Leading the list is Bruce Brickner, the all-stermer from KU who has gained a No. 1 berth on the University of Washington varsity.

Last year as a freshman, Brickner was the second leading scorer for the Washington Pups ending the season with an average of 11.8 points scored per game.

Brickner's fine hook shot is one of principal reasons for his addition to the Huskies' varsity as well as top rebounding work.

His 6-7 height gives the Huskies five players at this altitude with Clint Peeples at 6-9 the tallest on the squad.

With Peeples going at the low post and Brickner handling the high post chores, the Huskies have a potent one-two combo.

Brickner played on the Klamath Falls team of 1961-62, with the Pella taking the state title and compiling a glowing record of 23-3. He was also a three-letterman in baseball.

Returning for his first varsity year with the Oregon Webfoots is ex-Klamath Falls star Wally Palmberg.

The son of the former Oregon State All-American, Wally Palmberg Sr., sat out last season after action with the Oregon Frosh the previous year.

Ex-Hornets In Rook Plans... Meanwhile, at Oregon State, a pair of former Henley Hornets are seeing action with the Beaver Rooks.

Kent Gooding and Mike Beymer are both first-year men with the Beavers and figure to see much action for Jay Carty's Rook club.

Both were highly instrumental in the Hornets of last year ending the regular season with a 22-0 record and a berth in the state tournament.

Gooding, with his 6-7 height and Beymer at 6-0 and with fine outside shooting, both figure prominently in the Rooks' plans.

The height of Gooding is bettered only by 6-11 Mike Erlingheuser of San Gabriel, Calif.

Another former Klamath Falls player seeing action in the collegiate varsity ranks is Wayne Dennis (6-1) and a member of the Oregon Tech Owl varsity.

Numerous former Pelican cage opponents are now seeing action with Oregon, Oregon State, Oregon Tech and Gonzaga.

Former Conference Foes Listed... At Oregon State are Rex Benner of Grants Pass, with this 6-2 guard or forward now in his senior year; and seeing much action for the Beavers is Medford's Scott Eaton, a 6-3 sophomore forward.

At Oregon Tech are Mike Glines, the 5-8 speedster from Crater and Bruce Bray, a 6-2 forward from Medford.

At Gonzaga are Al Hutchinson (6-2) from Grants Pass and 5-11 Gibb Mitchell of Medford.

All are playing varsity ball. On the freshman teams at Oregon and Oregon State are Mike Cotton of Ashland who stands 6-1 and Bob Shepard of Grants Pass at 6-0 for the Frosh, while on the Rook squad is Rich Benner (6-2) of Medford.

These are some of the players local fans have seen in action during the past few years either with the home club or with the opposing team, now continuing their athletic activities with college clubs.

Latest Rule Change Interesting... Every year the powers who insist upon changing basketball rules and this year they seemingly have come up with a change already the cause of much unfavorable talk.

This is the rule which deals with the clock stopping each time the whistle is sounded.

The rules makers sought to allow, among other things, more opportunity for coaches to send players into the game.

In this they succeeded. But at the same time, the time required to complete a contest has been extended and the scores of the contests increased considerably.

With the clock stopped with each whistle sound, the length of time needed for a contest now has increased from 15 to 20 minutes.

Bob Blackburn, who announces the Oregon State games, has felt the extra time as much as any as he figures another 15 minutes needed for a broadcast which in turn raises the amount of money needed to defray line charges over the season as much as \$500.

Scoring Marks in Danger... The fans who enjoy a high-scoring contest should be happy. An example was in the recent NAIA Tip-Off Tournament in which Oregon Tech participated.

In three contests played during this tourney—not by the Owls—the scores ran 87-75, 104-97 and 112-96!

All that's needed now is for the rules committee to also insert the 20-second rule—now in effect among the pros—into the high school and college rules and all previous individual scoring marks and team records would vanish.

The coaches who advocate the race-horse brand of basketball are hindered by the new rule which requires the official to hand the ball to the player on the out-of-bounds play.

No more grab the ball and run and if the opposing team is a believer in the zone defense, this alignment is well-established before the run-and-gun club can move.

Officials, too, are feeling the new rule. The extra time required to play the contests results, naturally, in their working longer for their just due.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dick Jones, Pendleton, Ore., quarterback, was named to the first team on Parade Magazine's first annual All-American High School Football Squad announced today.

Two hundred high school, college and professional football coaches selected the three-team squad.

Jones had a 63.5 per cent completion average in passing and led his team in an Intermountain League championship.

The only other Northwest player to make the squad was George Jugum, a guard at West Seattle High School in Washington. He was listed on the second team.

Counts Cracks Oregon State Scoring Mark With 42 Points

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Magnificent Mel Counts poured in 42 points and collected 24 rebounds to lead Oregon State's Beavers to a 70-57 basketball victory over the Indiana Hoosiers Friday night.

The 7-foot Counts scored 18 points in the first half and added 25 in the second half to break Oregon State's modern school scoring record. He hit 11 of 24 field goal attempts and made 20 of 25 free throw attempts.

