

Cassius Takes Top Award From Liston

NEW YORK (UPI)—Unbeaten Cassius Marcellus Clay, boxing's golden gasser, defeated heavyweight champion Sonny Liston in their first head-to-head contest—for the Ring Magazine's title "fighter of the year" that publication announced today.

Despite Liston's remarkable repeat first-round knockout over ex-champion Floyd Patterson, Liston finished second to young Clay in the ring-staff's voting because of the light fight that Cassius gave the fight game as he lapped and laughed his way to the challenger's role.

Clay also was credited with participating in the "fight of the year" because of his victory over Doug Jones on March 13, 1962, at Madison Square Garden as he "drove Doug out of his path to a heavyweight championship shot" in their thrilling and controversial bout.

Despite these accolades for the "Louisville Lip," the magazine admitted frankly "Clay is not considered likely to win the championship from Liston at Miami Beach on Feb. 25."

In Clay's other two fights this year, he stopped Charlie Powell (1) at Pittsburgh on Jan. 24 and climbed off the canvas on

June 18 to knock out England's Henry Cooper (5).

Champion Liston was credited with participating in the "round of the year"—that is, the first round in which he knocked out ex-champion Patterson at Las Vegas, Nev., July 22. It proved that Sonny's title-winning first-round knock-out over Patterson in 1952 was no fluke.

Sandy Wins Over Tigers

Jones Sets Marks As Ducks Top WSU

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Defending champion Oregon State meets Colorado State and Oregon played Brigham Young in the semi-finals of the eighth annual Far West Basketball Classic Saturday night.

Oregon, with Steve Jones setting a school one game scoring record with 37 points, defeated Washington State 79-62 and Brigham Young topped Seattle 77-74 in first round games of the four-day, eight-team tournament Friday night.

Oregon State and Colorado State posted opening round victories Thursday night. In consolation games today, Washington State met Seattle and Louisiana State faces Iowa. The finals of the tournament will be played Monday night.

Jones' performance came on the heels of a 40-point effort by 7-foot Mel Cousins in Oregon State's first round win over Louisiana State. Jones made 21 points in the first half and 16 in the second half to break Oregon's scoring mark of 36 points held by Charles Warren and Charlie Franklin.

The 6-5 senior from Portland hit 15 of 23 field goal attempts and made 5 for 5 from the free throw line as the Ducks collected their first win in five starts this season.

Oregon, which led 30-24 at halftime, got 16 points from Jim Barnett and 13 from Jim Johnson.

Jon Stanley hit a field goal with 28 seconds remaining and Mike Gardner added two free throws with seven seconds left to give Brigham Young its victory over Seattle, previously unbeaten in six games.

Miami Junior Threatens National Scoring Title

NEW YORK (UPI)—The 664 question in college basketball this season is whether or not Rick Barry of Miami, Fla., can jump from 64th place one year to national scoring champion the next.

NCAA Service Bureau's week-rankings show the 6-7 junior on top of the heap with an average of 35.9 for his first seven games that includes a single-game high for the season of 50 points against Rollins College, N.J., jumped from second place in last week's ranking, while the leader, Howard (Butch) Komives of Bowling Green, fell to second place with his 35.5 average.

Last year as a sophomore, Barry averaged 19 points per game to finish 64th nationally. He ranked higher earlier in the season, but a mid-year injury hampered him in the second half.

In third place is Princeton's Bill Bradley with a 32.6 average as seven players show averages of 30 points a game or better. Defending champion Nick Werkman of Seton Hall slipped from 12th to 22nd with a 25.4 average, while last year's runner-up Barry Kramer of New York University fails to show in the top 24 with an average of 23 points a game.

There are turnovers in every other individual department.

Dick Moreshead of Boston University, third last week, took over the rebounding lead from Bob Pelkington of Xavier (Ohio). Moreshead's 21.1 rebounds per game being just a shade better than the 21.0 average of defending champion Paul Silas of Creighton; Rick Park of Tulsa replaces Danny Schultz of Tennessee as free throw leader, though neither has missed 20 attempts; and Jay Huckleby of Duke moves up from second to first in field goal accuracy with a 68.9 rate of success.

Defending champion Loyola of Illinois leads in scoring for the second straight week, though the Ramblers' dropped from 104.4 points a game to 102.2 for six starts. Michigan State slipped below the 100 mark, but Morehead State moved up and has averaged exactly a century per game in five outings. Davidson repeats as team field goal leader with a .557 rate of accuracy, improving its record of a week ago, but Temple, last week's team defense leader, dropped all the way to eighth.

Magpies In Cage Finals

MADRAS, Ore. (UPI)—The Warm Springs, Ore., Magpies and Fort Peck, Mont., gained the finals of the All-Indian Holiday basketball tournament here Friday night.

The Magpies defeated Toppensh, Wash., 102-58 and Fort Peck topped Chinook, Ore., 107-61 in the semi-finals of the three-day tourney.

Lapwai, Idaho, won over the Warm Springs Cougars, 85-74 and Sprague River, Ore., got past Wapato, Wash., 85-72 in losers' bracket games.

The Magpies met Fort Peck for the championship Saturday at 7:30 p.m. following consolation games.

Davis Cup Returns To United States

ADELAIDE, Australia (UPI)—Chuck McKinley, a 22-year-old native of St. Louis, Mo., whose temper tantrums once brought tennis disgrace to the United States, brought the Davis Cup back to Uncle Sam's shores today with a 10-12, 6-2, 9-7, 6-2 victory over Australia's John Newcombe.

McKinley's triumph in the fifth and concluding match of the 1963 challenge round came after Australian champion Roy Emerson evened the series at 2-2 with a 6-2, 6-3, 3-6, 6-2 win over Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif.

The victory marked the first time the United States has won the silver cup symbolic of world amateur tennis supremacy since 1938. Australia had held the cup for the last four years and for 11 of the last 13 years.

Tops Wimbledon Showing

For McKinley, a 5-foot, 8-inch, 155-pound "bomber" who was subjected to international criticism a few years ago when he threw his racket into the grandstands during an interzone Davis Cup final at Perth, Australia, today's victory marked the peak of his career—a triumph even greater than his win at Wimbledon.

It came when Australia de-feated Emerson and Neale Fraser in the doubles competition. Fraser was so disappointed in his performance that he announced before Saturday's first singles match that he is retiring "for good."

But with a crowd of 7,000 looking on the 27-year-old Emerson literally picked apart Ralston's game and subjected him to a humiliating defeat. Then the 19-year old Newcombe thrilled the crowd by beating McKinley in the first set of their decisive match.

McKinley Takes Control

It looked like the United States' young tennis hopefuls were about to come apart at the seams but McKinley, a mathematics student at Trinity University, steadied like a seasoned champion and took control of both his and Newcombe's game.

The match ended on the eighth game of McKinley's service when his service ball skidded and was almost impossible for Newcombe to handle. The ball trickled off his racket and fell a few feet short of the net.

The Americans immediately rushed onto the court and lifted both McKinley and U. S. captain Bob Kelleher to their shoulders. The predominantly Australian crowd cheered the winners lustily and photographers clustered around them.
