Congressmen Push Air Force Probe Of Academy's Honor Code Scandal

AIR FORCE ACADEMY cadet wing were involved. About 30 of the number were football players, he said.
 "All involved," he said. The Academy said Monday that all 102 to resign were involved directly in the theft, sale or use of stolen exam papers. The honor code also requires that cadets with knowledge of cheating turn in the offenders, but none was in this category, officials said.
 The situation also provoked questions from Rep. F. Edward Hebert, D-La., and Rep. Byron Rogers, D-Colo. Hebert suggested that a civilian board be set up to oversee the academic work load of cadets.

The Louisiana representative said there may have been "a few bad characters" in the cheating incident, but also "a number of fine Americans."
 Academy Defended
 Rogers, a member of the Academy's board of visitors, defended the institution's athletic program which has come under criticism.
 "Athletics aren't the reason (for the cheating)," he said. "Dean McDermet (Facilities dean Brig. Gen. Robert McDermet) has put the athletic program on the highest scholastic basis possible."
 Rogers, however, did not attempt to pinpoint the blame.

Fast Okay Expected By House

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate backers of President Johnson's \$1 billion Appalachian aid program today predicted final passage of the key "Great Society" measure by the end of the month.
 Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W. Va., who engineered the bill through the Senate Monday to an easy 62-22 victory, said, "I think we can expect final action late this month."
 Randolph said he had talked to Rep. Robert Z. Jones Jr., D-Ala., about the measure's chances in the House. Jones is chairman of a special subcommittee set up to speed action on the bill.
 "Mr. Jones assured me the bill would have clear sailing in the House," Randolph said.
 House Hearings
 Jones planned to call his subcommittee into executive session today to discuss the House version of the bill. Three days of hearings on the measure began Wednesday.

School Aid Criticized At Hearings

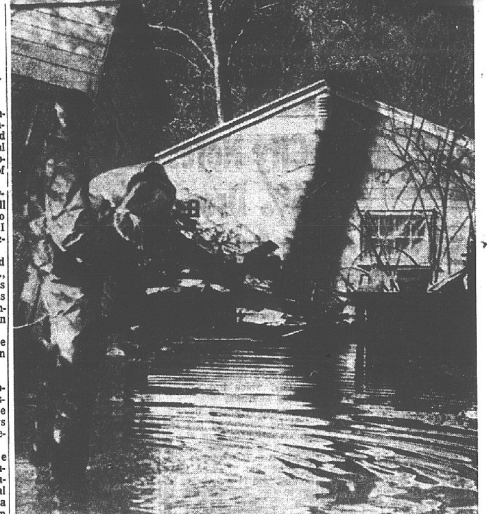
WASHINGTON (UPI) — A House panel of education subcommittees hoped to wind up hearings today on President Johnson's \$1.2 billion school aid program.
 But the plan still faced more of the criticism it has run into in the last few days from religious and lay groups over a provision that would provide aid for parochial school students.
 The criticism arose after major Catholic and Protestant groups gave their conditional endorsement of the plan, which would provide \$1 billion in aid for parochial schools and \$200 million in other funds.
 Other Items Planned
 The other funds would be used to finance libraries, buy textbooks and build "shared-time" educational centers for use by public and parochial school children.
 Scheduled to testify today was the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), among the critics of the plan.
 Spokesmen for the group called for major revisions to "avoid" the "most dangerous" violation of the constitutional principle of church-state separation since James Madison's famous remonstrance set the directions of American religious liberty in 1786.
 Other congressional news:
 Baker: The Senate Rules Committee resumed hearings in the investigation into the business affairs of former Senate Democratic Secretary Robert Baker. Among witnesses called to testify was Texas banker Clint Marchison, 41, who said: The Senate Banking Committee scheduled a hearing today on President Johnson's request to ease gold requirements on Federal Reserve Bank deposits. Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon and Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., were to appear.

Hatfield Activates Survey Teams To Estimate Latest Flood Damage

SALEM (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield said Monday that no damage estimate was available from new flooding last week but that he has reactivated the damage survey team to compile reports similar to those made after the Christmas week disaster.
 Hatfield said 1,900 people evacuated their homes during the recent flooding but most had returned as the crisis eased. He also said the Tillamook area was out of danger from a slide on the Wilson River and that cleanup of the slide would begin soon.
 He said 2,186 families had submitted aid applications to the Red Cross as a result of the Christmas week flooding, and that to date about \$50,000 had been given to 1,500 persons.
