8 -- Pushaway

When Dick Hoover first started setting the bowling world afire as a teen-age prodigy, it became perfectly obvious that one thing he did better than anyone else was the pushaway.

This action triggers the entire approach and, properly executed, it activates the forward motion that is so essential to a proper swing.

Hoover pushes the ball forward smoothly and gradually and on a downward plane. Perhaps pushaway is a bad term for the action because the ball

is gently shoved rather than rudely pushed by Hoover. There is nothing jerky or quick about the action.

Dick advances the ball just slightly to the right. He warns you must avoid advancing the ball to the left. It must go either straight ahead or slightly to the right.

An improper pushaway can cause the ball to be late or arrive at the point of release too soon.

Huskies, Panthers In Top County Cage Play

Five area cage contests draw fans tonight—games figured to offer a sufficient amount of excitement to last fans during the brief lull which follows during the holiday vacation.

The No. 1 contest locally and expected to furnish the inside information on the eventual Klamath B League champion is scheduled for Merrill.

In this counting fray, the Huskies host the Chiloquin Panthers and both teams will be battling hard for the important win.

For the Huskies, a win will place them back in a more favorable position for a return trip to the state tournament.

And for Dave Sigado's Panthers, a triumph will increase their early hold on the top rung of the league ladder and enhance their chances of repeating as title winners.

The Huskies take a 1-2 overall record into the contest, while the Panthers are 3-1—the lone loss coming at the hands of the No. 3 rated A-2 team in the state, Henley.

League standings give the Panthers a 1-0 record and the opposite for the Huskies. Chiloquin's league victory came last Friday night over Malin, while the Huskies were being upset on the same night at Bonanza.

While two Class B cage powers are fighting it out at Merrill, the surprise early league winner, Bly, hosts the Malin Mustangs in a fray equally important to both clubs.

The Bobcats, who moved to a 1-0 league mark by virtue of the initial upset of the season on the opening night over Gilchrist, will attempt to fight off

the talented Mustangs who have lost four contests — one in counting action.

Gilchrist and Bonanza — the latter team sitting atop the league standings with a 2-0 mark — are both idle this week-end.

And this is the picture for the Klamath B League clubs.

Meanwhile, the Henley Hornets tangle with the Pleasant Hill Hillbillies tonight in the second game of the invitational four-team tourney at Pleasant Hill.

In the first contest, last year's state champion Central meets Oakridge.

At Pelican Court, the Sacred Heart Trojans seek to raise their record to 2-1 as they face the Klamath Falls Wildcats in the preliminary contest to the Pelican — Bend clash.

The Trojans collected the first victory of the season last Friday night at Malin. The Wildcats dropped a pair of frays to Tulelake before coming back to grab the Tulelake Kiwanis Club Invitational Tournament title with a victory over the Honkers last Saturday night.

The other contest involving an area team is at Lakeview where the host Honkers meet Eagle Point in the second game of the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Tournament.

Saturday night Lakeview and Henley return to tournament action, while Sacred Heart hosts Malin in a non-counting.

Wrestling action Saturday afternoon has the Henley Hornets hosting the Ashland Grizzlies in the first home dual match of the season. Starting time for this session is 1:15 p.m.

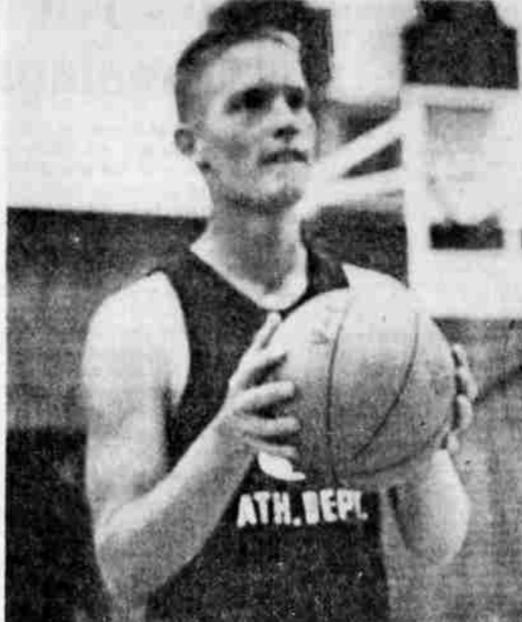

Return Match Scheduled Tonight On Local Court

The Pelicans have been waiting a long week.

Tonight's the night as they receive the opportunity of making amends for a 55-50 defeat handed them last Friday night by a young, but powerful Bend Lava Bear quintet.

Al Keck's club has had but one thing in mind during the week's practice sessions: Playing the brand of ball tonight as was played in the season opening contests against Roseburg which resulted in a pair of impressive victories.

This type of ball was not played against the Lava Bears last Friday night.

"Bend won that game. They simply outplayed us all through the game."

"There are certainly no excuses. They out-hustled us up there. We missed shots we shouldn't have and we lost the ball too many times."

"But, I think the kids will be ready tonight — if the practices this week are any indication."

So states the Pel head man prior to the return encounter. Hustle has been available this week in large portions during the Pelican sessions.

Offense and defense have both received equal time in the effort to return the Pelican game to the lofty status it attained prior to the season opener against Roseburg.

Determined, not discouraged, would be the apropos description of the Pelicans all through the week's work.

The net result has been brisk work in all sessions and the indication is the Pelicans will be ready.

