

Cavemen Arrive For Cage Battle

Revenge will be sweet for the Klamath Pelicans tonight, as the second place Klamath Union High School club hosts the Grants Pass Cavemen in Southern Oregon Conference action at Pelican Court.

The Pelicans, a much improved ball team since they last met the Cavemen, will be out to even the score with the third place Cavemen, and secure for themselves a spot from which they hope to upset the high riding Medford Black Tornado in their next meeting.

With Kim Coon back in the lineup, Rick Brostehous in the lineup, and the possibility of at least limited play from alling Bud Lunnus, the Pels may find themselves closer to full strength than they have at any time this year.

Terry Ash and Jim Patzke, two of the Pelicans' top scoring aces, and conference leaders, both among the top five in the SOC scoring race, have maintained their double point figures in every game this year, and have received valuable assistance from Kim Coon since his return to action.

Ash is currently hitting at a 15 point per game clip, while Patzke is holding at the 14 point per game mark. Coon, in his last two contests has averaged 10 points per game.

Loss Factor
The Pels might easily have had a win over Medford last week, had it not been for the untimely and unfortunate mishap in which Rick Brostehous was forced from the game by a minor injury.

Brostehous was instrumental in helping his teammates build a 10-point edge over Medford, but when the talented ball handler was forced from action, Medford closed the gap and

wound up on the long end of an overtime victory.
Bob Moore came back into action at the Ashland game two weeks ago, displaying an aggressive type of action that proved valuable both on offense and defense for the Pels. Despite the fact that this young junior cager was blamed at Crater last weekend, he has proved to be a valuable member of the squad through alert board work and assists.

ber of the squad through alert board work and assists. But the Pels aren't kidding themselves tonight. They remember well how a full court pressing offense at Grants Pass, plus inability to connect on the long ones brought about an overtime defeat 30-31, on the Pelican Court.

Expect Worst
Coach Al Keck's charges have been working strenuously during the past week, expecting the worst from Grants Pass in tonight's tussle. With Brostehous (a sophomore) and Kim Coon bringing the ball downcourt, Keck expects he can cope with the Cavemen in any eventuality.

Looking beyond Grants Pass

(tonight) and Ashland (next weekend), Coach Keck set his sights on Medford (Feb. 10), during talks at the Pelican Booster Club meeting Wednesday night, when he said, "We feel we can beat Medford, but we need an all-out effort on the part of our first players. Medford is a little taller, and a stronger club, but we feel we can beat them."

Keck supported his feelings by pointing out that Coon's return has bolstered the Pels, and that Rick Brostehous has developed into the finest ball handler on the squad.

Final Sweep?
With Terry Ash and Jim Patzke clipping along in the scoring department, and Bob Moore pushing hard both on offense and defense, the Pelicans could find themselves sweeping the remaining games on their schedule, including those with Medford.

Should Medford get past Crater and Grants Pass in their next two contests, they will have a 15-0 season record, and will be ripe for upset. One win over the Black Tornado will boost the Pelican confidence to the point they will be a most formidable foe by state tournament time.

Grants Pass currently stands with an overall 6-6 record, and a conference mark of 3-3. Klamath Falls has an overall of 4-4, and a conference record of 1-3. A win tonight will give them breathing room in the conference race, and will concentrate on the top runner.

Keck is expected to go with Ash, Patzke, Moore, Coon and Brostehous at the tip-off tonight. Grants Pass will place its hopes on the scoring of Tom Blanchard and Pat Duchien.

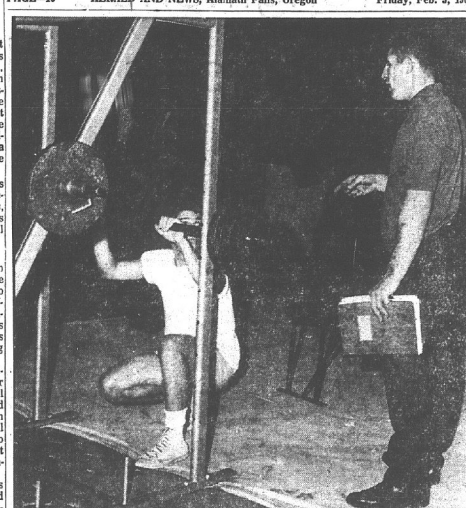

John Nelson of Portland State and OTI's Rich Lyons are one-two in the league scoring race. Nelson averages 22.5 and Lyons 22.3 per game.

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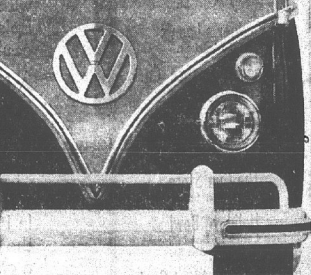
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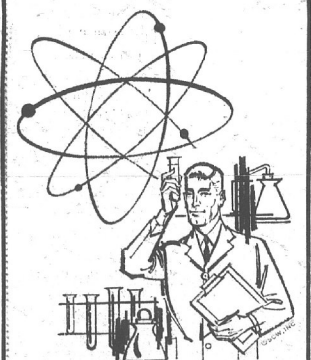


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(Which always goes for a few favored eyeballs in the crowd, especially when they see that the VW is 4 feet shorter than regular wagons.)
