

Churchill's Resting Place Becomes National Shrine

BLADON, England (UPI)—Sir Winston Churchill's final rest to the Exfordshire hills of his birthplace has already made this hamlet a national shrine. So far, tens of thousands of pilgrims have streamed past the flower-covered grave and a steady flow of visitors continued to walk past it today.

Thousands of Americans lined up to see President Kennedy's grave in the United States. Englishmen, similarly, flocked to see the site of their great statesman's resting place. All day Sunday, and long into the night they came, among them Earl Mountbatten, a palbearer at Saturday's state funeral. He is Britain's chief of staff.

By mid afternoon Sunday, there were three queues, each stretching more than a mile, waiting to file past the grave. Since Saturday night at least 125,000 persons had visited the grave, a police spokesman said, and many more were expected today.

Police used floodlights to illuminate the scene at night and to show the wreaths, including those from the queen and Lady Churchill.

"To my darling Winston, Clemmie," said the card on Lady Churchill's wreath. "From the nations of the Commonwealth in grateful remembrance," said the inscription by Queen Elizabeth II.

There were 29 sprays of flowers. All day Sunday the pilgrims walked silently along the path from the wooden arch gate of St. Martin's churchyard, bowing their heads in homage to the wartime prime minister.

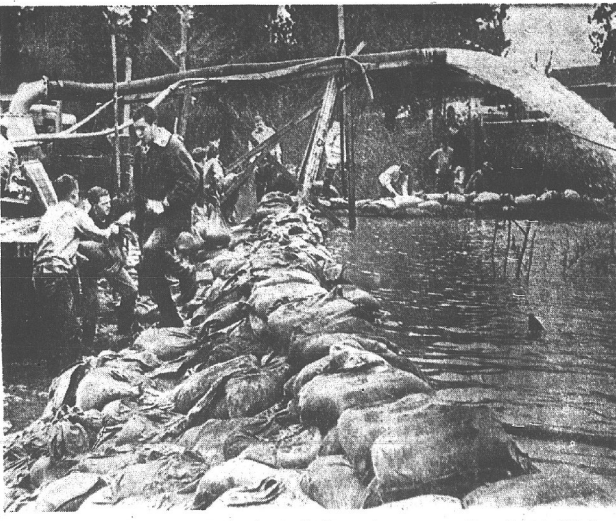
Senators To Approve LBJ Appalachia Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate opened debate on the measure last Friday. Democratic leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., scheduled an early session to clean up debate and action on amending a bill for rehabilitating the 11-state Appalachia region.

Other congressional news: Education: The House general education subcommittee hopes to complete hearings on President Johnson's \$1.25 billion program for elementary and secondary education.

Aid: The administration hopes Secretary of State Dean Rusk will be able to reverse in the Senate a House-passed ban on further surplus food shipments to the United Arab Republic. Rusk meets with the Senate Appropriations Committee which is considering a \$1.7 billion supplemental appropriations bill to provide extra funds for the Commodity Credit Corp.

Adviser: Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's Science Adviser gave firm support to President Johnson's \$1.5 billion elementary and secondary school aid program. The House general education subcommittee has not seen before the legislation by holding an unusual Saturday session, the second one in two weeks. James R. Killian, the former adviser, headed a panel of scientists appearing before the subcommittee. They devoted most of their testimony to support for the portion of the administration's bill which would allow more funds for school curriculum research.

Indian War Fought With Words

TACOMA (UPI)—A modern-day Indian war, fought with words instead of arrows and guns, was to resume today in the courtroom of Pierce County Superior Court Judge John D. Cochran.

The state departments of Game and Fisheries are seeking a permanent injunction prohibiting members of the Puyallup Indian Tribe from fishing with nets and other illegal gear on the Puyallup River.

It may take a week or more to try the civil suit. Regardless of the outcome, the case almost certainly will be appealed to the State Supreme Court and perhaps ultimately to the U.S. Supreme Court. Meanwhile, Robert Satacum, self-styled chief of the Puyallup Indian, plans to lead a delegation of Indians on a march to the state capital.

The Indians want to discuss public functions dressed in buckskins and a feather war bonnet, is a defendant in the lawsuit against the tribe. He earns most of his living catching and selling steelhead, salmon and other fish. The state contends that Indians must obey the same conservation laws as other citizens to protect fish runs for every one.

It wants the court to prohibit the Indians from fishing commercially for steelhead, a game fish, and from fishing with gill nets in the Puyallup River where such gear is illegal. The Indians contend that they have a right, guaranteed by the 1855 Treaty of Medicine Creek, to fish any way they please in any waters their ancestors fished.

A legal skirmish was fought Friday when San Francisco attorney Melvin Belli urged Cochran to dismiss the suit. He claimed the Puyallup Tribe was a "sovereign nation" which could not be sued in a state court. His eloquence was wasted, however. Cochran rejected the plea. Belli said he could not attend the opening session of the trial today. But Seattle attorney Malcolm McLeod, the Indians' chief counsel, said Belli would be back before the trial ends. The trial of a similar suit in which the state is seeking to prohibit a group of Indians from fishing with nets on the Nisqually River is scheduled to begin Feb. 15 in the same court.

Two Negroes Now Hold 'Death Row' Record

ANGOLA, La. (UPI)—Edgar Labat and Clifton Foret will sit out another day on death row today, just like any other condemned prisoner. But they are not like any other condemned prisoner.

The two Negroes have been on death row at Angola State Penitentiary for 11 years, 10 months and nine days, longer than any other prisoner has faced death in the history of the United States.

The pair was sentenced to death for the rape of a white woman. Until Sunday, the record for longevity on death row belonged to the memory of Caryl Chessman, the famed "red light bandit" who was sentenced to die for his lovers lane crimes in California.

Convict-author Chessman became an international figure and center of controversy during his 11 years, 10 months and seven days in the death house. He was executed May 2, 1960.

Foret is almost unknown, but Labat has made headlines; and he, too has attracted international attention. Labat and Foret once were within a hair's breadth of death. Labat said one night he was fed his last meal, shaved and read for the electric chair.

He said he heard the generators supplying current to the electric chair start up and then a last-minute reprieve came. Louisiana Institutions Director O. C. Sills recently offered Labat and Foret some hope. He said the state may have executed its last prisoner.
