

Time Magazine Contest Won By Tony Vassallo

Tony Vassallo, senior at Henley High School, has been notified that he has been named the local winner in the Time Magazine's 29th annual Current Affairs Contest.

Marci Newcomb and Patti Moore, seniors at Henley, were runner-up students, scoring in the high nineties.

Time's Current Affairs Test, given this year to more than 750,000 college and high school students in the U. S. and Canada, consists of 100 questions on national and foreign affairs. Also included are such categories as business, sports, entertainment, science, religion, literature, journalism, education and the arts.

Top scorers in each of the more than 5,000 classes enrolled in the Time Education Program receive a certificate from Bernard M. Auer, publisher of Time, a weekly news magazine. Vassallo is the son of Mr. and

Christmas Flood Victim Takes Refuge in School

LAKEVIEW—On Dec. 22, a victim of the Christmas storm and flood, sought refuge at Lakeview High School.

A young sandhill crane was found huddling against the wall on the west side of the gym. Latrelle Smoot, the high school shop teacher, rescued him and took the bird to the teachers' lounge where he was viewed with much astonishment by most of the spectators. The young visitor was unusual in the fact that at this time of year a sandhill crane should be somewhere in the vicinity of Texas. Another interesting fact was that this particular crane was only about 2 1/2 feet tall. Normally these birds are hatched in June or July and should be four feet tall or better at this time of year.

Occur Demeing of the Fish and Wildlife Service was called in to take charge of the little fellow. He suggested that it had probably been forced by some injury to fall behind a migrating flock earlier in the year.

A few days after it was rescued the young crane died. It had found a refuge too late.

Government Said Effective

Can students govern themselves effectively? "Yes," says Jim Drew, KU Student Body president. The students are presently doing so through their student council, KU Student Council is headed by eight student body officers. These are president, first vice president, second vice president, secretary, Pelican Pete and rally queen. Each of these officers is elected by the student body during an election week held during the last term of each school year, with the exception of the fourth-year who is selected by the freshman class at the beginning of the school year.

These elections follow the pattern of national elections with candidates forming their own campaign committees, presenting speeches at a student body assembly, distributing campaign literature, and students marking secret ballots at the polls.

Each student has a voice in the council through his student council representative elected in all English classes at the beginning of the year and at the beginning of the third term.

The primary aims of KU's student council are: (1) to develop a better relationship between students and faculty; (2) to coordinate student and club activities; and (4) to give students an opportunity to practice democratic government.

One of the powers of the KU council is to appropriate student body funds, with the consent of the School Board and school administration, for assemblies or projects deemed worthy of expenditure of such funds.

The council's plans for the coming year include the updating of the school constitution,

the establishing of a constitution for the new junior high school, and a Christmas project.

Several notable accomplishments already completed by this student council are: The publication of a student handbook, sending four student body officers to a leadership conference in Coos Bay, Ore. On Sept. 27 to 28 sponsorship of a mock election on Nov. 3, and the approving of a new yearbook. This yearbook is a departure from those of the past as it will include the spring term and be published after the end of the school year.

The nine standing committees of the council are Assembly Committee, Citizenship Committee, Nominating Committee, Social Committee, and Traditions Committee. A new committee, established by this year's council is the Student Body Committee, formerly to handle student or faculty problems.

Nine Pupils Selected For Math Club

NORMAN, Okla. — Nine students at Klamath Union High School were honored recently by election to the national office of Mu Alpha Theta, an international high school and junior college mathematics club.

The announcement was made by Dr. Harold Hunke, national secretary-treasurer, who is an associate professor of mathematics at The University of Oklahoma, where the national office of Mu Alpha Theta is located.

As minimum requirements for membership, a student must have completed with distinction at least four semesters of college preparatory mathematics and be enrolled in the fifth semester. He also must have an overall grade of at least a "B" in all of his high school mathematics courses.

Mu Alpha Theta, founded at The University of Oklahoma in 1937, now has more than 500 chapters in all 50 states and in England, Switzerland, Japan, Canada, the Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, and Guantánamo Bay, Cuba. The club is sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America and has attracted the attention of top mathematics scholars in this country and abroad.

Activities consist of work in areas of mathematics not usually covered in the classroom. A journal containing challenging problems in mathematics is mailed to each club three times during the school year. Regional meetings are held each year and students are encouraged to participate in many extra-curricular mathematical activities.

"The University of Oklahoma and many other major universities give special consideration to Mu Alpha Theta members when scholarship applications are processed," Hunke said. "Students have discovered that the study programs encouraged by the club help them when they begin to take college courses in mathematics."

Job Training Program Underway in Lakeview

LAKEVIEW—Lakeview High School students who are outstanding in commercial classes are being trained to assume jobs at various city school offices and in the libraries.

The program is under the direction of Mrs. Peggy Weir, LHS commercial classes instructor, and Mrs. Fern Walton, LIS librarian. Mrs. Weir selects the office girls and Mrs. Walton the librarians.

Office girl duties are dictation, typing, paper correction for teachers, taking lunch money and keeping a daily record of activities. A maximum of 15 hours per week is spent in taking care of these responsibilities. Students participating in this work program receive two credits toward graduation and are paid 50 cents an hour. They are graded according to accomplishment by the school authority.

This work program has proved very beneficial to students, said Mrs. Weir. "It works under pressure, to get along with others, and also gain valuable out-of-classroom experience," said Mrs. Weir.