The biggest chore facing them seems to be in containing 6-1 senior leader Jack Ward.

The Bears' leading scorer hit for another 17 points last Friday night to give him a three-

game total of 51 points.

His season average to date is 17 points per game—five more than his average ending the season last year when he led the club.

Another Bear sure to receive close attention from the Pel is Mike Clark, a 5-10 senior guard who hit for 19 points in the first meeting between the clubs.

However, the Pelicans cannot concentrate on any pair of Bears, as the Bend team possesses good bench strength and may call on any one of the three seniors or the numerous sophomores and juniors in any given lineup.

This has been a large boost to the Lava Bears' winning season thus far.

Last Friday night the Bears set their sights on three Pelicans—Terry Ash, Gene Kingsbury and Lanny Guyer and held them to a season low in scoring.

However, both Ash and Kingsbury handled the boards well, as the former grabbed 14 rebounds and Kingsbury 18.

This trio also left the contest prior to the end via five fouls and whether this had a bearing on the outcome is only problematical.

In the first contest it was the Bears' shooting ability at the charity stripe eventually proving the difference between the teams as they hit 21 of 31 attempts, while the Pel were held to eight of 19 tries.

In the field work the Pel hit 21 of 17 for the Bears.

Another tight contest between the teams is expected, with the shooting accuracy both at the line and in the field obviously a key factor but as important will be the board work.

The Pel handled the boards well in the first meeting, but still did not capitalize on this work in the form of additional points.

Bear mentor Chuck Hudson, a 1952 graduate of Lewis & Clark College now in his third year at Bend, describes his team as having "... a better attitude and they have more

ability" than his previous Bear teams.

Based upon the play of the Bears a week ago, the Pelicans would have to agree.

A tentative starting lineup for Bend would have Ward and John Landgren (6-1) at forwards; George Woodworth (6-4) at center and Doug Williams (5-9), Jerry Curl (5-7) or Clark at the guards.

The Pel are expected to go with Ash (6-4) and John Jendrzejewski (6-1) at forwards; Kingsbury (6-7) at center and Guyer (5-8) and Jim Patzke (6-1) at guards.

Tipoff time for the contest is 8 p.m., with a preliminary contest slated for 6:15 p.m. between the Sacred Heart Trojans and the KU Wildcats.

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'Uncle Bill' Picks Up Large Tab For Liston-Clay Championship Go

MIAMI (UPI)—Sunny Liston and Cassius Clay fight for the world heavyweight championship at Miami Beach on Feb. 25 thanks to an unlikely looking "angel" named William Bernard MacDonald Jr.

MacDonald, who bankrolled the third Floyd Patterson-Inez Johansson title bout at Miami Beach in 1961, guaranteed \$825,000 for delivery on the two fistie bodies two months hence. He may pick up a few "chips" in the process but his honest reasons are for "kicks and out of civic spirit."

Which makes him more of a sun-burned Santa Claus in this instance than an "angel."

And MacDonald actually looks more the St. Nick part. A pink-skinned, portly man, he lacks the white beard but is noted for his ever-present smile and unfailing joviality.

"Uncle Bill," as he is known to his intimates, is an acknowledged sports nut. He is a 45 per cent stockholder and treasurer of Tropical Park race track, owns a 160-acre horse farm at Del Ray, Fla., owns the Tampa Tarpons baseball team, formerly owned both the Atlanta Crackers and Portsmouth Tides ball clubs and is chairman of the National Advisory Board of the Professional Golfers Association.

The 35-year-old MacDonald once tried to buy 25 per cent of the Washington Redskins. He owns a 50-foot yacht, is chair-

man of the Miami Horse Show to be held in early February and plays to a 10 handicap at golf with memberships at Key Largo and La Gorce, Fla.; Burning Tree, Md.; Battle Creek, Mich.; C. C.; Deepdale, N. Y.; Olympia Fields, Chicago; Bellaire, Los Angeles, and Dorado Beach, Puerto Rico.

Born in Butte, Mont., MacDonald was educated in Boston and started his business career in Chicago with a taxicab firm. Soon he became a conductor on a double decker city bus and quickly proved his business acumen.

"The bottom deck was for the company," he grins. "The top deck was for young Willie."

But he had signed as driver and, when they insisted he get behind the wheel and took the finances out of his hands, Bill quit "or I might have 35 years seniority today as a Chicago bus driver."

Next he started his own New York to Chicago bus line, made \$250,000 when he sold out, tried to parlay that and went broke. After that he had the parking

concession for a Miami Beach hotel, delivered new trailers and was one of four people licensed by the government to provide emergency trailer housing at wartime construction sites. With the profits, MacDonald started buying up trailer factories until he had 10 and wound up selling them for \$6,785,000 — "all cash, no trading stamps."

While he was in the trailer business, MacDonald had a 68-foot job complete with swimming pool which he displayed at major golf tournaments. Once he asked Johnny Weissmuller, the former Olympic swimming champion and movie "Tarzan," to dive into the pool at the Los Angeles Open for a fee of \$5,000. Weissmuller asked for \$1,000.

"Okay," said Bill, "but I won't put any water in the pool."

"For a thousand," said Weissmuller, "I'll dive into a damp rag."

You don't talk "dives" in connection with prize fights, of course. But it seems unlikely

that benign, jovial "Uncle Bill" will take a "bath" in the Liston-Clay embroglio. As the old saying goes, "Them as has, gets," and MacDonald was born a winner.

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
