

# Skating Classes Set For Moore Park Rink

The city Parks and Recreation Department today announced that skating classes will begin Jan. 6 at the Moore Park rink, assuming weather conditions are favorable.

The department said persons desiring to register for the classes should do so by calling the recreation office at city hall or appearing in person.

Mrs. Gail Carter of Klamath Falls, a former member of the Sonja Henie Ice Revue, will conduct the classes.

Classes will be offered for beginners and more experienced students. Also one- and two-student private lessons will be available.

All classes for both adults and children will consist of four one-hour sessions and will cost \$1.50 per person for the course. Private instruction will be given for \$3.50 per half-hour of instruction.

Each public class will be

made up of a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 20 students. Beginning high school students and adults will be taught on Monday and Thursday, 2-3 p.m., for two weeks. Beginning women will be taught Tuesday and Friday, 2-3 p.m. for two weeks.

Experienced high school student and adult classes will be on Monday and Thursday, 3-4 p.m. and experienced women skaters will be taught Tuesday and Friday, 3-4 p.m., both for two weeks.

Beginning and experienced children will have four days of instruction, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of one week. The beginners will be 4-5 p.m. and the experienced children, 5-6 p.m.

## Register Date Set

New students are required to take the placement test to be given Jan. 22 at 6:30 p.m. on the college campus.

## 'Atomic' Type Explosion Shatters Anti-Freeze Warehouse In Indiana

HAMMOND, Ind. (UPI)—An explosion described as "something like an atomic bomb" roared through a huge burning warehouse storing anti-freeze Monday. One fireman was killed and 19 persons were injured.

For a time it was feared several firemen might have been caught in the flaming debris but all were accounted for.

The firemen were pouring water on the Iliana Transit Warehouse when the pre-dawn explosion blasted the building and collapsed a section of it. The explosion was heard for miles.

"The impact was something like an atomic bomb," policeman George Magurny said. "It mushroomed out and was followed by a suction."

**Knocked To Ground**  
One fireman was knocked about 20 feet. A newsman, Gene Langley of station WJOB, said he was knocked to the ground, and when he came to his senses he ran to a police car and shouted in the radio, "there's been a terrible explosion here. Send all the help you can."

The injured were taken to St. Margaret Hospital. All were firemen except one, Richard Wylie, a Chicago Sun-Times photographer. Aides said seven of them were treated. Most suffered from smoke inhalation and cuts.

The dead man was identified as Francis Volk. He was standing by an engine and was killed outright by a flying object.

The rig had pulled between the burning warehouse and, an adjacent building and it was showered with flying debris. It was because of this that officials feared for some time that firemen might have been trapped under the rubble.

**Victims Identified**  
The hospitalized were identified as Paul Kochis, Robert Alexander, Fred Vahst, Robert Jens, Fred Smolen, Jack Wilson, Asst. Chief John Novaklich, Michael Sanders and Fred Kocel.

The fire was brought under control about 7:30 a.m. CST. An official of the firm said the warehouse, a one-story

building of steel and corrugated metal construction, contained an undetermined quantity of anti-freeze and soap. The official said he had no idea what caused the explosion or what the damage would amount to.

Observers said the warehouse was a total loss and only a shell was standing. The explosion collapsed a section about 50 yards long. The warehouse covered 60,000 square feet.

## Shadow Of John Kennedy Over Scene, But LBJ Stamps Own Brand On Office

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The shadow of John F. Kennedy still hovers over the White House, but Lyndon Baines Johnson has begun to stamp his own brand on the high office he assumed Nov. 22.

Johnson concluded his first month as President Sunday with the feeling that "very good progress" has been made in the difficult transition from one administration to another. Though the tall Texan has embraced his slain chief's programs and policies and has kept the Kennedy cabinet and staff, he is now formulating programs of his own.

Johnson is attempting to pull the legislative strings as skillfully as he did when he was Senate Democratic leader to get administration programs through Congress.

But when sweet reasonableness fails — as it has to some extent in the current hassle over the foreign aid appropriations bill — he is ready now, as he was then, to crack down and crack down hard.

Johnson is also sounding a steady "cut the budget" theme to accommodate economy-minded legislators, even while he readies a new spending program bigger than the current \$96.8 billion, a peacetime record.

While working on issues he inherited from the Kennedy administration, and working with the team his predecessor left him, Johnson has begun formulating new policies and putting on a new crew to carry them out.

The first big change was his assignment of Thomas C. Mann, U. S. ambassador to Mexico, to take the place of Edwin M. Martin as assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs.

The Chief Executive's domestic proposals will be laid down in the State of the Union message he will deliver to Congress Jan. 8 — his first rounded declaration of personal programs as President.

At his Wednesday news conference, Johnson made it clear that even though he is cutting as many expenses as possible he will recommend new pro-

grams when warranted even if they cost money.

"We are not going to stand still in this country," he said, "we are going to move ahead. We are going to be enlightened. We are going to be forward looking... we are a growing nation, and we expect to keep moving if we are to lead our

own people, as well as lead the world."
