Connie came to Silver Lake in 1949 as a bride. These years of practical experience, plus her training for a nursing career, led to her leadership in reaching out to provide adequate and economical ambulance service for the area.

When the North Lake County Disaster Unit became a reality there remained a need for organization to see that volunteer drivers and first aiders were on call. This responsibility, Connie would assure, is made much easier with telephone service in the area.

At present 16 persons are available to assist in an emergency. About half of these aided by this group are local residents who became ill or suffered from an accident.
