## Foster Gets 10 Years Plus Fine In Shooting

Circuit Court Judge Donald A. W. Piper today sentenced Archie Foster, 26, of Salem to 10 years in the state penitentiary and fined him \$1,000 for the fatal shooting of Mrs. Richard Biss in Beatty last April.

Foster was convicted of manslaughter Dec. 21 after being tried on a charge of first degree murder.

Judge Piper set Jan. 14 for his ruling on a defense motion for a new trial.

Foster's attorney argued on four points for his motion. The main point concerned alleged misconduct by the jury. The attorney said jurors compared notes they took during the trial, in violation of Judge Piper's instructions banning comparison of notes by jurors.

The attorney said a woman had told him "several" jurors compared notes during the last stages of deliberation.

The defense also argued that

the prosecution should have produced statements given by prosecution witnesses shortly after the shooting, and took exception to the judge's instructions on flight and on transfer of intent.

## Argentina Gun Duel Postponed

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — A duel between Defense Minister Leopoldo Suarez and former Air Secretary Martin R. Cairo appeared early today to have been postponed for at least 24 hours.

Seconds for the two men met four times Wednesday night and early today, apparently without reaching agreement on arrangements for what had been expected to be a meeting with pistols at dawn today.

Attorney Luis Caggiano, a Suarez second, said the talks are "in the first stage."

Although no further details were available immediately, it appeared the seconds were trying to determine whether there were sufficient grounds for a duel and whether it was proper for Cairo to challenge Suarez, his nominal superior in the cabinet.

If the duel takes place, Suarez presumably would resign temporarily before appearing on the "field of honor."

Cairo, a 61-year-old retired air commodore, asked permission to fight Suarez in the latter announcing his resignation from the cabinet.

## Tire Chains Advised On Passes

Motorists traveling through the county's mountainous areas today were advised to carry chains following a storm which deposited from 10 to 12 inches of snow in the passes and two inches along the Green Springs Highway, the local office of the State Highway Department has reported.

At Willamette Pass, the roadside pack was increased to 22 inches when 12 inches of new snow fell during the night. A similar amount was recorded at Diamond Lake West where the snowpack was measured at 30 inches.

At Diamond Lake East, 10 inches of new snow and 38 inches of roadside snow were reported. Meanwhile, Grater Lake noted snow flurries and packed snow with plows operating, and Chemult reported two inches of fresh snow and 10 inches of roadside. Temperatures were just below freezing at all of the stations.

East of Klamath Falls, no new snow was recorded at Bly or Lakeview, but a trace was reported at Adel. Skies were clear and spots of ice were noted on highways along the three points.

A 40-year-old Klamath Falls woman who pleaded not guilty to driving under the influence of alcohol has been scheduled for a jury trial in district court Thursday, Jan. 16.

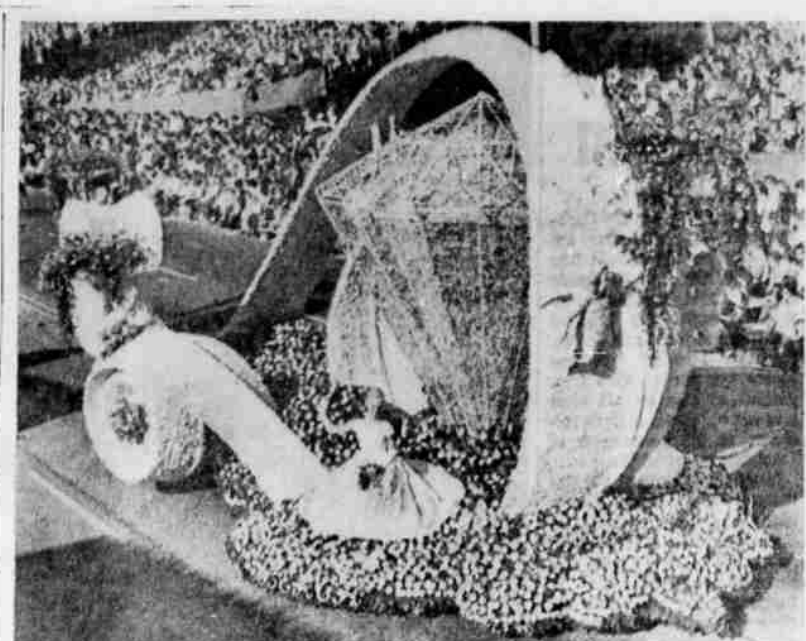
## Father Dies In Canada

## Sunny Skies Help Draw 1.6 Million To 75th Tournament Of Roses Parade

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Millions of people saw the diamond jubilee Tournament of Roses New Year's Day in a stirring panorama of contrasting floral elegance under warm clear skies.

An estimated 1.6 million people lined the streets and an additional 80 million persons watched the annual spectacle on television.

Temperatures ranged into the mid-40s as the 62 floats decked

with more than 10 million blossoms moved along the five-mile parade route. Floats valued at about \$750,000 were joined by 200 smartly stepping bands and equestrian units along the broad palm-lined avenues.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, ruddy and grinning, led the parade as grand marshal. Beside him in the open rose-bedecked car was his wife, Mamie. Obviously enjoying the occasion, the former chief ex-

ecutive extended both arms in his familiar gesture acknowledging the cheers of the crowd.

The float carrying Rose Queen Nancy Kneeland, and the Marine Corps Band also were in the parade vanguard.

The city of Long Beach, which also is celebrating its 75th anniversary, won sweepstakes honors with a float entitled "Diamond Jubilee" featuring a huge cut diamond that slowly revolved on a spreading bed of pink carnations with a background of white chrysanthemums.

Two floats in particular paid touching tribute to the late President John F. Kennedy.

One was an empty floral rocking chair set near a statue of Lincoln on a float marking the 100th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation.

Another was the city of Burbank's "The President goes to the Prom," recalling the late President's surprise visit to a high school graduation dance last year.

More than 35 persons required hospital treatment after collapsing along the parade route. Many had waited through the night for advantage view points.

## Candidates Sought For DSA Honor

Nominations for Klamath's Young Man of the Year and Senior Citizen for 1953 must be submitted within the next two weeks.

The two men, who will be selected by a panel of judges from nominations offered by the public, will be honored at the annual Distinguished Service Award banquet sponsored by the Klamath Jaycees late in January.

Chairman Phil Neiswanger said nominations have been solicited by the Jaycees from a number of service clubs in Klamath Falls. In addition, candidates may be submitted by any other organization or individual, he said.

Official nomination forms are available at the chamber of commerce office, the First National Bank in downtown Klamath Falls or on South Sixth Street and at the United States National Bank downtown. Nominations also may be submitted on a plain piece of paper, but must contain the candidate's name, address, age and a list of his accomplishments during 1953.

To be eligible for the Young Man of the Year award, persons must be between the ages of 21 and 35. The Senior Citizen honor will go to an individual over 35 years of age. Past or present affiliation with the Jaycees is not necessary to be eligible for one of the DSA plaques.

Nominations will be judged 50 per cent on service to the community, 25 per cent on leadership ability and 25 per cent on business or personal success. Those points should be emphasized by persons submitting nominations, Neiswanger said.

Deadline for offering nominations is Jan. 15. They may be left at the chamber of commerce office, 323 Main, or mailed to DSA, Box 407, Klamath Falls.
