

Legislature Blocks Lobbyist Bill By Study In Judiciary Committee

SALEM (UPI)—An attempt to protect lobbyists from malicious or unfounded charges by legislators was sidetracked by the House today and sent to the Judiciary Committee.

Rep. Betty Roberts, D-Gresham, touched off a 45-minute debate by attempting to amend the House's lobbyist registration rule on the floor.

She asked that the rule be changed to provide a public hearing for any accused lobbyist and for censure of a lawmaker who made false or malicious accusations against a lobbyist. Her amendment also would leave the final decision whether to withdraw a lobbyist's privileges up to the House, rather than to its Judiciary Committee.

Her proposal eventually was referred to the judiciary committee on a voice vote.

Mrs. Roberts said her attempt was "not a reflection on the integrity of judgment of any legislator," but she contended the House overlooked some basic safeguards when it passed the lobbyist rule for the first time at the start of the 1963 session.

Fort Klamath Man Uses Six-Shooter To Kill Bobcat

FORT KLAMATH—Having a wildcat peering down at you from overhead is a somewhat startling situation and would shiver the timbers of the bravest of men, but this is exactly what happened recently to John A. (Bert) Gray of Fort Klamath.

Gray went into his woodshed to get an armload of wood for his house when suddenly he looked up, and there staring back at him was a bobcat, of no small size. Most people would have run, but not so for Bert Gray, veteran hunter and fisherman, instead he shouted to his wife, who was in the house, to bring him his six-shooter. By the time she arrived with the revolver, the cat had descended the ladder and was crouched

down, apparently attempting to place from a large barn on neighboring property owned by Mrs. J. P. (Nora) McAlliff, and on investigating the left in his woodshed found that it had been there only a short time.

Cat Eats Mice

Due to the December flood, mice in this area have been extremely numerous until the recent heavy snowfall, and Gray deduced that the wildcat had been in the barn catching mice until the supply of rodents became exhausted, whereupon she had come to the Gray woodshed to explore the possibilities of finding more mice.

Now 78, Bert Gray is a native Oregonian and came to the Fort Klamath area in 1902 with his late parents and late sister, Alice. After many years of service with the U.S. Forest Service and the Oregon State Game Commission in this part of the 50-pound bag on the floor. Getting her deer rifle, Mrs. Thomas sighted the bruin ambling out of the yard in the moonlight, and killed him with one shot from her rifle.
