

# Arizona Teacher, Canadian Pharmacist Making Millrose Games Private Event

NEW YORK (UPI)—An Arizona school-teacher and a Canadian pharmacist threatened to turn the indoor track season into their own private jamboree.

George Young, a 27-year-old schoolmaster from Casa Grande, Ariz., won his third straight victory at two miles in the Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden Thursday night to prove he's also the master-at that distance—of Olympic 10,000-meter champ Billy Mills.

And the pharmacist, 24-year-old Bill Crothers of Toronto, breezed his fourth triumph of the new season in the half-

mile. Not only that, Bill will go again in a 600-yarder at Toronto tonight and another 600-yarder at Boston on Saturday night to complete an iron man stent on the biggest weekend of the Eastern indoor season.

Perry Equale, Sprinter Sam Perry of Portland equaled the world record of 5.9 in winning the 60 yard dash and Australia's Judith Anmore matched her pending world mark of 55.8 for 400 yards set at Boston last week but Young won the big one—the two mile featuring Mills, Bill Baillie of New Zealand and Maurice Herlihy of Great Britain. He was clocked in 8:44. Crothers, winner by a dozen yards over Ed Duchini of Maryland in a 1:51.2 800, insisted he's "running for fun this season. . . I'm not trying for a world record at any distance because it could happen if that's what it takes to win."

Roger Morgan of Northeast Louisiana State, who won the 100 yard hurdles in 7.1 over Ralph Boston also will have a fling at the Toronto and Boston meets the next two days. Most of the other Millrose winners, however, indicated they'll have at least one day of rest before competing again.

"They sure as heck played like a member of the top ten," said coach Pete Peta. "I was impressed with Larry Edmundson and short stops Bob Hubert, Bob Schroder and John Buchanan. Edmundson, 23, the most experienced of the four, hit 265 for 32 in the Eastern League last season.

USF continues its road trip Saturday when it meets Arizona State at Tempe, and on Tuesday it journeys to Tulsa.

In tonight's action, first-ranked UCLA takes on Iowa in a non-conference game at Champaign.