The previous modern record was 38 set by Counts against Washington State this season and Red Rocha against Idaho in 1947. The school mark is 47 set by Nollie Reed against the Winlock Athletic Club in 1907.

The decision left the Beavers with a 6-1 record and the Hoosiers with a 4-3 mark this season. The teams meet again tonight at Portland.

Oregon State, behind 31-30 at halftime, broke the game open with eight straight points to run up a 46-37 lead with 15 minutes remaining.

The Klamath B League contest at Merrill Friday night more than lived up to pre-game expectations.

The host Huskies and the Chilcoquin Panthers battled into a single overtime before the Panthers scored a 70-65 victory.

The win boosted Dave Sigado's Panthers into a tie for first place in the league standings with the Bonanza Antlers at 2-0 and increased the overall record to 4-1.

For Merrill, it was the second league setback and the third of the year against a single victory.

The contest was close throughout, with the Panthers holding a 13-8 first quarter lead and the Huskies roaring back in the second period to sweep into a halftime advantage of 27-22.

The Panthers out-scored the Huskies 22-17 in the final chapter, but it was a free throw converted by Ken Smith with 19 seconds left giving the Merrill five a deadlock at the end of regulation time, 61-61.

In the overtime period the Panthers hit for nine additional markers while the Huskies were held to just four.

Hitting for the Panthers in the vital period were Orr Miller with three, Don Taylor with two and Tony DiLillo paving the way with five.

Dale Kurtz added a field goal for the Merrill total in this period and Rocky Liskey two free throws.

DiLillo topped all scoring in the fray as he laced the basket for 26 points. Three other Panthers hit in the double figures, with Leonard Wilder adding 14, Miller 15 and Taylor 10.

The Huskies were led by Marlin Barnes with 17, while Smith added 12 and Kurtz 14. Barnes received plaudits from the Huskies' head man Jerry Groeneveld for outstanding work

both offensively and defensively. The Merrill mentor also paid tribute to the four Panthers scoring heavily against his quintet.

Both teams are now off until the new year arrives, when the Panthers face Bonanza at Chilcoquin Jan. 3 and Merrill tries Malin Jan. 7.

By United Press International Grant and Jefferson, pre-season choices to fight it out for the Portland Interscholastic League title, were beaten in high school basketball action Friday.

'Fighter-Of-Year' Falls To Carter Via Knockout

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Rubin ("Hurricane") Carter, who scored the knockout of the year over the "fighter of the year," today challenged for a shot at the world middleweight crown and was backed by a \$100,000 offer to champion Joey Giardello.

Fresh from his amazing first-round knockout over welterweight champion Emile Griffith in Pittsburgh's Civic Arena, Carter and Manager Carmen Tedeschi demanded a shot at Giardello's 160-pound title.

Matchmaker Teddy Brenner of New York's Madison Square Garden, speaking in the capacity of a fight-television producer, announced:

"We are offering Giardello a \$100,000 guarantee to defend his title against Carter at Las Vegas, Nev., on April 3."

Giardello, who won the crown from Nigerian Dick Tiger on Dec. 7, has stated that he prefers to defend against Tiger in a return bout. Brenner scoffed at that today by saying, "A return with Tiger wouldn't draw big money like a fight with Carter."

Suddenness Stuns Crowd A frigid-night crowd of 5,436 was so stunned by Carter's technical knockout victory at 2:13 of the first round that several seconds seemed to elapse before it broke into cheers.

The non-title match drew a disappointing \$28,742 because of the record Dec. 20th six-below-zero temperature and because of the proximity to Christmas.

Griffith of New York, 24, went into the ring favored at 11-5 because he never had been knocked out in his previous 42 fights and because his record-breaking third-time capture of the welterweight (147-pound) crown from Luis Rodriguez on June 8. Also, because of his speed, punch and stamina.

Spokane Head Quits

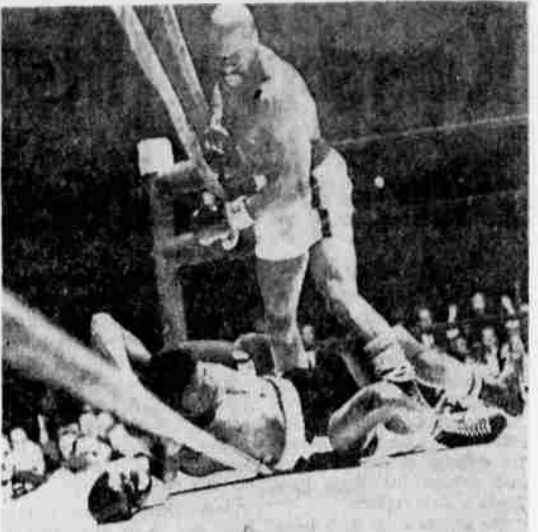
SPOKANE (UPI)—Bill Folk, general manager of the Spokane Jets Hockey Club, Friday announced he will resign.
