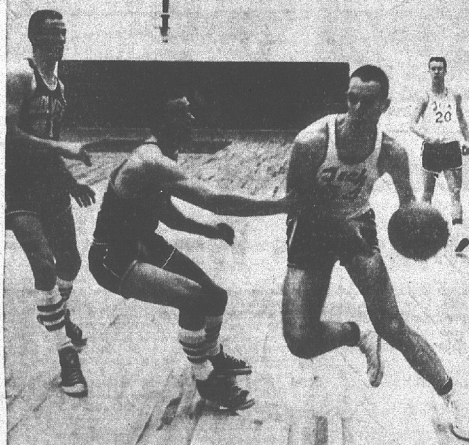

In the closing moments of the first half, a pair of baskets by Pappin put the Wolves in front 24-25 and it began to look like the Owls might be in for their first defeat on the new Tech court. Werin picked up two baskets and Lyons fed Robinson on a fast break that closed the gap. With 1:19 left in the half Werin let one go from the corner and then made a lay-up to make it 36-37 Medford. The first time since the score stood 5-0 that Tech managed to get out in front.

At the end of a blistering first half, the Owls led 42-39. After the intermission Oregon Tech began away steadily and the Wolves' shooting began to cool. With five minutes remaining in the ball game, the Owls had a 71-69 cushion.

During the mid-second half drive Merle Carpenter, L.H. gangling forward who had been inserted into the Owl lineup for Hank Albrecht, banged in three quick baskets which hurt the Wolves badly.

On the other hand, a relative newcomer to coach Wayne B. Stooze's club, a lad by the name of Brannan, turned in his finest performance in his first all out contest.

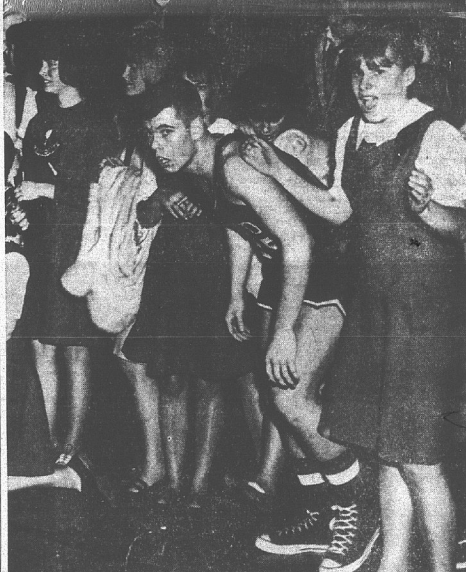
Snoozey put Brannan into the lineup after he had lost two more cagers through one means or another. The Big coach now has only seven cagers on his roster.
