

Pelicans Score Revenge Victory Over Bend Bears

Kingsbury Hits For 29; Lumberjacks Stop Invading Oregon Tech Quint

PELICAN COURT—The Pelicans returned to opening season form here Friday night.

The play was on the ragged side occasionally, but the clutch play returned and this was the difference as the Pelis reversed the decision of one week ago and handed the Bend Lava Bears a 73-63 setback.

Big board work and bang-away shooting took the Pelis to this triumph as they received yeoman work from both Terry Ash and 6-7 Gene Kingsbury in hauling down the rebounds at both ends of the court and a new individual scoring high for the young season by the big guy.

Kingsbury completely erased any doubts which might have existed as to his ability to handle himself well in the rough rebounding work as he hauled down 22—a new game high for him in this department.

In dominating the action underneath, he also hit for 29 points to pace all scoring in the contest.

Perhaps overlooked by some—but not by the Lava Bears—was the big hand he raised numerous times to bat away Bend shots.

Unquestionably, it was his finest performance to date.

Between Kingsbury and Ash, the Pelis gave the Bears few scoring opportunities, with Ash grabbing 23 rebounds for the individual game high in this department.

He also added 15 points to the Pelis' winning total.

Despite the final 10-point difference between the teams, the contest was close throughout, with the Pelis holding only slim margins.

Four times the fray was deadlocked in the first period including a 13-13 standoff at the first rest stop.

And the Bears, hustlers all the way, moved into two-point leads in the first and second periods at 9-7 and 15-13.

But a hook by Kingsbury gave the Pelis the final tie of the contest at 15-all and a steal by Ash at the 6:53 mark of the second chapter moved the count to 17-16 for the Pelis and from this point they never headed.

Credit must be given to Larry Binney, a 5-8 speedster guard, who came off the bench in the second period to give the Pelis a shot in the arm as he used his speed and quickness to score on drives and steals.

The Pelis' Al Keck dipped into his reserve strength again as the fourth period opened.

This time it was Steve Baker entering the fray as a replacement for the Pelis' big gun, Kingsbury, when the latter was assessed his fourth foul.

It was a tough position in which to place Baker, but he came through with good work in the four minutes Kingsbury was out of the fray and remained in the contest to tally vital points as the Bears continually closed the gap to within a few points.

After one of the largest leads of the evening had been taken by the Pelicans at the intermission—eight points at 40-32—it was a case of the Pelis fighting off the determined and speedy Bears the balance of the fray.

And the third chapter almost became the fatal period for the Pelis as the field shooting dropped drastically.

59-50 on his field and then it was George Woodworth and Mike Clark leading the battling Bears to a three-point deficit at 62-59, with 2:47 left.

Kingsbury reappeared for the Pelicans and Ash hit for three additional points and Kingsbury a pair of gifters to rake the score back up to a more comfortable 67-59 count.

Jack Ward popped another long shot in for the Bears at the 1:59 mark and then the Bears began their press.

Doug Williams added two points to the Bear total via the free throw line before Kingsbury's hook made it 69-63 and Baker went in on a solo as the Pelis cracked the press again to make it 71-63. Ash closed out the scoring at the line with but 10 seconds left hitting a pair of free tosses.

The Pelis cast off 88 times hitting on 30 of these shots for a .337 mark, while the Bears hit 24 of 52 for a healthy 476 average.

It was the outside shooting of

John Lundgren and Clark—both with 17 points for the Bears, hurting the Pelicans the most.

"We were able to beat them out front, but that big hand of Kingsbury's really did the job," was the principal thought of Bear mentor Chuck Hudson.

The Pelican head man was pleased with the work of all members of his club and singled out the work of Binney and Baker as outstanding.

Next weekend the Pelicans host Sweet Home in a two-game set Friday and Saturday nights.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Mel Counts scored 15 points in the second half to help once-beaten Oregon State overcome a four-point halftime deficit and post a 56-52 basketball win over Indiana before 9,123 persons Saturday night.

The 7-foot senior center, who set a modern Oregon State scoring record with 42 points in a 70-57 win over the Hoosiers Friday night at Corvallis, wound up with 21 points and 21 rebounds.

Jim Jarvis scored 16 points and Frank Peters had 13 as Oregon State recorded its seventh win of the season. Dick Van Arsdale tallied 16 for Indiana, which now has a 4-4 record.

The Hoosiers held a 24-20 halftime lead and were in front 28-23 early in the second half. The Beavers went ahead to stay at 30-29 on a three-point play by Counts with 5:55 left in the game.

