Drunk Drivers
Howard noted that his department made 61 drunken driving arrests during 1964, as compared to 40 during 1963.
The chief laid the blame for three of the fatalities during 1964 to drinking. "Three of the fatalities this past year were the result of driving under the influence of liquor."

Traffic Accidents Up
One area which the city lost ground during 1964 was traffic accidents.
In spite of the increase in enforcement the toll continues to rise. "Howard said a total of 724 accidents were reported during 1964."

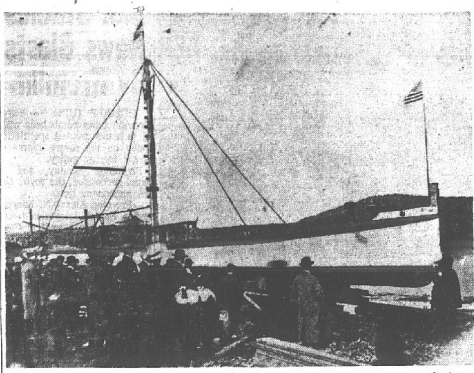

and crated solely. "On the waters of the Mighty Klamath, under God's blue canopy, with wine from sunny France, a christening was held in 1905. Approximately 250 spectators observed the craft, built by John T. Totton with assistance from his partner, Harry Hansberry, slide down the ways into the lake where for the next 14 years she was the unchanged queen of the lake."

Excursions Offered

The Winema had regularly scheduled trips to Odesse three times a week. For \$1 one could take excursions around the lake every Sunday to the accompaniment of entertainment provided by a brass band.
The Winema also delivered freight, up to 70 tons, and was available for special charters. The boat could travel at speeds of 10-12 miles an hour.
