KU Senior Represents School In Award Test

Pamela Conn, KUHS senior, will represent Klamath Union High School in the District Good Citizen Award contest, sponsored by the Eulalona Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Pam was chosen on the basis of many qualities: dependability, including truthfulness, loyalty and punctuality; service—cooperation, courtesy and consideration of others; leadership—personality, self-control, ability to assume responsibility, patriotism—unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation. The contest is open to girls in the senior class of an accredited public high school who will finish school the second semester. The goal of the contest is to cultivate among young people the appreciation of character building as a basis of good citizenship. Students of the KUHS senior class selected three candidates possessing the necessary qualifications. From these three the faculty selected the good citizen to represent the school in a district contest. The district winner will be chosen by the Eulalona award committee, headed by Mrs. Tom Tenney. District winners will compete for the state title, and a national winner will be chosen from the state representatives.