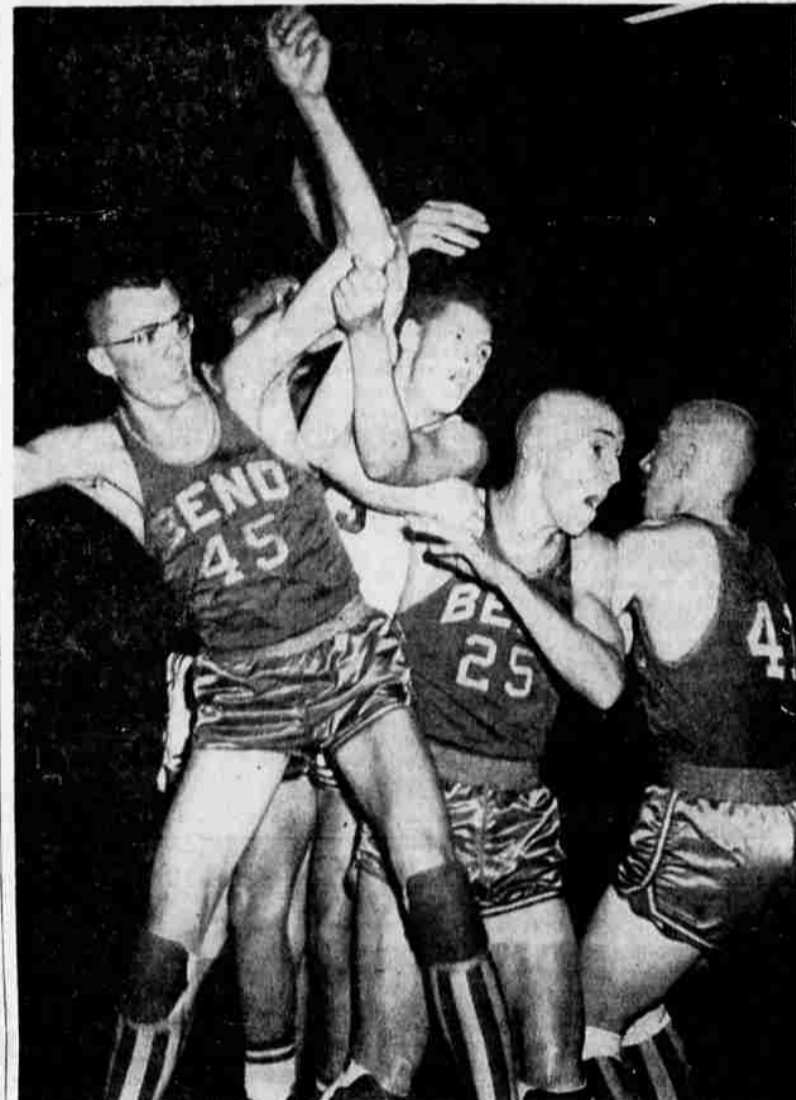

Mira Hurls South Stars To Victory

MIAMI (UPI)—George Mira, the passing wizard of Miami, hurled his Dixie comrades from behind a two-touchdown deficit Saturday to lead the South to a 23-14 victory in the 16th annual North-South College All-Star game.

Mira, voted the South's most valuable player, thrilled a sparse crowd of 19,129 in the Orange Bowl as he pitched for two touchdowns, passed for a pair of two-point conversions and set up the clinching touchdown in the final quarter.

Mira's touchdown tosses were to Clem Dellinger of Tulane and teammate Nick Spinelli, while his two-point conversion passes were gathered in by Spinelli and Duke's Stan Crisson contributing the other point by placement. Dave Casinelli of Memphis State plunged over from the two for the final quar-

ter score.

Jack Concannon of Boston College, voted the outstanding North star, seemed bent on breaking the game open in the first period when he scored once and passed 26 yards to Floyd Webb of Iowa for another touchdown, Gary Fletcher of Iowa kicking both points. But from then on, Mira took over and the North never denied the goal line again.

Mira, whose team won only three games this season against six defeats, displayed the poise and proficiency which caused the San Francisco 49ers to sign him to a pro contract as he flipped 27 completions in 42 attempts for 365 yards. Only one interception marred his day.

Concannon, signed by the Philadelphia Eagles, completed 12 of 25 for 247 yards and also ran for 20 yards.

Raiders Favored

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI)—The Oakland Raiders, chasing a virtual mirage in the form of an American Football League title, were 6½ point favorites Saturday over the Houston Oilers for their game Sunday.

