Black Tornado invades Pelican Court Tonight

Many area sports fans are looking at tonight's big contest between the Klamath Falls Pelicans and high riding Medford Black Tornadoes as a contest, but the fact remains, no matter who wins, there is still a long season remaining.

While Al Keck's crew hasn't shared with Medford an impressive season record, the Pelicans may well show their colors tonight. Klamath cagers remember well the trimming they took at the hands of the Tornadoes in Medford, and if they want nothing more than to settle the invaders this evening to even things up.

The job of containing the Medford crew will rest in the hands of Terry Ash, Jim Patzke, Kim Coon, Bob Moore and Rick Brostertous, at least for the most part.

Offensively the job will be largely in the hands of Ash and Patzke, the Pelis' two big guns, and assistance will be rendered as usual by Coon, Brostertous and Moore.

Medford boasts a tall lineup, with Olevy, the tallest regular, and an effective scoring combination in Bruce Bertrand, 6-5 center, and Bill Enyart, 6-3 forward. The smallest regular on the Medford squad is senior Doug Olson, a veteran cage star at 5-9, who must get much of the credit for holding the Tornadoes together during heated action.

Coming into tonight's contest, the Black Tornadoes carry one of the finest records in state A-1 basketball, and are ranked number one in the state in the Oregon Fall. The record book is filled with victories such as South Eugene, Hudson's Bay, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Crater, Ashland, and of course, Klamath Falls. Overall they are undefeated in 11 outings.

On the other side of the coin, the Pelicans have fared well overall, but lack the consistency shown by Medford. They have defeated Hudson's Bay, Sweet Home, Corvallis, Ashland, Crater and Fort Vancouver. They have lost to Corvallis, Grants Pass and Medford.

Keck's Pelicans entered into this week's practice sessions with what appeared to be almost a complete transition from past efforts. The enthusiastic display of workouts indicated the Pelis are setting their sights for a future brighter than their spotty past.

While hopes for any tournament shot rests squarely upon the ability of Ash and Patzke to find the target, aggressive play on the part of other members of the team will reflect upon the overall team effort.

Always aggressive, and showing himself well as a sophomore member of the varsity starting lineup, Rick Brostertous keeps the Pelicans moving on the court. Kim Coon, one of the finest high school guards in the business has been plagued somewhat by a bad ankle, but

Olympians In Oregon Track Meet

PORTLAND (UPI)—Three Olympians and two NCAA champions, plus a field of more than 200 athletes into the fifth annual Oregon Indoor Invitational Track and Field Meet at Memorial Coliseum here Saturday night.

Olympic veterans Gerry Lindgren, Morgan Gresh and Ed Caruthers, plus collegiate broad jump and triple jump kings Gayle Hopkins and Charles Craig, have been given the title of "Portland's Sports Stars" in their respective events of a field made up mostly of rookies and newcomers to the national track scene.

Oregon State sophomore Tracy Smith figures to give Lindgren, now at Washington State, a battle in the two-mile event. Lindgren's coach, Tracy Walters, said early this week that the Spokane led is still bothered by an ankle injury suffered last summer while preparing for the Olympics.

In his last outing, Lindgren finished third in the two-mile behind George Young at Los Angeles. Caruthers, the Santa Ana JC star, is one of three sophomores entered in the high jump. John Gardner, whose best career leap is 7-1, are San Jose's Terry Doe (6-11), and Washington's Lewis (6-9) and Washington State's Bob Reppel (6-10), who was third in the NCAA championships last spring.

Oregon's Gresh, who competed in the 800 meters at Tokyo, heads the list of entrants in the mile.

Liston Faces Court Today

DENVER (UPI)—Former heavyweight boxing champion Sonny Liston, whose encounter with the police has been about as successful as his last fight with Liston behind bars for four months with Cassius Clay, stepped back into the legal ring today.

It was Liston in one corner and representatives of the Denver district attorney's office in the other. At stake was a fine of up to \$1,000 and a jail sentence of one year.

Liston was hopeful of getting neither. He pleaded innocent to charge of drunken driving.

The 38-year-old boxer's trial was to get underway with the selection of a jury of six.

The Denver fighter's latest legal match was the result of a Christmas Day "showing" incident which kept 10 police officers busy and ended up with Liston behind bars for four months with Cassius Clay, stepped back into the legal ring today.

Police said Liston was "uncooperative" after they stopped his 1965 Cadillac and questioned him. They finally put him into the police wagon and hauled him out to jail.

It was the third time within the last 12 months that Liston had found himself in trouble when he began the sentence.

Jim Patzke of Klamath also ranked in the top division, with 120 points in 10 games.
