged the United States was trying to "aggravate tension and worsen the atmosphere around Cuba" and repeated its warnings that "revolutionary Cuba will not remain defenseless if attacked by aggressors."

But at the same time, the newspaper called for peaceful coexistence between the capitalist and Communist world. "The U.S.S.R. not only calls for a bigger effort aimed at improving the international climate," it said, "it seeks its readiness for this by important practical deeds." City police said the thieves broke a pane of glass from a side window, then reached in and unlatched the window to gain entry. The money was taken from a cash box in a desk. Officers said the amount would be over \$100.

Defendants Rest Case

The defense rested its case this morning as the trial of Colleen Crume, 31, and Darlene Sanchez, 22, indicted on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, entered its second day in the circuit court of Judge Robert H. Foley of Bend. Judge Foley is relieving Judge David R. Vandenberg Sr. who has been away from the bench since October because of illness. The state was scheduled to present its case following a recess which came as the defense concluded its testimony. The defendants are accused of having assaulted a Klamath Falls man with a gun and a meat cleaver.

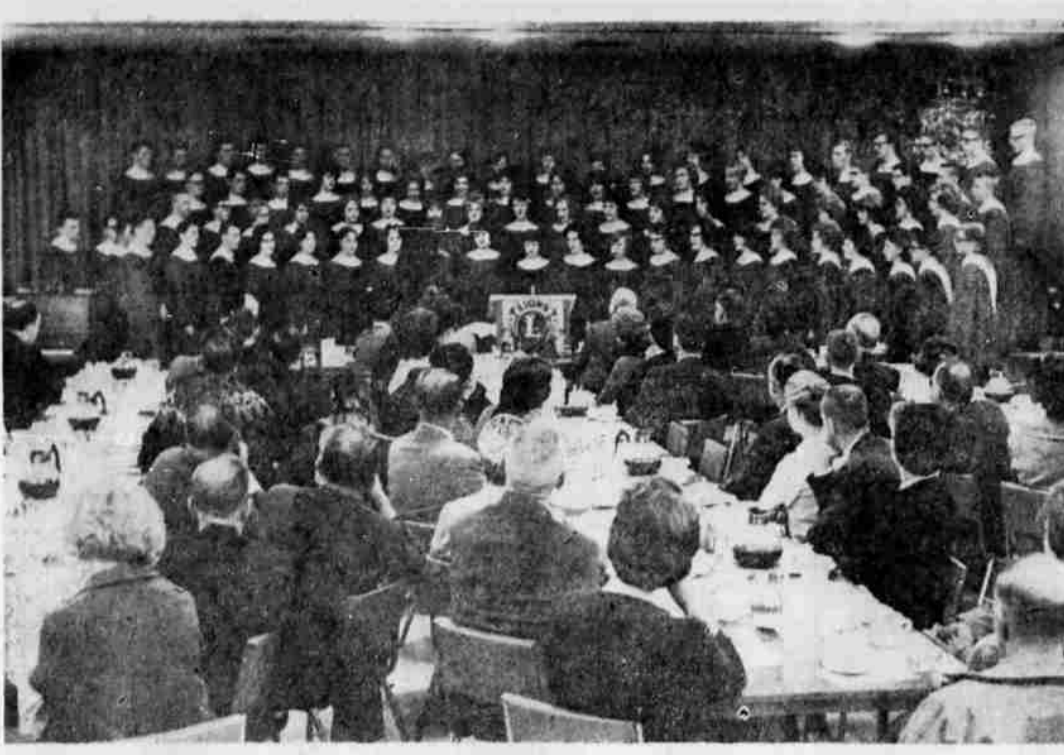

Geese 'Flee' Iron Curtain, Fly To Washington, Oregon

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI) — Half a dozen high-flying snow geese crossed over the Iron Curtain last season, flew more than 2,500 miles and were shot down by Washington hunters, the State Game Department said today. All six geese had been banded on Wrangle Island Ostrov Vrangelya, Soviet territory within the Arctic Circle about 550 miles northwest of Nome, Alaska. Bands on the geese were forwarded from the State Game Department to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to the U. S. State Department and then to the U.S.S.R. Academy of Sciences. Four of the geese were banded in 1962 and two in 1961, the Soviets said. Burton Lauckhard, chief of the state's Game Management Division, said the bands confirmed a long-standing suspicion that the birds pass up Alaska to nest in Siberia.

Africans Besiege Kremlin

MOSCOW (UPI)—An estimated 400 African students demonstrated outside the Kremlin walls in Red Square for four hours today against the death, in allegedly "suspicious circumstances," of a student from Ghana. There was no violence, however, and the students dispersed in an orderly manner by passing through cordons of Soviet militia (police). The students, protesting against allegedly general mistreatment of Africans within the Soviet Union, said the body of a Ghanaian student had been found dead beside some railroad tracks north of Moscow. The dead student was identified as Asira Adde. Qualified Soviet sources said that Adde had been found dead near Kalinin, about 100 miles north of Moscow. The students claimed the body was found naked, but the sources said it had been fully clothed. The Soviet sources claimed that an autopsy showed Adde