Coach Al Davis' comeback also was seeking its eighth straight win in a bid to overtake the Western Division leading San Diego Chargers who host last place Denver on the same day.

The Chargers only need a win to clinch the division title, but the Raiders could force a playoff if they defeated Houston while Denver upset San Diego.

"We'll settle for a win," Davis said of what looked to be the Raiders final game of a terrific comeback bid. They go into the contest with a 9-4 mark, a far cry from last season when they lost 13 out of 14 contests. Davis was hired after the fiasco and made coach-general manager with a three-year contract to hire and fire as he saw fit.

Either Jacky Lee or George Blanda, the latter 36 years of age and hobbled with a bad ankle, was slated to open at quarterback for the Oilers. If Blanda took over his old spot, he was expected to uncork his famous passes from a deep spread.

Tom Flores, whose five touchdown losses paced Oakland to a 35-31 scramble over Denver last Sunday, was listed as the Raiders starter at quarterback.

Archie Matsos, who has been trying to work the kinks out of a sprained ankle is pronounced set to play middle linebacker again for the Raiders. Injuries have sidelined Billy Cannon, the Oilers veteran back.

Houston (6-7) is ending its poorest season since the AFL was formed.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Michelle Kay Morrison, 20-year-old Oregon State University education major, has been named queen of the 1963 Far West Basketball Classic here Dec. 26-30.

The selection was made by the Portland Linebackers, an athletics booster group.

Miss Morrison of Ione was one of eight queen candidates from schools participating in the tourney.

Knicks Top Boston 'S'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Knickerbockers broke a nine-game losing streak while handing the Boston Celtics their fourth defeat of the season, 127-117, before 8,702 at Madison Square Garden Saturday night.

The Celtics tied at 90-96 with eight minutes to go in the fourth quarter and stayed close until Bill McGill and Bob Boozer combined to pull the Knicks into a 10-point lead with a minute and a half left in the game.

Frank Ramsey fouled out with 4:47 to go and Clyde Ovellette, Boston high scorer with 24 points, had drawn his fifth foul two minutes earlier.

Six Knicks scored in double figures.

Long Losing Skein Grows

DETROIT (UPI)—The St. Louis Hawks slipped past the Detroit Pistons Saturday night, 106-91, the 20th loss of the season for the Pistons.

HUMBOLDT STATE COLLEGE, Arcata, Calif. — The Oregon Tech Owls ran into a hot-shooting group of Lumberjacks here Friday night as a 76-50 defeat was handed them.

The Lumberjacks went into an early lead and built this advantage into a 38-22 score at the end of the first half.

Only 64 field tries were attempted by the 'Jacks, but of this number 30 crashed through to give them a game average of 47.8.

Meanwhile, the Owls were held to just 34 attempts, hitting on 18 of these for a .333 mark.

Four Lumberjacks scored in the double figures, with Tom Bush leading with 18 points.

Rich Lyons, Ralph Anderson and Mike Glines again paced the Owl scoring, however, all fell below their usual output. Lyons hit for 14 points, Anderson for 10 and Glines added eight.

Rebounding was handled by the Lumberjacks by a 22-22 count, with Lyons leading the Owls in the department with five.

For the Owls, the story was the same as in past contests—too much height going against

them.

This advantage, plus the uncanny field accuracy of the Lumberjacks made the difference.

For Humboldt State, the win was the first in five starts, with a pair of losses inflicted by both Southern Oregon and Willamette.

The setback was the sixth consecutive for the young Owls.

The two teams met again Saturday night in the second game of the two-game series.

Lumberjacks Take Second From Owls

The Oregon Tech Owls were handed a 70-65 setback by the Humboldt State Lumberjacks Saturday night in the second game of the non-counting series at Arcata, Calif.

Playing what head man Jim Partlow described as "... their best game of the season by far," the Owls led through most of the contest before losing the lead midway in the second half.

The Lumberjacks also held a slim 35-34 edge at the intermission and in the latter part of the

second half increased a new-found lead from two to 10 points.

The Owls cut the margin to three points by using a full court press, but numerous baskets later hit by the Owls were ruled out when steps were called on the Oregon Tech club.

A total of 11 points were lost by the Owls because of this infraction during the contest.

The Owls controlled the boards despite the size of the Lumberjacks by a margin of 41-35.

Big efforts by the Owls resulted in four players scoring in the double figures paced by Rich Lyons with 17, Mike Glines with 16, Mike Werlin with 11 and Ralph Anderson with 12 points.

The Lumberjacks were led by York with 22 points.
